JEROME WINS BATTLE WITH GOODING MEN

North Side Teams Put Up a Splendid Exhibition at Lincoln Field; Weight of Players Decisive Factor

The Jerome high school football team defeated the Gooding high school team Wednesday afternoon at Lincoln field by the score of 18 to 0. For the second time in a week Gooding has fallen before the heavier Gooding line. It is regular scheduled game at Jerome last Friday by the score of 18 to 0. Gooding has a much lighter team than Jerome, and consequently failed to hold, when Jerome got busy with Jerome.

Jerome made a touchdown in the first quarter, when Taylor blocked a punt on the 20 yard line. Hard line plunging carried the ball over the line for the first carrier. On a fake kick formation, Jerome was able to take the ball over for the extra point. In the second quarter, a series of forward passes, combined with some excellent end work by Park, gave the Jerome team their second touchdown. Jerome placed kick the goal, giving them 18 points. This ended the scoring for the remainder of the game, although the Gooding side were within striking distance several times.

For Jerome, the work of Turley, Schag, and O'Rourke is worthy of special attention. It was the spirit man of the Jerome school, and a wonderful man on defensive play. Schag is a player of no mean ability, and is the place kick man of the team. His effort at trying to place kick on the 40 yard line was a neat piece of work. His kick hit the cross bar, and rebounded back. In every play, Schag was by far the best man on the Jerome line. O'Rourke does most of the line plunging for the team and seems adept for just such style of work.

Gooding stars were Park, Good well and G. Prince. This trio of back field men did exceptionally well concerning the lightness of their line. The first quarter brought out the fact that Jerome was a bit the stronger on line plunges, and kept at that method of attack, mixing in a forward pass now and then. A 20 yard forward pass, O'Rourke to Schag, was a feature of this section. Jerome scored one of their two touchdowns in this period, the scoring resulting from a block kick and line plunging.

Aerial Plays Tried
The second quarter showed Jerome trying aerial plays for long gains. Turley, Schag, and O'Rourke were the main players in this section. The third quarter was the most exciting of the afternoon. Jerome got going to within one yard of the goal line, only to fall in getting the ball over. On the last down they attempted to place kick which also failed to bring home the bacon.

The last quarter found the ball in Gooding's possession most of the time, and although they seemed to brace up, the necessary punch was missing several times. Gooding used a good many passes in this section, and made long gains. Jerome, however, always got through the line when they attempted end runs and line plunges.

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WOULD ENLIST COUNTY IN FIGHT ON TUBERCULOSIS

Dr. W. A. Sullivan Tells of Campaigns Elsewhere to Eradicate Cattle Disease

In connection with proposals for extending to Twin Falls county the campaign for eradication of tuberculosis in cattle in which the state and federal governments are co-operating with commonwealths of Massachusetts and Vermont, Dr. W. A. Sullivan, representative of the federal bureau of animal industry in Idaho, is here for a few days this week.

With the close of the campaign in Bonnevillie county about October 15, Dr. Sullivan stated, the co-operating veterinarians will transfer the scene of operations to Lemhi county, where every range and dairy animal will be tested for tuberculosis. Appropriations have been made by the commissioners of both counties to meet a share of the expense involved.

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Sun Shines 27 Days—Out of 30 in Month of September Here

There were no cloudy days in Twin Falls county in the month of September, according to records of Marion Hammons government weather observer here. Out of three days were recorded as partly cloudy and 27 were clear. There was a total of one one-hundredth of an inch of precipitation and 44 fell on September 24, in connection with a thunderstorm.

Minimum temperature for the month of September was 29 degrees on the third and twentieth days of the month and maximum at 89—the first killing frost of the season was recorded on September 29 and 30. A light frost was observed on the morning of the eighth day of the month.

Average maximum temperature for the month was 61.5 degrees, and the mean minimum was 41.4 degrees.

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SEEKS COURT ORDER TO DENY HUSBAND'S CALLS

Wife Goes to Law to Erect Barrier Following "Certain Differences and Disputes"

Alleging that as a result of certain disputes and differences, she was forced to leave their home last week and take up her residence with her daughter in Twin Falls, Mrs. Ella Shaw, 54, has appeared to the district court here for an order to restrain her husband, Sidney D. Shaw, from molesting or in any manner bothering or disturbing her peace and quietude. Division of the property has been effected, Mrs. Shaw says, but her husband refuses to take her decision to leave home seriously, and "persistently calls for the purpose of annoying, harassing and disturbing" her, thereby causing her to become nervous and ill.

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Idaho Growers Send Selected Potatoes to Legion's Convention

Twelve hundred selected Idaho potatoes each weighing exactly two pounds, were shipped to the legion convention here last week from Twin Falls to be given to the legionnaires.

These potatoes were selected by the legionnaires from the legionnaires' potato fields in the county.
