

REGULATION IS HELD CAUSE OF RAILS DECLINE

President of Illinois Central Blames Government Interference for Halt in Development and Car Shortage

NEW YORK CITY, Nov. 9.—Government regulation is almost wholly responsible for the decline of railroad development and existing shortage of transportation, Charles H. Markham, president of the Illinois Central railroad, told members of the Railway Business Association at the annual dinner here tonight.

For two years, Markham said, the rate and reduced the rate of return of the railroads, although wages, prices and returns would give the industry a business year increasing.

The outstanding fact regarding the present shortage of transportation is that it has been met at the very beginning of a period of business revival, he said.

In this respect it creates a situation which would not be normal in a period of general revival.

Mr. Markham said the situation is due partly to the coal and shop employees' strike, but added that the large contributing factor was the more rapid development of the production and commerce of the country than the development of the facilities of the railroads.

"Clearly it is essential to the welfare of the country that the railroads should be rapidly re-equipped with their existing facilities in good condition, and that they should for some years rapidly improve and expand their properties to be commensurate with the things which ever will enable and ensure the railroads to carry out a program of expansion which will be so far ahead of the nation's requirements of the East-Ohioan. Japan's Largest Port's Exports for Nine Months Less Than One-Tenth of Imports. YOKOHAMA, Nov. 9. (AP.)—While the trade of Yokohama, whence most of Japan's silk is shipped, and Osaka, the chief industrial city, shows a favorable balance, that for Kobe, the largest port, is unfavorable, according to the official figures for the nine months ending September 30th. Osaka's exports for that period totaled 240,129,000 yen, compared with imports of 100,526,000 yen; Yokohama exports 436,721,000 yen; imports 377,586,000 yen; favorable balance. LABOR DIVIDES ON SOCIALISM

COUNTIES MAKE SAVING BY ROYENT ERADICATION

Destruction of Three Million Prairie Dogs in Eastern Colorado Saved \$2,000,000 in Cattle Losses

DENVER, Nov. 9. (AP.)—Twenty Colorado counties have been saved at least \$2,000,000 by the destruction of an estimated total of 3,000,000 prairie dogs this year, according to a report of Joseph Koyas, director of a rodent control for the United States biological survey.

Within five years Director Koyas predicted, the rodents will be entirely banished in Douglas, Arapahoe, Adams, Larimer and Weld counties as a result of the concentrated effort made in these counties. Sixty per cent of the rodents already has been eradicated over areas infested with prairie dogs, he said.

The counties are cooperating in the work of financing the extermination work, he declared. The plan of procedure proposes the extermination complete of the rodents in one section, and the concentration of efforts on another section, until the entire state has been covered. Next year, he stated, thirty counties will be covered.

**WET AND DRY
ISSUE RAISED
BY ELECTIONS**

**Opposing Forces Make Con-
flicting Claims as to Prob-
able Linup on Modification
of Prohibition Enforcement**

WASHINGTON, Nov. 9. (AP)—The political complexion of the next congress having been definitely established, interest turned today on the probable lineup on the question of modification of the prohibition enforcement law. Both the "dry" and "wet" sides were claiming a victory as a result of President's election.

For the Anti-Sauces faction, Wayne E. Wheeler, general counsel, says the "wets" would not have as many votes as they claim, in the senate as heretofore, and that their strength in the house would not exceed 140, or 75 less than a majority.

W. E. Wheeler, the association against the Prohibition Enforcement through G. P. Hinkley, its general secretary, claimed a gain of 50 "liberal" votes in the house, which, if it was amended, would give the "wet" side of the modification.

House Liberal Legislation was pronounced "increased" in the wet's favor, according to the "wet" side. It is considered highly probable the passage of liberal legislation in the next session of congress that will strike the first blow at the stringent provisions of the Volstead act.

Involved in this view is a consideration of the change of membership of the powerful committees in the house. The defeat of Andrew J. Volstead of Minnesota removes the author of the objectionable prohibition act from the chairmanship of the house judiciary committee, giving over the place to Representative Graham of Pennsylvania, an avowed "wet."

The passing of Moorehead leaves the strong leadership on the floor either to Representative Longworth of Ohio, or Representative Mann of Illinois, both "wets," and both have been endorsed by the association because of their attitude on the prohibition issue.

Edo Fagan on "Dew" Mr. Wheeler, in his statement, declared that the "claims" of the "Association Against the Prohibition Amendment" of a gain of 30 votes in the senate was "like the hope of a glass of beer" and "nothing substantial."

In the house, said Mr. Wheeler, "there is no possibility of a majority of any being outright amendment or similar winking amendment to the national prohibition act, but more than that, the states, with a few exceptions, show that they will never amend their laws for any such amendment, and that will probably be much less than that."

The only real test of sentiment on the 17th congress was this year's election in Idaho, where the "wet" was defeated by more than 15,000 votes. In Illinois the organized "dry" forces did not vote either way on the beer proposition.

The defeat of the "wet" in Massachusetts and California is, so far as concerns us never had any enforcement codes in those states.

Preparing for Fight Both the "dry" and the "wet" are preparing for a fight in the new congress. Mr. Wheeler declared his outlook was "extremely" favorable for the carrying out of the prohibition program of his organization.

Just what the program of attack on the Volstead law will be has not yet been definitely decided, but is expected to be a straight-out proposition for the sale of light wines and beer. That proposal was put forward in California, where prohibition is still at the last scene, but it has never received serious consideration.

Representative Britton of Illinois announced, however, that it would be re-introduced.

Treasury and other officials looked for proposals to modify the enforcement act. Treasury officers, however, said the policy of the department would continue until congress acted.
