NO CURTAILMENT OF PROGRAM OF CHURCH WORK

National Catholic Welfare Council Authorized to Continue Activities in Future as in Past

WASHINGTON, Sept. 28 (AP)—The National Catholic Welfare Council was authorized today by the hierarchy of the Roman Catholic church of America "to continue and intensify the activities which have resulted in the greatest good during the past year."

Announcement of the authorization was made by Archbishop Hannay of San Francisco and Archbishop of Baltimore, at the close of today's session of the annual meeting of the hierarchy. Members of the hierarchy, composed in the meeting of Cardinal O'Connell of Boston, nearly a dozen archbishops and more than 50 bishops, previously had received and considered reports on the activities of each department of the council during the year. These reports, especially those of the social service and educational lines, were shown to have shown remarkable accomplishments.

The two archbishops in their announcement said the hierarchy regarded the organization of the welfare council as its own representative and as the exponent of its policies in carrying out plans for the welfare of the people in America along educational, social and related lines.

Doubts Set at Rest

This statement was considered in church circles as settling a rest doubt as to whether the hierarchy from Rome, the welfare council would increase or diminish the scope of its activities. Bishop Schrembs, of Cleveland, who headed the group which recently went to Rome to obtain views of the Vatican on the council's activities, is reported to have said at the meeting of the hierarchy and although not covered by the official statement of hierarchy's action, it was understood that he had said in his talk to Pope Pius XI and upon the wishes of the Holy Father in the matter.

Bishop Schrembs and Bishop Galt of Detroit were speakers tonight at a mass meeting held under the auspices of National Council of Catholic Women, which began its annual convocation here today.

The hierarchy of the church also decided to take up a collection in all Catholic churches for the relief of suffering in Austria, Germany and Russia. The date of collection, it was announced, will be October 29 or on the nearest day convenient.

Appeals for aid recently had been transmitted to the Vatican by the cardinal archbishops of Vienna and Berlin.

OLD SOL'S RULE IS UNDISTURBED

Weather Bureau Records Another Week of Uninterrupted Sunshine

BOISE—Another week of uninterrupted sunshine, with cool nights was recorded by Clinton E. Norquist, meteorologist here for the United States weather bureau, in a summary of weather and crop conditions in Idaho issued Wednesday.

The summary follows: **North Idaho:** This was another week of uninterrupted sunshine with high day temperatures. The nights were cool. Fall work on the farms has been brought up to date and farmers are awaiting rain before beginning general plowing and seeding. Orchardists have begun on the apple harvest, starting with Jonathan. Peaches, except a few of the late varieties, have been harvested. Pasture continues to suffer from the hot sun and lack of rain, but livestock continues in good condition. The highest temperature at Lewiston was 70 degrees on the 10th. **Southwest Idaho:** Temperatures were considerably higher than normal throughout the week, the afternoon temperature on the 20th, the highest, was 78 degrees. The nights were moderately cool. Frost occurred in exposed localities. There was very little cloudiness and no rain. Sunshine was abundant. The weather was ideal for maturing crops and for all outdoor pursuits. However, the week was entirely too warm for satisfactory development of head lettuce. The hot afternoon tend to force the growth of a seed stalk rather than a head. There was some complaint also from the Twin Falls section that the heat is damaging in some apples. Haying and threshing of grain, clover seed, alfalfa seed and bean made good progress. Peach harvest is pretty well over except in case of a few late varieties. Prune harvest was pushed as fast as the scarcity of cool weather permitted. Each day's haying and pruning had a very hot day. The week was warm and dry. The cutting of the third crop of alfalfa is progressing in the lower valleys and the second cutting has been completed in the high districts. Grain is about all harvested and most farmers are threshing. Alfalfa seed is being threshed. Potatoes are ripening and some are being dug. Sugar beets are good. Fall plowing is progressing but the ground is too dry. Ranges are dry.

Genoa, Bear Lake county: Good weather; all week; much farm work done; second crop alfalfa cut; some threshing being done.

Waler, Washington county: Clear weather with abundant sunshine; prunes and peaches about all shipped; some second crop alfalfa cut; some threshing being done.

Montpelier, Bear Lake county: Fine weather; grain ripening rapidly; harvest well swung; threshing not begun; prunes and peaches in good condition.

Mackay, Custer county: Fine weather all week; second crop alfalfa cut; oats and spruce wheat about all cut; potatoes good; forest ranges becoming dry.

Abodeen, Blingham county: Moderate temperatures; threshing about all completed except some alfalfa seed; farm work well up; potatoes being dug; ranges good.

Firth, Blingham county: Moderate to high temperatures; threshing nearing completion; potatoes ripening and ready to dig; some fields show more disease than usual.

Ashley, Fremont county: Week hot and dry with high winds; threshing progressing rapidly; ground too dry for plowing; peaches and plums good; winter wheat good.

Footsall, Blainey county: Warm and dry; third cutting alfalfa being made; about all cut and being threshed; potatoes fair; beets good condition; fall plowing started in some places.

New Meadows, Adams county: Week of abundant sunshine; very favorable for stacking and threshing grain; temperatures and ranges are very dry and in need of rain; temperature above normal.

Boise, Ada county: Good progress in all farm operations, except prunes; harvest, which has been greatly retarded by lack of care; two-thirds of prunes still on the trees; third cutting alfalfa well up.

Twin Falls, Twin Falls county: Week hot and dry until last two days; hot weather burning apples and plums; haying with head lettuce; a few farmers

digging potatoes, but many will not dig at present. Many are cutting hay mostly cut and some stacked bean and clover seed; threshing advanced rapidly.

IOWA VETERAN HEAD OF G. A. R.

Judge J. W. Willett of Tama Elected National Commander in Chief

DES MOINES, Iowa, Sept. 28 (AP)—Judge J. W. Willett of Tama, Iowa, was elected commander-in-chief of the Grand Army of the Republic at this afternoon's business session of the annual convention being held here. He was unopposed.

Judge Willett was the unanimous choice of the 500 representatives on the floor of the convention hall. He was elected by acclamation under sponsorship of ruler.

Commander-in-Chief Willett is the first naval veteran to be elected as head of the G. A. R. Among the other national officers elected this afternoon were: Dr. George T. Harding of Marion, Ohio, father of President Harding, as surgeon general. Other officers elected follow: O. S. Brockhart of San Antonio, Texas, leader vice-commander; C. V. Gardner, Rapid City, S. D., junior vice-commander, and the Rev. J. H. Eppler of Gary, Ind., chaplain-in-chief.

Captain of National League Champions Given Credit for Being Greatest of Them All

NEW YORK, Sept. 28 (AP)—Out on the field directing the defensive play that neither John McGraw, the manager, nor his first assistant, Hughson, could do from their places on the bench, all season has been Dave Bancroft, field-explaining the Giants to another pennant.
