Hired Man on Average Farm a Hard Problem

Question of Single vs. Married Help Constitutes Food for Reflection for Agriculturists Over Country

BUILD, Oct. 23.—Editor Twin Falls Daily News: I am enclosing a clipping taken from Successful Farming in regard to labor on the farm, which I think a majority of the ranchers and farmers will find it well worth reading. I will appreciate it if you will print it in your paper.

The article referred to follows:

Married vs. Single Farm Help.

After years of experience with both single and married men we have arrived at the conclusion that almost without exception the married man gives better satisfaction.

On our farm we have need of a hand the year around, but we used to employ two single men for about seven months of the year. The reason for this is rather difficult to find a married man willing to contract to work only through the rainy and summer months with nothing in sight for the slack season of late fall and winter. We learned that to secure the best grade of married help we must contract to pay a certain sum for a year's labor, and in addition we must agree to give certain privileges not generally supposed to be extended to the average hired man.

We have learned that the married man is far more dependable than the single man in the sense that he is generally older, and age gives judgment. Another big thing in his favor is the fact that his interests are centered in the farm. How often do you hear a single hand say: "Our horses, our machinery, our cows, etc.?" Not very often, but the married man takes pride in discharging ownership.

For two years we have had a married man on our place and, everything considered, he has proved himself to be one we have ever employed, yet we pay him more than we would have to pay a single man.

We have this man a comfortable small house, a pen for chickens and pigs, a cow, a horse, an acre of land for truck patch and garden, and a share in the fruit.

Last season the truck patch produced a large quantity of the sweet potato which netted about over \$50. This was the first time the net of his small family. Three hogs, bought as pigs, were grown on weeds and also on the truck patch. These little achievements go a long way toward contentment and a contented man is a valuable man.

Single Man Less Dependable.

The greatest objection to the average single hand is that today he is here and tomorrow he is gone. No matter how well you may treat him he goes without notice and he is looking for a magic something he cannot describe, but still he looks for it.

Of course, you may find objections to the married man. You may imagine, and truly, too, that your children and his children will have their little quarrels your wife and his wife may have their squabbles and consequent heartburnings, but please remember that nothing is perfect, his wife and children may be as free as air as your wife and children may be your children scratching in the garden that started the fuss to begin with. It is no too big to get trifles out of between you and your interests. Twenty-five dollars spent for chicken fencing may be the means of picking up several hundred dollars in the long run.

The longer we live the more we realize that it is far from an easy matter to pick a good, all around farm helper. Pick the right man who solves nine-tenths of the farm help problem as it exists today. It is more difficult to pick the right man than it is to pick the right man for the entire life of the farm. And please do not get the mistaken idea into your mind that you do all the picking; he is who determines who you are to work for, if you are a man of your word, if you are good pay, and otherwise weighing you in the balance of his judgment. It is not always as easy matter to hire the best man for his looks before he begins.

The best way to keep a man after you get him in your place is to treat him exactly as you would want him to treat you if your positions were reversed. Give him a chance to be for you as well as for you. Pay him what he is worth and as his services increase in value to you raise his wages accordingly. Do not be miserly in paying for anything for nothing, and the longer a willing man stays with us the more he is worth. A big objection to the single man is the fact that the average single man becomes acquainted with the farm, our methods, the stock, etc., he has tied away to pasture now.

Do you remember your own old day when you were a boy and you had to study up something to do for your while he is in town.

Do you remember the right man play the game 99-50 and the chances are that he will stick with you until he has saved enough for a farm of his own.

HIGHER PRICED TURKEYS THANKSGIVING PROSPECT

Production Declines Steadily Although Demand Increases, Government Records Show

WASHINGTON, Oct. 27 (AP)—Forecast of high priced turkey this year are seen in agriculture department announcement that despite a steady increase in the price of turkey production has steadily decreased. The average price received during the four months, October to January, 1910-1910, was 15 cents a pound. The average price received during the same period of 1920-21 was 32 cents per pound, according to the department's figures.

In 1900 the census figures showed 6,000,000 turkeys on farms in the United States, while in 1910 there were only 3,833,708 and in 1920 there were 3,057,028. During the last six years the price of turkey has increased to the producer more than 100 per cent while during the past 20 years the number of turkeys produced has decreased about 50 per cent, the department adds.

The difficulties of raising turkeys is given as the reason for the production decrease. They are hard to raise, because of wandering propensities and a disease known as "blackhead," to which they are very prone. It is very difficult to ship live turkeys to market and when shipped dressed there is a large amount of shrinkage.

However, the risk of turkeys may be a very profitable occupation, where there is an abundance of range, ample food and reasonable freedom from predatory animals, the department adds.

SERIES OF CALAMITIES FORTUNE TELLERS BOON

Are Stricken Residents of Japanese Town Are Told Removal of Tree is Responsible for Deaths

TOKIO, Oct. 27 (AP)—Residents of Oyama-machi, a shop district of Tokio, being assailed by a series of deaths among the shop keepers, consulted fortune tellers as to the cause of the calamities. They were told that the deaths were caused by the cutting down of another gingko tree in the neighborhood. According to the story, the tree was cut down which was accustomed to meet clandestinely the female sex, was cut down to make room for the monopoly bureau, and its "spirit" in rebelling arranged itself upon the shop keepers of the district by causing a series of five deaths among them.

Figure It Out For Yourself

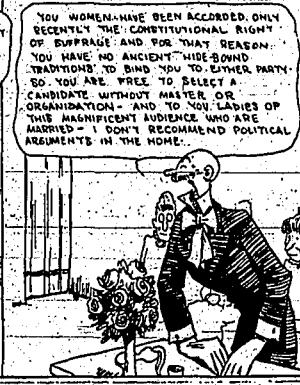

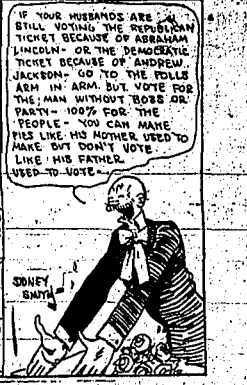

GIANT COMBINE FORECAST FOR CO-OPERATORS

Existing Enterprises Will Become Integral Parts of Great National System, Organizer Declares

CHICAGO, Oct. 27 (AP)—Agricultural cooperative enterprises in America are gradually crystallizing into a great national cooperative system of which most of the existing systems are necessary—and integral—parts, a committee on agricultural cooperation reported yesterday at the third cooperative congress of the Cooperative League of America here. The report was presented by W. C. London, national organizer of the Farmers' Educational and Cooperative Union.

Recognized by Many States.
