LABOR AIMS STIR FEARS IN ENGLAND

Bonar Law Issues List of Principal Members of New Ministry, While Country Seethes With Election Campaigning

LONDON, Oct. 24. (AP)—Premier Bonar Law tonight issued a list of the principal members of his ministry. His own name is not mentioned in the official list, which leaves it to be inferred that he takes no other office than that of prime minister and first lord of the treasury, the latter being a post with only nominal duties beyond those attending to the premiership.

Lord Curzon retained his post as secretary for foreign affairs and will be leader of the house of lords. Viscount Lytton retains the Indian secretaryship. Stanley Baldwin, who has not yet been announced whether he will be leader in the house of commons.

Throughout the nation plans are being made to honor Theodore Roosevelt on his birthday anniversary, October 27. In this house in East Twentieth street, New York city, the president was born. 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LANE LETTERS DESCRIBE WAR CABINET ACTS

Former President's Reactions to Street of Tremendous Problems Are Told in History Making Correspondence

BOSTON, Oct. 24. (AP)—A series of history making letters, describing in detail the American war cabinet and giving an intimate picture of Woodrow Wilson as he appeared while presiding over the secret meetings of his official family was made public today.

The letters, written by the late Franklin K. Lane, secretary of the interior in the cabinet of President Wilson from 1913 to 1920, have been collected and edited by his widow, Anna Wintermute Lane and have been published by Houghton Mifflin company. The volume is just off the press.

ORAL TEACHING CALLED LATEST I. W. W. POLICY

Witness in Trial of Ten Men Under California Syndicalism Law Bares Organization Methods and War Record

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Oct. 23. (AP)—Testimony that the Industrial Workers of the World no longer teach books in books and pamphlets but are now using the word of mouth was given in a gripping court here today by W. E. Townsend, who said he formerly was a lieutenant of William (Big Bill) Hayward, head of the I. W. W. in California.

Townsend walked on the stand most of the day. He testified that he, as a trusted assistant of Hayward, had obtained employment on at least two occasions during the war, and that he had served in various branches of the military service, including the marines at Alton, Ill., and the 10th Cavalry, where several hundred members of the I. W. W. were employed at a Chicago packing house, where many of them, acting as inspectors, passed among the troops, and that the I. W. W. had been in the front lines of the middle west.

BRITAIN YIELDS TO FRENCH VIEW

Consents to Declare Germany in Default if She Refuses to Accept Reparations Plan

PARIS, Oct. 24. (AP)—A modification of Great Britain's position regarding reparations, indicated by Sir John Bradbury at a meeting of the reparations commission this afternoon, will make it possible for the commission to leave Paris for Berlin next Sunday with agreement on what measures will be imposed on Germany's financial administration for the purpose of averting a total collapse of her currency.

BOAT DOCKS WITH LIQUOR

United States Marine Seizes Five Gallons for Each of Three Docks and Seal from England

NEW YORK, Oct. 24. (AP)—The Federal Harding of the United States today arrested a steamer at New York bringing under lock and seal five gallons of brandy, which the captain had taken on board at Liverpool dock. Law enforcement officers, together with British agents, were on the ship when it was seized. The ship's supply of liquor was found in compliance with the provisions of the shipping laws, but the British board of trade, which requires that to comply with the law requiring ships to carry a gallon of liquor for each 100 tons cargo, passengers were aboard.

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# SHIP LINES TO CONTINUE FIGHT ON DRY RULING

### Supreme Court Will Be Asked to Issue Order Restraining Government from Enforcing Prohibition on Seas

WASHINGTON, Oct. 24 (AP)—The supreme court of the United States will be asked to issue an order restraining the government from enforcing the prohibition laws against transportation of liquor on foreign ships touching at American ports and on American ships outside of American coastal waters.

Administration officials indicated today that, even in the absence of a specific restraining order, the government would not be inclined to enforce strictly the liquor ruling promulgated by the department of justice so long as the legality was in doubt.

It was understood that enforcement action would be restricted to those regulations that a certain latitude was permissible, both as regards medicinal alcohol supplies and stocks designed for crews, in cases where such issuance was a legal requirement of their government or a long established custom.

# MASSACHUSETTS SOLON SEES DEMOCRATIC GAINS

### Senator Walsh Predicts Bourbon Victories in Unexpected Places

WASHINGTON, Oct. 24 (AP)—Predictions of "substantial Democratic gains" in the elections for both senate and house in states west of the Mississippi river were made in a statement by Senator Walsh of Massachusetts, chairman of the democratic senatorial campaign committee, upon his return from a tour through the west.

Specific claims were not made by Senator Walsh, but he stated the increase of democrats in the house would be particularly large.

"When we consider the senatorial situation," said Senator Walsh, "we find that the terms of eight democratic senators expire in 1923 and only two of which, Arizona and Montana, were to be contested at the next election. It is my opinion that the number of democratic senators from the west will be more than that lost this year."

Senator Walsh said that the party would make substantial gains because of "general disgust and disappointment of republicans and independent voters with the national and local republican administrations."

WAR UPON AUSTRALIANS' PENCHANT FOR GAMBLING. Antipodean Authorities Center Barring of Casinoes from Promiscuous Raffles and Lotteries.

SEVERAL aspects of gambling have come before the state of the Australian Commonwealth and the New South Wales government has outlined proposals to combat the gambling mania, especially promiscuous raffles and lotteries.

The new act calls for restrictions of the Tattersall Sweep and the Golden Casket, by which the Queensland government obtains money for the upkeep of its hospitals. It will be made an offense for newspapers to publish the result of these sweeps, punishable by a fine of 500 pounds, and the display upon any premises of any information regarding a lottery will be punishable by the same sentence.

The new act will restrict the sale of tickets to the man or the wife which the lottery is connected, and provides that any person concerned in a raffle or lottery who converts to his own use any of the prizes of money raised shall be liable to five years' imprisonment.

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# DEMOCRATS MAY TAKE PLACE ON SUPREME BENCH

### Minority Leaders at Capital Expect President to Name One of Their Party to Succeed Justice Day

WASHINGTON, Oct. 24 (AP)—Associate Justice William B. Day, of the supreme court, placed his resignation today in the hands of President Harding to take effect November 14, and it was accepted. By resigning Justice Day will be able to devote his undivided attention to his duties as umpire on the American-German claims commission. His motion will have the effect of placing him on the retired list of the court on full pay.

By delaying the date upon which his resignation will become operative, Justice Day will be eligible to participate with the other members of the court during the three weeks recess preceding the next meeting of the court on November 13, in conference for the decision of cases which have been argued at this term.

Democrat Expected. In official democratic circles here, there is an belief that the vacancy will be filled by the appointment of a democrat. When Justice Clarke, who was a democrat when appointed, recently resigned, he was succeeded by Justice Sutherland, a republican.

Appointed by McKinley. Justice Day, who is 75 years old, was introduced to national life by President McKinley, who brought him to Washington from Ohio in 1897 as assistant secretary of state. He soon succeeded to the post of secretary of state, but in a few months resigned to become chairman of the American peace commission to Paris at the close of the war with Spain. He was appointed to the supreme court by President Roosevelt in 1902. Justice Day has been regarded by the bench and bar as one of the most valuable members of the supreme court. By delivering his opinions on the United States-Mexico and Southern Pacific cases, and in the dissenting opinion in which Justice Brandeis and Chief Justice Taft dissented from the Steel corporation case, decided in March, 1919, when the court decided against the steel trust, Justice Day has become a prominent figure in the history of the supreme court.

# POSTAL TWINE WOULD GO AROUND GLOBE FIFTY-FOUR TIMES

### WASHINGTON, Oct. 24 (AP)—Enough twine to encircle the earth more than thirteen times is wasted by the post office department.

It has been called for 4,000,000 pounds of twine in only half a year's supply used by the department throughout the entire service.

The twine is put up in balls weighing a half pound each; the order will consist of 5,000,000 balls. As each ball contains 500 yards, there will be 800,000,000 in the lot or 840,000 miles of twine.

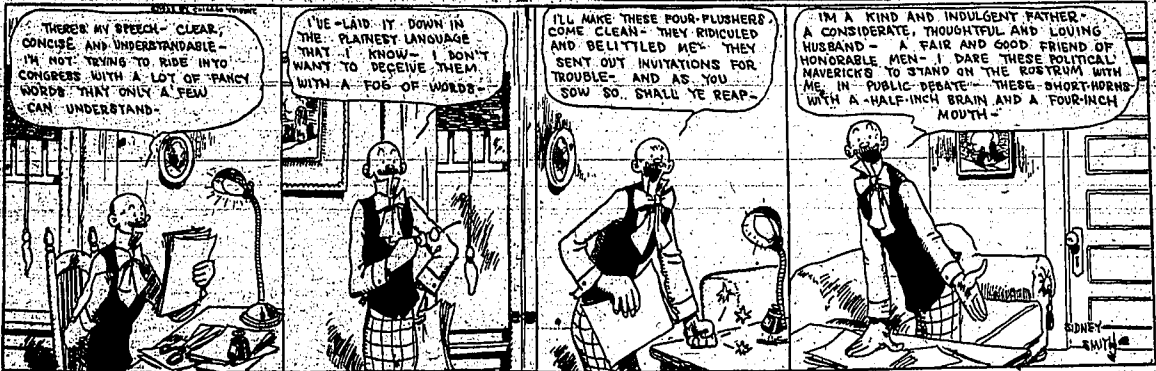

LATIN-AMERICAN PACT PROPOSED

United States Invites Neighbor Governments to Send Plenipotentiaries to Conference

WASHINGTON, Oct. 24 (AP)—The United States has invited the governments of Guatemala, Nicaragua, Honduras, San Salvador and Costa Rica to send plenipotentiaries to a conference in Washington beginning December 4, for a discussion of matters looking to the well being of Central America, the "result thereof to be embodied in a treaty for the permanent relations of their mutual interests and rights." The state department, in making this announcement, said the American legations at the capitals of the five Central American republics were instructed on October 21 to extend to the presidents of those countries invitations to the conference. The conference, it was explained, was expected to be attended by plenipotentiaries from each of the five countries making effective provisions of the treaties signed at Washington on December 20, 1907, "which experience has shown to be effective in maintaining friendly relations and cooperation among the Central American states," to consider measures "for the limitation of armament in Central America," to attempt the working out of a plan for settling the boundary disputes for the adjustment of disputes under certain circumstances between two or more of the countries—and to take up any other questions which they may be unanimously decided to consider.

PRODIGY ABANDONS GAME WHEN COURT INTERFERES

Boy Chess Wonder Enters On Studies Under Direction of New York Magistrate

NEW YORK, Oct. 24 (AP)—Samuel Reschewsky, the 10-year old Polish chess prodigy, who hopes that the world may hear of him some day as a brilliant scholar as well as a champion chess player of the world, had his start on the study of the Talmud interrupted by an order to appear in court on a charge of being without proper guardianship. The little Polish chess star was released on \$1,000 bail, and on the promise to Judge Levy that he would not move a pawn until next Tuesday, when a further hearing of his case will be held. "Gee, this sure is some country," said Sammy, as he left the court, when they "wont" even let you play chess. I bet I could give that old man's society man odds of a knight and beat him." PUBLIC HEALTH WORK INCREASES

Red Cross Points Out Need of Continuous Support for Enlarged Scope of Service

WASHINGTON, Oct. 24 (AP)—Great increase in the amount of work done by the American Red Cross in the field of public health through its nursing service, home hygiene and care of the sick course, nutrition activities, first aid and life saving classes, health centers and other numerous methods, is disclosed in the annual report of the organization for the past fiscal year, which has just been issued. "Emphasizing Necessity. The increasing establishment of services that broadcast among the people approved health conservation and disease prevention information emphasizes the necessity of continuous support through a world-wide response to the annual roll call of the society from November 11 to 20, the report states. The war time nursing service of the American Red Cross, when 19,877 nurses were furnished for active duty, has not been allowed to overshadow the society's peace time nursing service. Since 1921 there has been an increase of more than 1000 nurses on the reserve lists available for duty at any call. The total number now aggregates 35,835 nurses. Of this reserve list are serving with the army, 117 nurses, 102 with the navy, 102 with the public health service and 1083 with the United States veterans' bureau. (Three) Red Cross nurses died during the past year from disabilities incurred in service in the late war. Notes New Fields. Last year the society established 510 new public nursing services, as many communities making a total of 918 communities in the United States, Alaska, the Philippines, Porto Rico, Hawaii and the Virgin Islands, featuring and demonstrating in public health, education, as well as nursing. In the home visiting and nursing service more than 2,000,000 visits were made by nurses, visits to school totaled 140,000, and in six months 1,250,000 school children were inspected by these nurses, who, in all cases of physical defects advised physicians' care to parents. NAVAL FUEL IS STILL PROBLEM FOR JAPANESE

Wants Prospects for Oil Development at Home Overseas Reduction in Consumption

TOKYO, Oct. 24 (AP)—With all the drastic military and naval reductions that may be realized, the question of naval fuel pending before the government will remain as far from solution as before, states an authority. The government long has been striving for the realization of self-sufficiency but what with the gradual diminishment of the annual output in this country and with the waning prospects of the oil possibilities now under experimental exploitation, the government will for a long time yet have to cling to the old policy of hoarding imported oil, this authority said. The domestic output amounted some years ago to about 450,000 tons per annum, but the amount has dropped to less than 300,000 tons. So considerable portion of this output is required to light off that "very little fuel can be obtained out of this limited domestic product. The repeated experimental boring in the oil fields in Formosa has completely failed and the similar attempt in Sachalin has so far been attended with no more reassuring result. Under these circumstances the government has decided to employ several additional special service vessels for the import of fuel oil, mostly from Borneo. The import from America this year amounts already to 100,000 tons and from Borneo to 350,000 tons. READ THE CLARIFIED A.D.G.

SUGGESTS NEW USES FOR FRUITS NOW DISCARDED

Federal Chemists Offer Assist-ance to Citrus Producers in Overcoming Waste

WASHINGTON, Oct. 24 (AP)—How to turn waste into profit is the subject of a circular of the agricultural department prepared by the bureau of chemistry to aid producers of oranges, grapefruit, lemons and lemons' what usually suffer great loss in bruised, ungraded and oversized fruit. The circular gives directions for the commercial manufacture of grapefruit juice, orange vinegar, citrate of lime, candied grapefruit and orange-peel, marmalades of various kinds, jellies and butters, which can be obtained free from the department. Since vinegar made from oranges is quite as satisfactory as that made of apples, orange vinegar might well be substituted. It is shown, especially in regions where many call oranges would otherwise be wasted. Citrate of lime is a favorite among the refreshing juices on the market. It is not so well suited to home manufacture as other citrus fruit by-products because of the necessary apparatus. However, it should be possible to prepare grapefruit juice on a small scale in the home if desired, by means of a hand-cranked press. Candied grapefruit and orange peel makes an excellent center for chocolates and also serves as a substitute

for citron in baking. Candied orange peel may be mixed with lard for cakes or with dough for cookies. It may also replace shredded coconut in home made candies and fresh orange peel in marmalade. Many firms now use similar products instead of citron in making mince-meat. Orange butter, especially with a small amount of grapefruit pulp added may be a new product to many people. 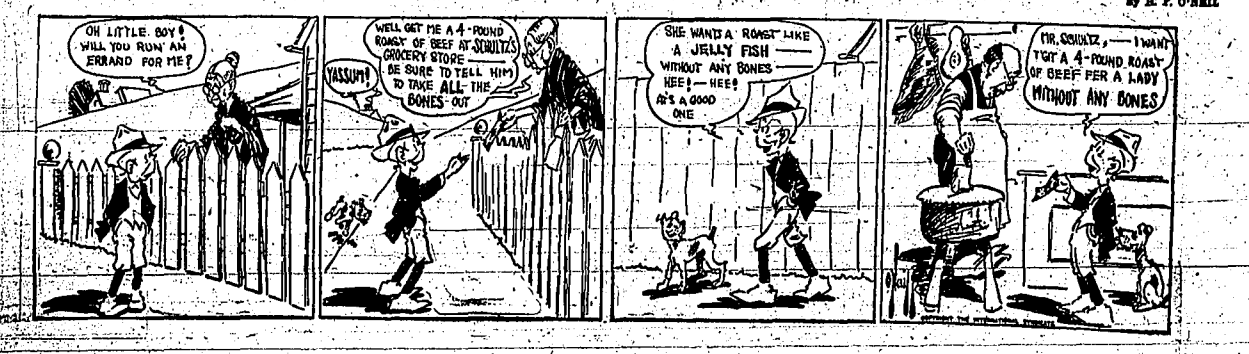
