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# IS OPPOSED TO CANCELLATION OF OLD DEBTS

### Theodore E. Burton, Member of Allied-Debt Commission, Makes Strong Statement as to Proposed Compromise

WASHINGTON, Oct. 9 (AP)—A strong declaration made today by Representative Theodore E. Burton, republican, Ohio, a member of the allied debt commission, against any cancellation of the debts of European nations to the United States. His statement to this effect made unanimous opinion on the question of all American delegates to the inter-parliamentary union conference which will meet in London Oct. 15.

Representative Burton conferred after campaigning for Ohio, will return here for the meeting this month of the allied debt commission with Great Britain's financial representatives. "There are many reasons why the allied debts should not be cancelled," said Representative Burton. "First, they are binding obligations, a national debt and their cancellation would throw doubt on national credit, which is an all-important part of all commercial and industrial enterprises."

Sacrifices Entailed. "Second, these loans were not made from an abundant resource, but were obtained by borrowing from our people with no small difficulty and with great cost of sacrifice. There was no thought at the time that they would not be repaid and indeed, the law under which our people took bonds provided for their redemption in kind."

"Third, the United States is sincerely interested in world peace. If these debts were cancelled, it would be a precedent for the cancellation of national and naval establishments of other countries and thereby bring a threat of war and all the waste of conflict."

Another recommendation of the increase in the debt of the United States as a result of the war is greater than that of the borrowers. The increase in taxation is in proportionally greater.

Further, while we recognize the wonderful sacrifices made by the allied nations during the war, we were more fortunate and we have gained no territory and are not expending any large amount of money in the future. The burden is that these debts ought to be paid."

Against Further Loans. Mr. Burton also declared against any further national loans abroad, adding that the United States treasury should not be called upon again to aid foreign governments except possibly for human relief.

He did not appear to be impressed by the league of nations, several of his meetings at which were attended. "It seemed like a big debating society," he said, declaring that a number of important matters were discussed. He seemed to be receiving undue attention.

## Near East Conference for Venice

## MARKED CHANGE RECOMMENDED

### Conferences of Judges Held in Florida Favors Proposition of Majority Verdicts

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., Oct. 9 (AP)—Recommendation that the state's legal code be amended so that "majority verdicts" in both criminal and civil cases would suffice, was contained in the report of circuit judges who met here at the call of Governor Cary A. Hardee, to formulate a proposed revision to the legislature at its next session.

The judges recommended that in cases where a jury of 12 men is required, the verdict of eleven be accepted while in panels of six men, the opinion of five should prevail. Under the present state law, all except capital cases are tried by juries of six men.

Another recommendation deals with present procedure under which a judge is automatically disqualified in a case where two electors sign affidavits that he is prejudiced. The judges suggested that the presiding judge be allowed to sit in judgment of himself in determining whether he would be prejudiced if the allegations set forth in the two affidavits were true.

As an effort to lawfully the freeing of law violators on technicalities the judges' conference proposed that the state be given the right to appear from the judgment of lower courts where cases are dismissed on demurrer, quashed indictments, or the like.

The provision in the code that counsel for the defendant shall have the last argument before the jury when the defendant does not take the stand, should be eliminated in the proposed changes. The conference also adopted

Governor Hardee's suggestion that the jury selection method be established by establishment in each county of a jury commission who would draw up for prospective jury service the names of not less than 200 nor more than 500 qualified "male" persons. This will allow of improving the personnel of juries.

No provision has been made in this act yet for service on juries of women. The present law also would be amended to allow the removal of trial to another county of criminals when, in the opinion of the governor, circuit judge or sheriff, a trial would not be secured in the immediate community.

For the sake of convenience, ironing boards are raised only a few inches from the ground, and, however strange the method may seem, the work is done well and expeditiously.

## SCREEN PLAYERS MEET EXCITING EXPERIENCE

Yosemite National Park Offers Splendid Opportunities for Winter Pictures Occasional Handicaps

YOSEMITE, Cal., Oct. 9 (AP)—Motion picture companies, always welcome at Yosemite National Park, find winter conditions here admirably suited for pictures of life in Alaska and other parts of the far north. One company last winter wanted real floor on a real lake, with snow background, and their wish was granted at Mirror Lake, where some ice was chopped loose and towed across the lake to give a drifting effect.

A complete Alaskan dog team spent several weeks here last winter and one company bought a wolf. Motion picture companies are attracted to the streams into the park for use in their work, although the general public is barred from doing so. A striking experience was had by one company which came in here for a winter picture. The company wanted snow in the high country, so the actors' baggage, dressed in white, were hauled across the floor of the valley where their hotel was located, up the cliffs to Glacier Point, 2,254 feet high. A storm came up and the company would have been lost without Forrest S. Tompkins, chief ranger. Some of the company were out, nearly blind, when they were rescued by the men of trail and Yosemite and a leading lady crawled on her hands and knees for the last two miles.

Made Good Pictures. Despite the hardships, the indomitable director saw his chance, however, and filmed the scene. Motion picture men say the pictures of that

trip, were among the finest winter pictures ever made. Summer scenes are made by the dozen here, where companies find Alpians, meadows, wooded stretches of pine and fir, cascades in the Merced river, pools where reflections are like a mirror, roads broad and smooth of narrow and pitching as the route to some old western mining town, picturesque bridges and trails which cling to the edges of the cliffs.

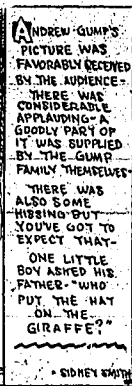
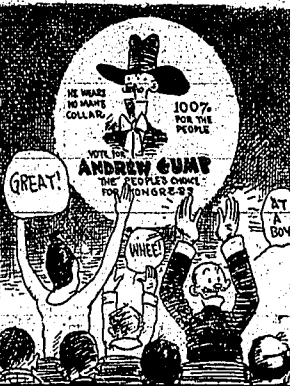

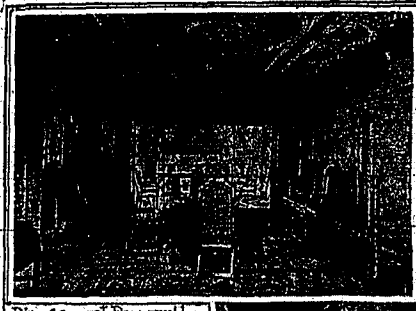

The girl said Schneider had appeared worried, ever since the shooting, and on two occasions had asked her to go to Perth Amboy with him.

Pearl also showed reporters a note she said she had received from Schneider's wife on Monday following the finding of the bodies. It read:

"You will pardon my writing to you, but I want to tell you to let your husband know. When this case comes to trial I am going to beat you to it."
