President Lays Wreath of Remembrance on Tomb of Unknown Soldier and Sets Armistice Day Precedent

WASHINGTON, Nov. 11.—The president today laid a wreath of remembrance on the tomb of the unknown soldier and set a precedent for the nation to follow in the observance of armistice day.

Mr. Wilson, accompanied by Mrs. Wilson and a number of cabinet members, arrived at the tomb at 10:30 a. m. The wreath was laid by the president and the words "To the Unknown Soldier" were inscribed on it.

The ceremony was held at the Arlington National Cemetery. The president was accompanied by Mrs. Wilson, Secretary of State Hughes, and other cabinet members.

GEDDES ADOPTS GERMAN VIEW ON INDEMNITIES

Former British Cabinet Member Declares Reparations Cannot Be Collected Because Money is Lacking

LONDON, Nov. 11 (AP)—Sir Eric Geddes did some very plain talking about German reparations as a guest of the Thirty club of London recently. This club is an association of advertising experts. When in parliament Sir Eric was noted for his straightforward style of speech and since he became a business man again he is more outspoken than ever.

"In 1918 I was a politician," he said, "and I said then that we should not make a fetish of reparations, that we might find something to collect, and that the demand for great sums from Germany might be bad. I nearly lost my seat over that statement."

"He was under no necessity of doing any hedging before the Thirty club," he continued. "What I said in 1918 has some validity for the time being. We were absolutely wrong, as I will, in trying to get the last penny out of Germany. We cannot get it because it is not there."

"It is no use chasing a mirror," he said. "You can only get reparations out of Germany by other means of goods, by the sale of bonds, by the sale of stocks, by the sale of land. It will mean unemployment here."

"The leaders of thought would bring this home to you," he said. "It is a good thing for the world."

"I have had some dream Germany. They are desperate there. There will come a time when they will be able to pay their own debts. Until we and our allies come down to book, that will be the case. There will be an improvement. When we do that Germany will try to pay, if possible. But you cannot expect a country which is in a state of anarchy to do so."

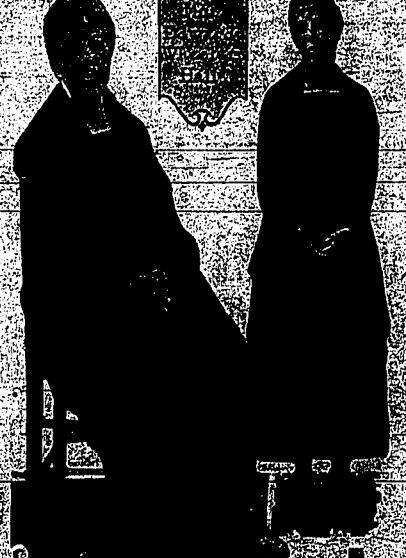

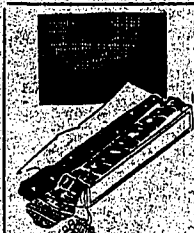

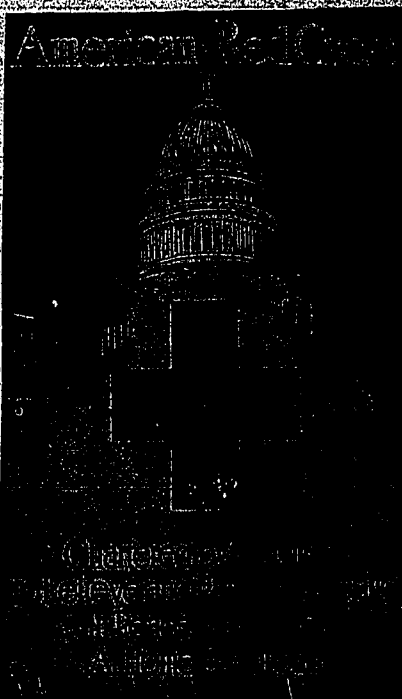
