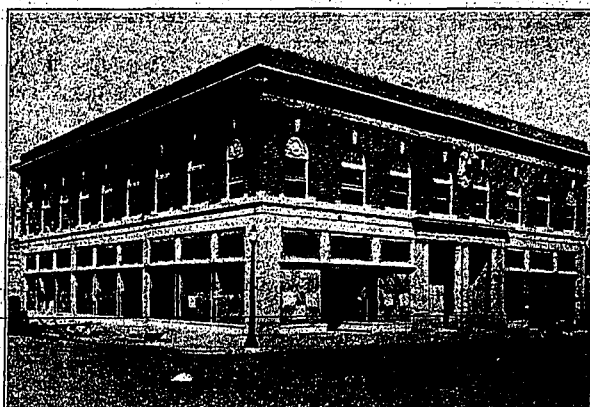

The clash this year will be on MacLean field, Friday, October 20, and will be observed as the home-coming day for all Idaho alumni and former students.

Against the heavier University of Washington team, in the first coast conference game for both institutions, the Idaho Vandals displayed a style but will try something new in the line of defensive playing at which the old football head, predicting a Washington victory by at least 20 points, marveled. Construction of Additional Seats for Football Class to Accommodate 5000 Fans

BOISE, Oct. 18.—In order to provide seats for 5000 fans at the Armistice Day football game between the Universities of Utah and Idaho at Boise, big new bleachers are being erected at Cody park. Last year and the year before the big university game was played at the fair grounds west of town. The change is being made this year to provide a more central location and better advantage for spectators. The fair grounds the playing field was across the race track from the grandstand. DEPARTURE OF BUREAU CHIEF IS UNHERALDED

American Legion Delegates Treated to Surprise with Announcement of Withdrawal of Colonel Forbes

NEW ORLEANS, Oct. 18, (AP)—Something of a surprise was thrown into convention circles late today when it became known that Colonel G. H. Forbes, director of the United States veterans bureau, who came here upon the invitation of Harford MacNider, national commander of the American Legion, and who was to address the convention tomorrow morning upon the work of his organization, had suddenly left New Orleans and returned to Washington.

Colonel Forbes had with him his entire staff. He made no public statement as to the reasons for his disappearance, nor did he intimate whether the action was taken solely on his own responsibility.

It had been openly charged by William F. Deegan, of New York, commander of the legion in his state, and announced candidate for national commander, that Colonel Forbes actually had come to the convention by direction of President Harding in an effort to procure the selection of an man for national commander who would maintain a lukewarm attitude toward proposed national legislation for a soldier bonus.

Kenauw M. Landis, supreme commander of the national legion, was introduced by Commander MacNider as the man who, in his opinion, most nearly typified the Rooseveltian tradition. A grand ovation of applause greeted Mr. Landis when he took the stage.

Make Characteristic Speech. Having carefully moved from his vicinity all the fixtures within reach of his emphatic arm, following a near mishap to one of the magnifying Mr. Landis tore into the convention with one of his characteristic speeches, which warmed the hearts of the legionnaires and brought them to their feet several times.

OFFICIAL SPEED RECORD SET AT SELFRIDGE FIELD

Reader: General Mitchell Maintains Average of 224 Miles an Hour in Curtis Machine

MOUNT CLEMENS, Mich., Oct. 18, (AP)—Brigadier General Mitchell, chief of the United States army-air service today set a new "official" world's speed record when he flew over a one kilometer course at Selfridge field at an average speed of 224.05 miles an hour in four laps. The test was timed by representatives of the Federation Aeronautique Internationale, thus making Mitchell the first man to make a world's speed record.

General Mitchell drove the army Curtiss plane which last week won the Pulitzer speed trophy and in of the fabric of the envelope, where a handling guy was fastened, was not driven unofficially at a speed of 248.5 strong enough to endure the strain miles an hour. While Lieutenant Maughan's speed at that time was faster than that made today and was under United States army regulations, no representative of the Federation Aeronautique Internationale were present, a fact that prevented his marking as an official world's speed record.

BOSTON, Oct. 18 (AP)—The liberal republican league of Massachusetts, formed several months ago with the avowed purpose of "permanently" dissolving the republican party in the state, decided at a meeting here to support William A. Guston, democratic candidate for United States senator, the preamble of the resolution adopted was:

"The overwhelming moral and political basis of the present senatorial campaign in the liberal republican party of Massachusetts is the imperialist and of imperialism Henry Cabot Lodge from the position of leadership that he now occupies in the republican party and the ascension of a new liberal, forward looking leadership which will redempt our party from its present reactionary bondage and make possible its reorganization in accordance with the principles of Lincoln and Roosevelt."

WEAK MATERIAL CAUSE OF LOSS

Investigation Into Wreck of Army Dirigible Fixes Blame for Accident

BAY ANTONIO, Texas, Oct. 18 (AP)—A board of officers at Brooks field tonight completed the investigation of the destruction of the army dirigible C-14 on Tuesday morning, which resulted in injuries to seven passengers and members of the crew.

"That a part of the fabric of the envelope, where a handling guy was fastened, was not strong enough to endure the strain miles an hour. While Lieutenant Maughan's speed at that time was faster than that made today and was under United States army regulations, no representative of the Federation Aeronautique Internationale were present, a fact that prevented his marking as an official world's speed record."

Air service officials here, who were witnesses, agreed that if the structure of the ship had not been weak, the 15 mile gale would not have caused damage. Photographs in possession of the board show that a six foot square section of the envelope was torn out with one of the handling guys.

After three guide ropes gave way the ship broke away from the ground. The report says that the dirigible was destroyed by fire a few seconds later.

The board was headed by Lieutenant Colonel A. G. Fisher and included two members of the O-2 crew, Captain G. W. McIntire and Lieutenant Donald Hutchins. The report will be forwarded to the chief of the air service in Washington.

MINE LEADERS INVITED TO SIT

United States Coal Commission Begins Work by Sending for John L. Lewis

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18 (AP)—The United States coal commission, created by congress to investigate and report the facts on all phases of the coal industry, at its first meeting today organized by selecting John May Hammond chairman and laid out a program for future operation.

As a preliminary step, the commission subpoenaed John L. Lewis, president of the United Mine Workers of America; A. M. Ogil, president of the National Coal Association, representing coal operators, and S. D. Warren, who has served as mediator of the policy questions of anthracite mine operators, asking all three to attend in conference with the commission next week for the purpose of suggesting methods of procedure.

In addition, those invited are asked to suggest the names of representatives of their respective industries who might assist the commission in the work.

After the meeting, Mr. Hammond, with his associates, George Otto Smith, director of the geologic survey (Clark Howell) secretary of the Atlantic (Georgia) Constitution) Federal Judge Alexander of Chicago, Charles P. Noll, and three other members of the commission, will hold a formal call upon President Harding at the White House, New York, the next day.

The report is required by law to be made to congress on or before January 1, and is authorized to employ such personnel as may be necessary.

The sole object of the commission, said a statement issued by its members, "is declared at the meeting to be to endeavor to determine the essential facts touching the coal industry to the end that practical measures may be found to insure a complete supply of coal at the most economical price as far as possible and as consistent with fair wages and profits to those engaged in the industry."

The commission from time to time will make public its findings of fact with a view of informing the public as to the causes of the coal shortage, and before its final report are submitted to the president and congress.

A SUCCESSIONFUL SUIT. With the granting of an order of dismissal in district court to Attorney H. O. Mills, acting on behalf of E. F.
