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# ARGUE AGAINST RE-ALIGNMENT OF HILL GROUP

### Northwestern Railroad Officials Give Reasons for Objecting to Commerce Commission's Proposal

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18. (AP)—Higher officials of the Hill group of railroads in the Northwest continued to present adverse arguments today before the interstate commerce commission on the government's tentative railroad consolidation plan in the Northwest. The plan would direct the Great Northern from association with the Northern Pacific and the Chicago, Burlington and Quincy, and combine it with the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul.

Hale Holden, president of the Burlington, suggested that the commission consider the effect of the proposed consolidation on the smaller railroads. He also suggested the creation of four far-flung railroad mergers through the west, each of which would tap the Mississippi basin, the Gulf of Mexico and the Pacific coast.

World Unity Furber, Howard Elliott, chairman of the board of the Northern Pacific, declared that instead of considering any divorce of the three groups, the committee ought to unify them even more completely into a single great transportation machine, while Ralph Budd, president of the Great Northern, said that if a divorce within the Hill group was forced, it would be a calamity of things called for a union of the Northern Pacific with the Chicago, Burlington and Quincy.

Biparty Defends Proposal. Professor Wm. J. Ripley, who laid down the tentative outlines of the tentative consolidation plan, suggested that the effect of the completed linking up of railroad service be had in mind, as well as the effect of the consolidation of railroad property into a secondary railway class.

"Perhaps so," Mr. Holden returned, "but my point is that in the consolidation of the railroads, the line of the line should be far or not far enough."

Mr. Budd's argument against the plan of the Great Northern was that the St. Paul and Northern Pacific systems were far more important to each other than the Great Northern and St. Paul could be.

See No Improvements. "A Great Northern combination must mean justice to look into the matter," said Mr. Paul, who was speaking in behalf of the St. Paul and Northern Pacific systems.

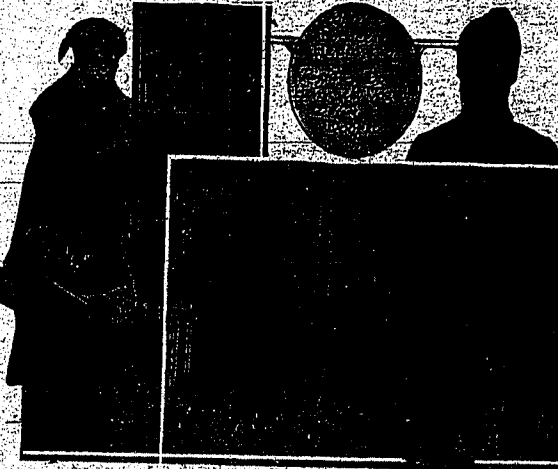

TROJANS DEFEAT VANDAL SQUAD IN TOWN OF BOISE'S STADIUM, PARADISE CAL., NOV. 10.—The University of California Trojans defeated the University of Idaho Vandals in the first game of the season at the University of Idaho football field here today 14 to 0. A forward pass game, led by the southern Californians for the first time, caused the Vandals' downfall.

The Trojan backfield made substantial gains around the Idaho ends and off tackle, but the Vandals' line held out but snatched gains for the Trojans.

Harold Galloway, Trojan who filled the show of Dolly regular quarter back, was wide and unable to play. The game was a hard one for Galloway's back who was the first time he has played through a full game this season.

The Trojans' first touchdown came in the first period when U. S. C. Idaho left halfback, on an 80 yard line, Harold Galloway sent the ball behind the goal posts into the hands of Phyllis Milson, right end, of the touchdown.

A forward pass also resulted in the Trojan's second touchdown. This time it was Frank Clemens, right halfback, who sent the ball to Phyllis Milson, again scored the extra point.

The Idaho team was slightly out of sync and was impeded in many ways but on the whole they were the equals of the Trojans for the first time.

## GAMING BIRDS EDUCATED TO SING

SINGING BIRDS NIGHTEIGHTS BREEDERS, Nov. 18 (AP)—After ten years of experiment, a Boston bird breeder has succeeded in producing canaries, with a singing habit. The cross-breed was attained by using nightingales as "singing masters" for young canaries, and training the latter entirely removed from the sound of any other bird note except the warbling of their "instructors."  
The breeder's chief difficulty was at first found in the fact that normally nightingales sing only during two months of the year, and his purpose required a longer unintermission of instruction for the canaries. He was finally successful in changing the breeding or non-singing period of certain nightingales to include the entire year by July others from June to August, and still others from August to October.  
Using these birds, he kept newly hatched canaries continually within hearing of their warbling. Several generations of breeding showed that birds reared from the original students independently possessed the "singing habit," and that "instructors" could be dispensed with for the offspring except for "polling-out" their singing.

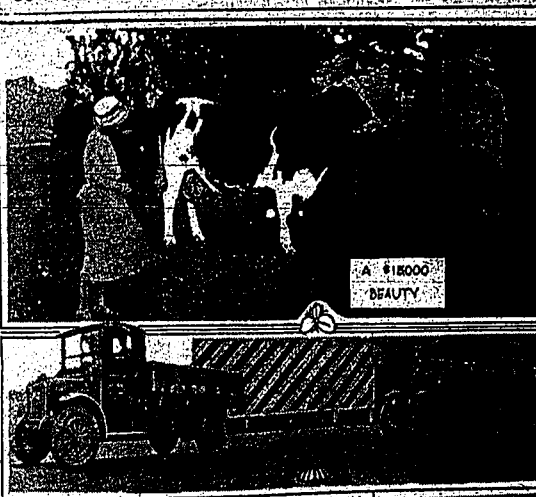

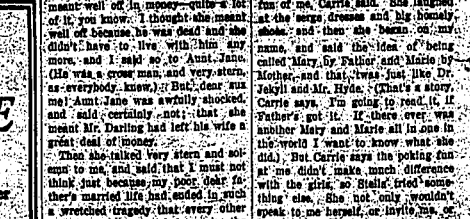

# LAUNDRIES PLAN INSURANCE BODY

## Southern Idaho Organization Delegates Approve Efficiencies Plan of Insurance

Formation of an interinsurance association among laundries of Oregon, Washington and Idaho was considered, and approved by the majority of the 25 delegates attending the annual meeting of the Southern Idaho Laundry Owners association in the Chamber of Commerce rooms Saturday. The convention closes Sunday morning with the election of officers and reading of the annual report by the president.

The plan for inter-insurance among all hand-launderers of the northwest, organized at Portland, is considered an important one. Under this plan customers' bundles would be insured at a cost of one cent for each bundle and as soon as the bundles are packed they would be paid the premium, thereby doing away with the present complicated claim system. The laundries would be relieved by the teaching curriculum for their employees.

The association took preliminary steps toward standardizing bookkeeping and accounts of member firms, making possible the necessary probably reductions in operating costs.
