# BRITAIN FEARS NEW UPHEAVAL IN NEAR EAST

### Turkish Nationalists Precipitate Problems Involving the Possible Revival of Old Trouble and Spread of New

LONDON, Nov. 7. (AP)—The new upheaval in Turkey and especially Constantinople, is regarded in London as involving at least two serious problems, the main one being whether the action of the nationalists is going to revive trouble in the Near East which lately threatened the peace of Europe. What effect deposing the sultan would have upon the Moslem world is the second big topic commented upon by the British newspapers, which find a great deal of scope for news of the changes in the Near East despite the shooting of the sultan in domestic politics.

In Great Britain there is a strong opinion that Kemalists, flushed by their recent success in deposing the sultan, on the support of Russia, intend to challenge the powers of Europe. Fear of bolshevik influence on the Kemalists is very common here, and there is much speculation as to the effect of the action by the nationalists in deposing the sultan at an early date.

Outside of Turkey, especially upon the tens of thousands of Moslems in India, there is a matter of deep concern to Great Britain. Some take the view that the Aigron sultan will possibly prove advantageous to Great Britain, while others are reported to be indignant at the Kemalists' attitude against the sultan.

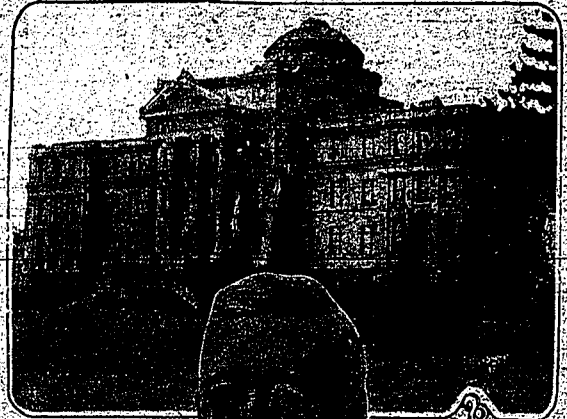

## AMERICAN CHEMICAL SOCIETY REPORTS IMPORTANT DISCOVERY

With the increasing importance attributed to vitamins as essential factors in health, human and animal experiments have been made by prominent scientists throughout the country to ascertain the original source of the vitamins found in the common yeast cake.

Important experiments in the laboratory of Iowa State College have been reported by the American Chemical Society which prove that the vitamins are not extracted from the yeast cake, but are in fact a vitamin factory.

The nutrition of the higher animals is not a necessary condition of a medium for the growth of yeast, thus, Walter S. Cole (the yeast vitamin) is not a yeast growth stimulant in the extracts studied that extracts from alfalfa and wheat embryo contain "vitamin" and "inorganic" material which will maintain the growth of yeast, though they do not contain the yeast vitamin.

Having reached these important conclusions, chemists are now confined to a study of yeast itself in order to determine the source of the yeast vitamin. Until this can be done, the actual nature of the health-giving yeast vitamin must remain a mystery to science.

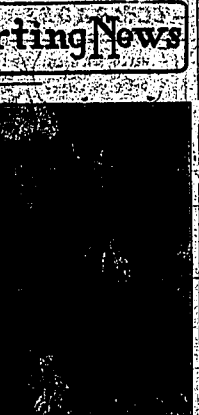

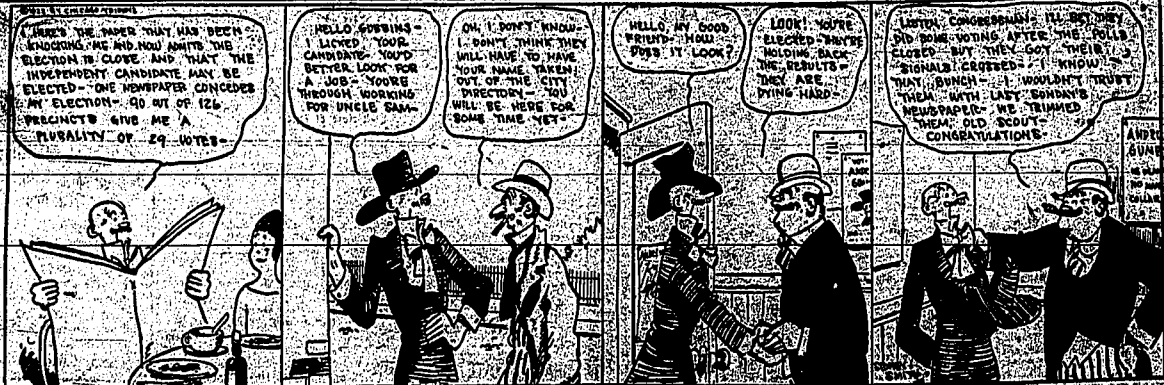

PLAN NEXT YEAR'S BILL

Directors of Pacific Coast Baseball League to Meet in Interests of 1923 Season

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 7.—The directors of the Pacific Coast Baseball League meet here (November 7) to lay plans for the 1923 season. Representatives will attend from San Francisco, Oakland, Seattle, Vernon, Los Angeles, Portland, Eugene, and Salt Lake City. Cal Erving, one of the leaders of the Oakland club, is to put before the directors a proposal to limit each team to seven players of major-league AA experience and to six players who have not played in minor leagues before. Erving says he has enough votes to secure adoption of the plan. Critics of Erving's proposal say that adoption of it would make the Coast League class AA in name only. Those supporting the plan claim it would mean a big saving for the clubs. The suggestion, it is said, may result in a compromise which would limit the club to six experienced players and two novices.

The directors also will take up the question of giving the league a new leading team. Erving, it is believed, will continue his objection to this move. Under the plan each club contributes \$2500 toward the league. Erving thinks that the players are well paid for the services they perform. He says that it is in vain, without a financial incentive, to urge them to play better. He says that every other major-league club would like to have the best players in the league.
