

UNITED STATES WILL SIT IN AT PEACE PARLEYS

America Will Send Observer to Near East Conference But Will Not Be Signatory to Treaty to be Evolved

WASHINGTON. Oct. 25 (AP)—The United States probably will be represented at the Near East peace conference by an official observer. There is virtually no chance that the Washington government will participate directly in the conference, however, or be a signatory of the treaty of peace to be evolved.

American Policy Unchanged.

Decisions of allied governments to invite American participation as a party to the peace negotiations, it can be said at present, find the attitude of the Washington government unchanged. While the reply to the invitation can be formulated only after the invitation has been received, probably tomorrow, there is no reason to doubt what it will be. The American answer will be: "The American policy of standing aloof from European political tangles and of confining itself strictly to questions in which it has a direct interest, commercial or otherwise such as the Turkish straits, has undergone a change."

Invited Through Embassies.

Paris dispatches indicate that the invitation will be presented to the Secretaries of State of the United States, French and Italian embassies in Washington. That it will be met with every courtesy, is to be expected. At the same time, however, the embassies will be very fully advised that as a non-aligner in the war between the Allies and Turkey, the United States feels that it cannot have any direct share in a peace conference to bring that war to an end.

America Cannot Stand Aloof.

American interests are too deeply involved in the final solution of the problem of the Turkish straits, however, and also in the immunities that American citizens shall enjoy in Turkey, to permit the United States to neglect the religious matters to permit the Washington government to stand wholly aside from the peace parley.

HAPSBURG PROPERTIES BEING TURNED TO CASH

Benefits of Sale and Lease of Former Court Buildings to War Invalids

VIENNA. Oct. 26 (AP)—The liquidation of the vast Hapsburg holdings in Austria, with the exception of the possessions, considered private, will be completed shortly, and the final report is expected to show the disposal of valuable assets at many millions of crowns. Most of the funds realized through the sale and the leasing of former court buildings will be used for the benefit of war invalids.

The large reduction in territory now under the government of Austria has greatly diminished the amount of space required for administrative purposes, and many blocks of office buildings have been rented to private individuals.

The possessions considered as private were bequeathed to the Emperor Francis Joseph, Empress Elisabeth, and the late Emperor Karl by foreign monarchs, Austrian cities and communities.

Included in the sale: A large number of easily valued clocks, pictures, and chinaware; the "Czar's present," a magnificent robe and a leather chair given to the Emperor of China, were among the objects sold to foreigners, particularly Italians, who paid large amounts for their purchases.

The old and new court palaces; the court stables; and a number of famous castles, villas and estates in the provinces were the principal buildings sold.

CHARGES: GREEKS WITH DEVASTATING THRACE

Kemal's Representative Takes Issue With Statement That Evacuation Was Without Disorders

CONSTANTINOPLE. Oct. 26 (AP)—Immett Boy, the Kemalist representative, issued a statement today, calling the Greeks "a destructive force" of Turkey in their withdrawal.

"General Harrington," he said, "was deceived if he thinks the Greeks had done no harm." He assured us that the Greeks had been a curse to Turkey.

"Our information is otherwise."

The national government has notified the international Red Cross committee that the Greeks must release all Turkish civil prisoners immediately or the Turks will declare all Greek civilians in Anatolia war prisoners.

LIVESTOCK EXPOSITION TO CLOSE ENTRIES SOON

Management of International Livestock Show to Handle Large Infusion of Exhibits

CHICAGO. Oct. 26 (AP)—Entries in the individual classes of the International Livestock Exposition, to be held here for the first week in December, will close November 1, according to an announcement by the management.

"In order to be ample prepared for the influx of thousands of cattle, horses, sheep and swine which exhibitors will bring from all parts of the country, it has been found expedient to close the entry books a month before the opening day," said the statement. "Stockmen contemplating sending animals should make their applications immediately."



CANADIAN BOAT AGAIN
FISHERMAN'S CHAMPION

Bluenose Scores Second Success in Third Official Race Against Challenger

GLOUCESTER, Mass., Oct. 26 (UPI)—The schooner Bluenose of Canada, is again champion of the international fishing fleet. Captain Angus Walters and his fellow Lunenburgers today scored a second success against the Henry Ford, American challenger, and Captain Clayton Morrisey and his crew of Gloucestermen. The margin was one of seven minutes, 51 seconds, about the same as the Bluenose lead of yesterday. While the Gloucester boat, in fact, won two races, the first was declared unofficial.

Captain Morrisey took little part in today's activities because of recurring illness. In his place, Captain Al Malloch, one of Gloucester's best drivers, took the wheel much of the time. Today's was another smashing contest. A northerner who ran from a moderate speed at the start up to 28 knots, blew the boats about the forty-mile course to the fastest time attained to date, four hours, 20 minutes, 28 seconds. The Bluenose fast boat, 26 minutes, 22 seconds for the Henry Ford. This was an average speed for the winning schooner of 7.8 minutes to the mile, speedily with a one mile boat to windward, including a third of a mile of extra sailing.

GERMAN MARRIAGES LESS

Berliner Shows Large Decrease of Number of New Homes Established During Year

BERLIN, Oct. 26 (UPI)—The number of marriages and births in Germany for the first quarter of 1922 show a large decrease over the same period of 1921. According to the statistics just issued, the number of marriages during these three months was 84 per thousand persons as against 104 for last year. The number of births was 25.6 as compared to 27.7, and the number of deaths was 18.5 as against 18.9 in 1921.

The corresponding quarter for the year 1918 showed marriages were 0.2 higher and deaths 1.0 less.

BOISE, Oct. 26—Sixty-five thousand tickets were placed on sale today for the Idaho-Utah football game at Boise.

ROOSEVELT.

That which we call American is the essence of many contraries. The legend of a Washington or of a Lincoln is the memorial of the past which gives life through interpretation, is our Today.

Theodore Roosevelt, whose birth occurred just 63 years ago, contributed his character to the national expression. Far greater than the more political success of his career is the legend of that Roosevelt, faults as it may be wrong sometimes and right often, who was so vigorous a prophet of virile manhood and constructive citizenship.

Timo softens the memories of animosities; Roosevelt, not yet far distant from us, has some still to destroy him. But time has that way of etching its permanent pictures from a blur of contradictions. Today the Roosevelt of national memory already is taking on sharper line, the figure becomes more rugged, the tense expression more compelling, the whole embodiment something of greater and enduring youthfulness than that day when his quick passing shocked the world.

From the best of these, the Roosevelt's and the others, comes our heritage. Each age expresses itself through its leaders, and, frequently, so little does the crowd know itself, is surprised at the quality of the echo. They bridge time for us, identifying the whole people, with those larger works their leadership enables them to achieve. He who leads most truly and is remembered most gratefully is he who was, even for an hour, the people and spoke their voice.

Such on more than one occasion was Theodore Roosevelt. The nation which accorded him the sublimity of that privilege recalls his devoted memory with abiding respect and affection. "The evil men do live after them; the good is oft interred with their bones"—a "fable" word in this land. Here we forgive honest ill and take that which is good to bulwark the foundations of our faith.

MODERATION THE NEED.

In declining to use argument and persuasion rather than brilliant onslaughts and recriminations in continuing his efforts for adjusted compensation for World War veterans, the American Legion adopted a policy of moderation that is based on common sense.

The fight for and against the bonus has developed too much bitterness. The campaign has been characterized by such phrases as "looter of the treasury," from one side, and "profiteers" and "ingrates" from the other. Nothing was gained for either side by this bitterness. Indeed, much was lost, for the controversy was shifted from the realm of reason to that of emotions.

The bonus question, like all others affecting the public interest, should be discussed and acted upon according to its merits, without regard to the motives of some of its supporters or opponents. When the issue is clouded with immaterial charges and counter-charges there is little hope of reaching a rational decision.

The Legion, in announcing its policy, did not criticize the president for vetoing the bonus measure, nor those who opposed its passage, recognizing, apparently, as most observers have, that their opponents in this matter are for the most part like the majority of the American Legion members, actuated by a sincere desire to serve the best interests of the country.

BORAH OFFERS ONLY HOPE IN PRIMARY VOTE

Idaho Senator Paints Dark Picture of Governmental Conditions in Address Here Before Packed House

The state-wide direct primary lifted the voters out of a rut of political helplessness and constitutes a weapon to be used by them when needed. Senator William E. Borah told an audience of 1,000 at the Hotel Idaho, the Lorraine theater last evening. The audience filled every available space in the theatre and hundreds remained standing during the two hours of Senator's address. "Many were turned away." The speaker was introduced by Senator L. C. Smith, a Republican state committee man, and other personal friends of Senator Borah.

Boches Personalities

Defining his position as one of fairness and containing no intentions of indulging in personalities, the distinguished speaker devoted most of his time to detailing national expenditures waste in government, political and industrial monopoly and closed with a forceful endorsement in favor of the state-wide primary.

Gallant points contained in his address:

"The state-wide primary will not only be force in Idaho after this election but it will be endorsed at the next state republican convention."

"Boches is responsible for Washington by the taxayers."

"The government can save millions of dollars by abolishing one-third of the present national bureaus."

"The Boches are not in Boise. They are in Washington and most of them are in office."

The speaker advised that as recent negotiations for remedies for existing conditions that the creation of unnecessary expense and bureaus be stopped and the national expenditures cut to the minimum in keeping with "one government" and that the voter assume themselves the responsibility of electing officials to represent him as offered by the direct primary system.

Capitalizes "Irregularity".

"We are spending about \$400,000,000 a year for our soldier veterans, but not one of us can disapprove of giving the veterans every benefit. But the joy-riding in the U.S. Senate must end. If there is to be any relief to the people, the people are entitled to have the people elected."

Senator Borah at this point quoted figures showing the per capita tax has increased, doubled or tripled in the states in the past four years and that the same states have experienced the same change. Idaho's per capita tax has increased from \$5 to \$15 and the state expenditures have increased from \$1,000,000 to \$3,000,000, he said.

In closing his discussion of expenditures, he said: "Not startling facts before the American people today and if expenditures continue for the next 25 years as they have in the last 25 years, the situation will be intolerable."

"It is not my desire to hamper or embarrass my party, but it is enough to give the party a chance to hold the problem. It will pass out of existence and another party will take its place and find a solution."

Attacks "Multiple Bureaus".

"As to remedies, first we must stop creating ways to spend money. One of our greatest nuisances is the number of bureaus we have at Washington. All you have to do now is to locate a bureau or two enough to represent the senators and representatives. Everybody is represented in Washington but the taxpayer, and it is high time for you to begin sending some telegrams."
