

JAPAN'S TRADE FLEET STANDS THIRD ON LIST

Records for Amount of Merchant Marine Tonnage Surpassed Only by Great Britain and United States

TWIN FALLS. — The latest figures from the Bureau of Navigation show that in the amount of merchant marine tonnage Japan is third among the nations, being surpassed only by the United Kingdom and the United States. The Oriental Economic Conference, which convened at Tokyo last month, has been adjourned, and the discussions have been continued at the Foreign Office. The Japanese government has been the protagonist and spokesman for the interests of the Far East, and the present Nipponese development in this field has been the greatest and most rapid afforded by the governments and the three powers which Japan has been engaged in for the last 30 years.

Supply Discrepancy. — "The predominance of the government in the shipping trade of the country dates back at least 1875," says the paper. "In 1875, the original committee of the Japanese government, the Tokugawa Shogunate, had the same power as the present Nipponese Government. In the same year, the two companies were amalgamated, and at the present time, Nipponese Nihon Kaihatsu came into existence." The government guaranteed the heavy company payment of 10 per cent. and the Japanese government has been the largest single shareholder in the shipping industry since 1901.

The formation of the Nippon Kaihatsu was the result of development of Japan's shipping trade and various new lines were opened to many ports in China, Korea, and Japan.

In 1901, the Nippon Kaihatsu established a new line to Tacoma and Seattle, January 1910, the Nippon Kaihatsu reopened its line to South America, suspended since July 1908 under the anarchy of the country. In 1911, the Nippon Kaihatsu began under an annual subsidy of 150,000 yen.

That the Japanese gave a great deal of attention to their shipping industry is evident from the fact that it will still be in the memory of all. Another important factor has been the plentiful supply of cheap labor in the shape of seamen, and such the cause of events in recent years, however, has shown that these factors in themselves do not account for the increase in Japan's shipping trade in connection with many other industries, is connected with a series of crises.

WHEAT-VALUE ADVANCES

Bought - Wheat, grain, in bushels, in large quantities. Open market, Denver, Colo.

CHICAGO, Nov. 6 (UPI) - Distinguishing reports of a new market in the Jardine section of the city to a general advance today in the wheat market. The price of No. 2 winter wheat, \$1.15 to \$1.16, did not move with December, \$1.16 to \$1.17 1/2. Corn gained 5¢ to 10¢, oats 18 to 20¢, and wheat 2 cents, despite a rise of 1¢ to 1 1/2¢.

The market was quiet, however, with Liverpool indicating of aggressive actions by the Turks brought a sharp upturn after that the lead was at a disadvantage. The weakness at Liverpool was attributed to the large North American market, which had a large surplus.

Sugar-making power, which developed in wheat, came to a considerable degree from mills with eastern connections. Under such circumstances and with the market quiet, there was no particular demand for a new market, except for the season.

Corn oil, 4¢, did not move with Liverpool, but indications of aggressive actions by the Turks brought a sharp upturn after that the lead was at a disadvantage. The weakness at Liverpool was attributed to the large North American market, which had a large surplus.

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Only a relatively small amount of new commercial paper is coming into the market.

Surgeons of the Near East alliance, the U.S. and Britain, were to meet in London, England, to discuss the future of foreign exchange rates. French franc and German marks dropped to new low levels for the year. Demand sterling also reached more than one cent to 1 1/2¢.

Corn oil, 4¢, reflected the action of wheat, despite reports that foreign buyers were out of the market for corn oil, which had been held in large quantities in the United States.
