

PARTICIPATION OF AMERICA IS VERY WELCOME

Problems of Near East Discussed at Meeting Between Secretary Hughes and British Ambassador

WASHINGTON, Sept. 25, (AP)—Sir Auckland Geddes, British ambassador, was among Secretary Hughes' callers today on the latter's first day back at his desk in the state department after an absence in Brazil of several weeks. While no statement as to the nature of the conference was forthcoming, either at the embassy or the department, there were indications that the Near Eastern situation was among the subjects discussed.

Unofficial advice from London have indicated that the British government would welcome American participation in the proposed conference to determine the final disposition to be made of the Dardanelles and the Bosphorus. It was regarded as probable that the British ambassador in coming to letters from Mr. Hughes whether an invitation to send a representative to a conference would be accepted by the Washington government was in accordance with the American viewpoint on the question he may have formed from his conference with Mr. Hughes, was not known.

Only the Relief Work So Far

Up to the present, American intervention in the Near East situation has been strictly confined to relief work at Smyrna. The work of Rear Admiral Bristol, high commissioner at Constantinople, has not gone beyond that object. It is obvious, however, that with a growing merchant authority, has not been disclosed.

Another matter in which the American government might become interested very particularly as a result of any settlement reached by the allied powers in conference with the Kemalists authorities, is the status of the treaties of capitulation between the Turkish government and the United States. The extra territorial rights of Americans in the former Turkish empire, under which they are subject to local before consular courts only, is involved.

Night Not Recognized

The United States never has recognized the right of Turkey to terminate these capitulations on its own motion as the Constantinople government endeavored to do in 1914. The express point of the treaties of capitulation is not covered in the so-called national pact adopted by the Kemalists government as its statement of principles. One of the articles of that pact, however, appears to touch the question in its restriction of "judicial" as well as social and economic independence for Turkey.

In any event, there are important American considerations involved in the state department's treatment of Near Eastern crises. The subject, it is thought, may well come up at the cabinet meeting tomorrow, now that Hughes has returned and a final decision may be reached there as to the attitude the Washington government will take toward Turkey in connection with the allied-Kemalist peace negotiations.

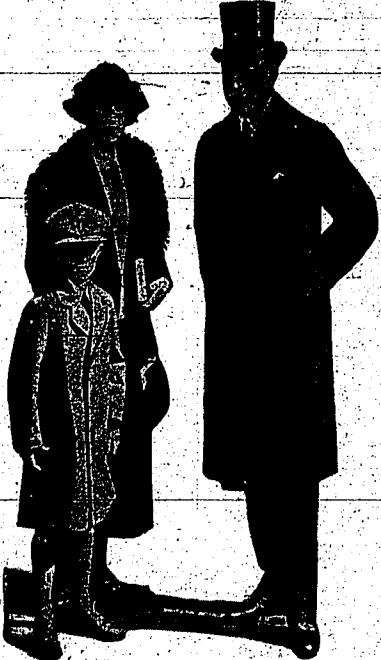

RAPID INCREASE IS SHOWN

Canadian Buffalo Herd, Started with More, Handful of Animals, Now Worth Millions

MISSOULA, Mont., Sept. 25, (AP)—Plathead reservation buffalo, sold to the Canadian government 18 years ago have increased in numbers so rapidly that the herd at Wainwright, Ontario, for which the reservation animals were the nucleus, is now believed to be the largest in the world. According to a report of Wardens A. L. Smith, of the Canadian parks, Ottawa, Ontario, the last census disclosed 6,148 buffalo in the herd, which is valued at \$9,000,000.

The natural increase for the last year was 1,076, while the decrease due to old age, fighting and slaughter was 81, leaving a net increase of 995, nearly 300 more than the original herd. Many calves were born this year; the exact number at the present time is not known, but it is estimated the herd numbers more than 7,000 or three-fifths of all the horns remaining of the millions that once roamed western prairies and plateaus.

There are 1,000 bulls in the herd which are more than needed, so it is probable numbers of them will be slaughtered this fall and sold in Canada and the United States for meat.

FURNISH ENORMOUS BOND

Eighty-Six Residents of Herrin and Vicinity Pledge \$410,000 for Appearance of Indicted Killers

MARION, Ill., Sept. 25, (AP)—Eighty-six business men of Herrin, Johnson City and Marion, appeared before Circuit Judge D. T. Harwell this afternoon, gave their names to the clerk and furnished bonds for \$410,000 upon which the men indicted for murder in connection with the Herrin mine killings were released with eight exceptions, six of whom are held in jail without bail, and the other two are yet to be apprehended. Herrin has the largest representation among those furnishing bond.

The six held without bail are: Otto Clark, Bert Orace, James Brown, negro constable Lora Mann, Phillip Pansetta and Peter Hiller, with Oscar Howard and Jesse Childers ordered held without bond as soon as they are apprehended. Those held without bail are said to have been the leaders of the riots. Their trials will be held first under present plans.

FIRST REGULATION DRAWN

Rules for Wool Importation Under Terms of New Tariff Promulgated by Treasury

WASHINGTON, Sept. 25, (AP)—The first regulations under the tariff act of 1922, governing the entry and withdrawal of wool, were promulgated today by the treasury.

The regulations, which are temporary, set forth the facts importers are restricted to with the entry and estimate of the clean content upon which the duty is assessed. In the absence of a statement by the importer, the duty is to be calculated on the full weight as the clean content. One bale out of each consignment is to be designated by collectors for examination and with the apraiser will follow commercial methods in determining the clean content of wool.

MEMORY SEARCH IS ASKED

Pioneers of Montana Engage in Search Hunt for Details of Old-Time Indian Battle

MISSOULA, Mont., Sept. 25, (AP)—Pioneers of Montana have been requested to search the dim recesses of their memories to recall an Indian battle which J. N. Hunter of Spokane believes took place near Arlee about 70 years ago. While it is doubtful if there are any persons living in the state who were there so long ago, Mr. Hunter believes that the old time incidents may have been Indians falling of the conflict for he states he has learned of Flathead Indians who have a hazy recollection of a battle in that locality, and these may be others who could give more definite information.

Montana records do not record any engagement near Arlee, but Mr. Hunter has in his possession a small round object believed to be a cannon ball, which was found near the Delan lumber camp by a cook. Judging from the depth at which the missile was found, it is the opinion of local authorities that trenches figured in the battle, and as the ball indicated, artillery must have been used.

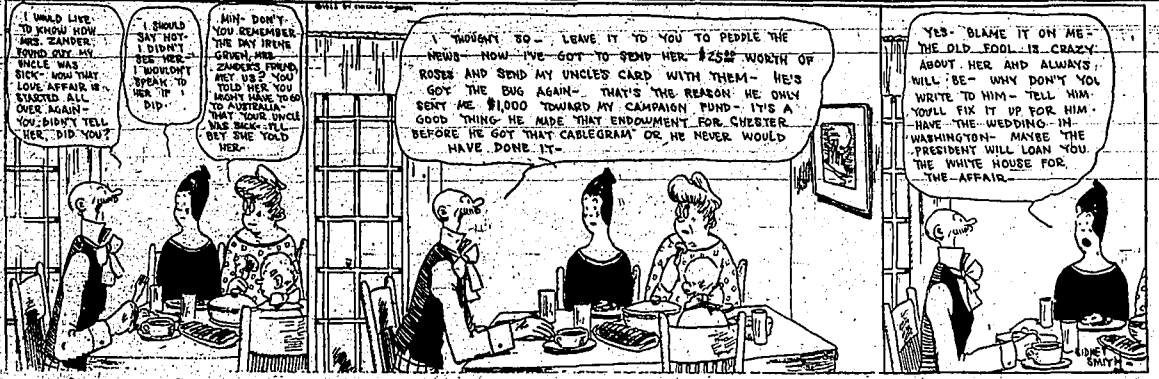

TENSENESS IN NEAR EAST IS QUIETING DOWN

Situation Greatly Improved From British Viewpoint With Little Fear in England of Hostilities

LONDON, Sept. 25. (AP)—Smiles which wreathed Lord Curzon's face as he departed from the prime minister's official residence in Downing street this afternoon, following a detailed report to the cabinet of his Paris mission, typified the general easing-up of the tensions in the Near East situation as viewed from the British capital.

The view in official circles there are expressions of relief that the war crisis of last week had been averted by diplomacy with such an old hand as Curzon directing British policy, and although there is no word that the allied note has yet been delivered, the Moslems' general attitude, the national leader, it is estimated that his refusal to come to terms is extremely unlikely.

The view is held in authoritative allied circles that immediate acceptance would be against Turkish "trading proposals." It is said that the British are always ready to offer more to him. Then, he holds the other to it and angles for further concessions.

Definite Offer Made
The allies have made Kemal Pasha a definite offer of Constantinople, Thrace to the Maritima river and membership in the league of nations, but it is believed that Kemal probably will reply with a demand for the entire Thrace and complete retirement of the British from the neutral zones before the Turks enter into a peace conference.

It is taken for granted, however, both in Paris and London that no reply will be forthcoming from the nationalist leader until he sees M. Franklin D. Roosevelt, who is expected to reach Smyrna Thursday.

That all danger is not passed is evident from today's dispatches reporting a new Kemalist rebellion in the Chankir zone, necessitating a further warning from the British commander there. Details of the affair are meager, and it may not be serious, since, according to The Times Chankir correspondent, small Turkish cavalry patrols were still in the zone yesterday, but he anticipated difficulties if the Turks were showing a genuine desire to be reasonable.

May Take Time
Even when Kemal's reply is received there are likely to be prolonged negotiations, for it is believed that Kemal will demand the admission of France and Bulgaria to the conference, which would provide ample opportunity for protracted discussion. In the meantime, the British government is not likely to relax its military and naval preparations. More battalions of guards are making ready at Aldershot for early embarkation.
