It has been rumored that the Jeromeites are depending on two or three men to take the championship over to the town across the river.

The same thing was said about the Buhl team, but it was a noticeable fact that the Twin Falls men were not tackled by one or two men, but at times four or five tore through the line, and had that uncanny knack of finding out who was carrying the ball.

It is true that Jerome has two or possibly three men that excel, but that does not signify that those three are the only players on the team.

Over-confidence is a poor asset to any team or crowd of fans and in most cases it can be figured as a liability.

Jerome was fast enough to win the North Side championship against such teams as Gooding and Wendell, and must be respected. Its win over the Wendell team was not of the fluke variety, and once more "Don't take the Jerome team too lightly."

Leaving Twin Falls and Jerome to fight it out on Friday, it is well to let the fans know that the game scheduled with Moscow high school for Armistice Day is going to be a hummer.

Word from the northern part of the state tells of Moscow having a poor start during the first two weeks of the season, but after getting lined up the "Russians" have been playing great football.

The opening conference game of the northern section went to Moscow against the scrappy Lewiston outfit. Lewiston was the victor, but Lewiston was outplayed from the start, and the Moscow half was devoted to giving the Moscow second string back a chance.

His strong forte is having the necessary knowledge of knowing where the opponent is going to throw the pigskin. He stands supreme as a interceptor of forward passes.

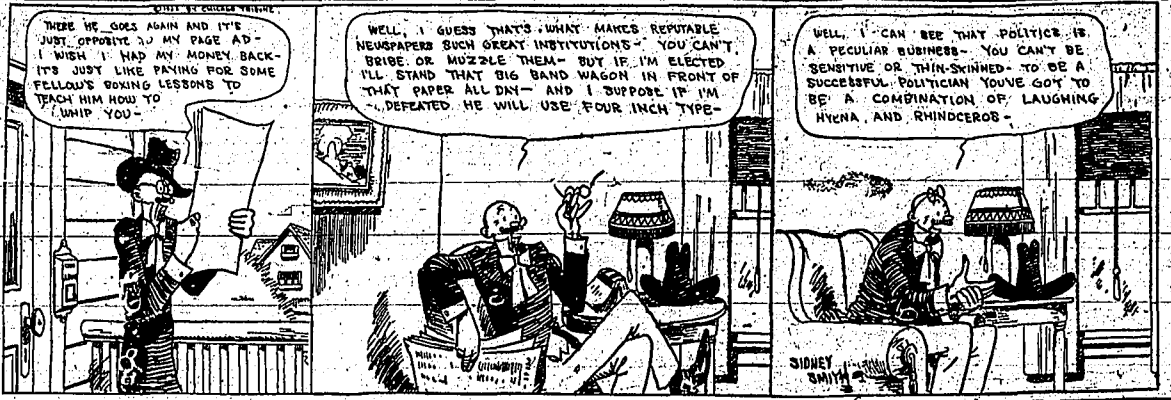

LAXITY AMONG PARENTS AIDS LAW BREAKING

Annual Report of Juvenile Court Officials Shows Economic Pressure Has Serious Effect

Although major charges of delinquency among boys and girls with whom the juvenile authorities have come in contact during the past year have decreased materially, the number of irregularities in school attendance has noticeably increased, mainly on the charge of being forced to attend classes in harrowing trips, according to Twin Falls county's juvenile court.

During the year a total of 350 boys and 16 girls were brought before the juvenile court. A total of 100 were brought against all delinquents whether they appeared in court or not, are as follows: Disorderly conduct, 50 boys, six girls; truancy, 125 boys, 10 girls; larceny, 33 boys, 15 girls.

A part of the report says: "The 135 cases brought before juvenile judges O. P. Drivell and assisted by the do not include many boys and girls talked to by the judge and probation officers. Excluding all cases coming under all kinds of transfer about 25 cases a month. These include truancy, misappropriation of property such as bicycles, automobiles, stealing from stores, etc. We have had a number of difficult cases the past year, for the reason that a number of men have forsaken their homes, leaving the children to be cared for. Two men have been set to state prison leaving large families to protect and find homes for. Cases of delinquency such as check writing, have decreased very materially during the past year."

Tom Ars committed Eight boys and two girls were committed to the state industrial school. 135 were admonished and 25 were paroled.

The cause of delinquency she given as follows: "Children allowed too much liberty; not properly looked after by parents or guardians; have not proper respect for parents; at the streets at night; allowing boys to play in streets; dancing; a great percentage of delinquents do not have proper homes; the double standard permitted by society, allowing boys to play in streets and not permitted to girls. It is responsible to a much larger percentage of boy delinquents."

Straight through the heart of the city the procession continued, the youths never looking to the right or left and acknowledging the acclamations and cheers and singing Fascisti marching songs. They reached the monument of Victor Emmanuel and the tomb of the Unknown Soldier.

After the ceremony was concluded at the tomb of the Unknown Soldier, the Fascisti proceeded to the Via Nazionale, Rome's national highway, part of the earliest war and reached the Quirinal square, where they were formed in front of the palace.

Sixty Thousand Marchers. By this time the number of Fascisti taking part in the procession was variously estimated at fifty to sixty thousand.
