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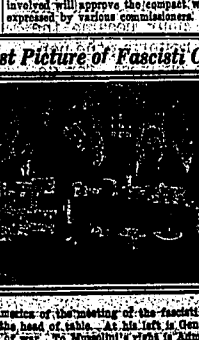
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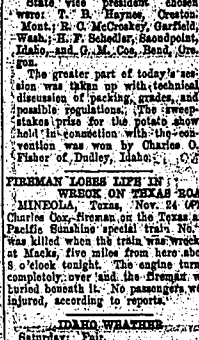
First Picture of Fascisti Cabinet



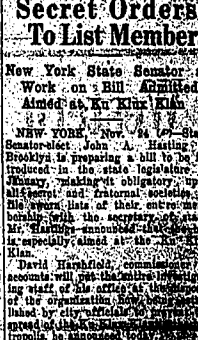
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STEEL MAKERS UNITE TWO BIG CORPORATIONS

Purchase by Bethlehem Corporation of Midvale and Cambria Companies Called Forward Step by Buyers

NEW YORK, Nov. 24 (AP)—The Bethlehem Steel corporation has announced the purchase of the Midvale Steel and Ordnance company, including the ordnance plant at Nicotown, Penn., and the Cambria Steel company, authorized at a special meeting of the board of directors today.

The Bethlehem company owns 97 percent of the stock of the Midvale company. The Bethlehem company, in payment for the two properties will issue about \$30,000,000 par value of its common stock, which amounts to 2,000,000 shares, to the Midvale company for distribution among its stockholders on dissolution of the company.

As a result, it was stated, the Midvale stockholders will receive for each two shares of stock \$50 par value each, Bethlehem stock of \$50 par value. The stock of the Midvale and Cambria plant will be conveyed to a separate corporation, all of the shares of which will be distributed pro rata among the stockholders of the Bethlehem company. The Bethlehem company will assure that the Midvale and Cambria stockholders will receive the same value of stock to pay for the steel company purchases as the Bethlehem corporation will have common stock aggregating \$180,000,000 par value and \$100,000,000 in cash, and a bonded debt of \$215,500,000. President Eugene Grace announced.

Breaks Commercial Ties

The purchase marks another step forward, it was stated, in the Bethlehem steel company's drive to create a complete line of commercial steel products and increase its reserve of ore, but also breaks commercial ties with steel business. The plan has been approved, it was said, since Charles M. Schwab and his associates became interested in the acquisition of these properties, will be in a position to be able to produce all commercial steel products with the exception of pipe and various tubes, and which are being made to produce these. The Bethlehem's present ingot capacity of 4,000,000 tons will be increased to 7,000,000 tons by the purchase.

Marka Corey's Retirement

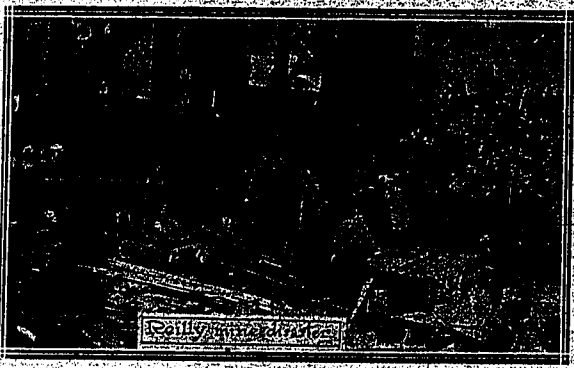

RETAINS FUEL RATIONS ROLE THROUGH YEAR

President Persuades Federal Distributor to Remain in Service and Maintain Supervision

WASHINGTON, Nov. 24 (AP)—Federal control of coal distribution will be continued until January 31, President Harding decided today. C. H. Spens, federal fuel distributor called on the president today to resign his office, but after discussing the situation, agreed to remain in service until that date and to continue in effect the present supervision of a committee until the first of the year. The president, it is understood, expects to declare the emergency during which federal control operates at its end on January 1, but considers that some degree of control must then be continued in force.

Commerce Department's Review of Economic Conditions

INDICATES APPROACH TOWARD LEVELS OF 1920

WASHINGTON, Nov. 24 (AP)—Some conditions throughout the country are bringing back to 1920 levels, according to the survey of current business during October, issued Thursday by the commerce department.

GIVES INDIANS' VERSION OF CUSTER'S LAST FIGHT

CHICAGO, Nov. 24 (AP)—The Indian version of Custer's last fight was told here today by Judge Aaron McElroy, head of the Standing Rock reservation, North Dakota.

The general Indian view, said Judge McElroy, who spoke Thursday night before the Chicago Historical society, is that it was a disastrous battle for their wives and homes. It was not a battle, they insist, it was a fair fight in the open, and the best side won.

The judge, in connection with the Battle of Custer engagement in 1876, said that Montana cattlemen coveted the land on which the Indians were camping and that also there was a move on to reduce the treaty and that it has been told that army leaders desired to prevent a reduction believed that trouble with the Indians would accomplish their purpose.

The Sioux Indians did not wish to kill Custer and regarded him as a just man, the judge said.

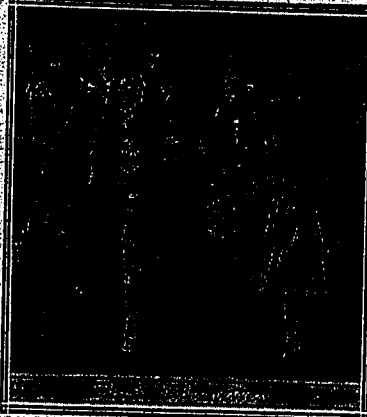
War Finance Corporation Lends Funds to Take Herds From Drought Stricken Regions to Feeding Grounds

The lines of titanium and vanadium have been broken up by dispersion in the field of sun spots, leading one astronomer to remark that "the sun spots and the stars Mira are evidently very closely connected in physical condition."

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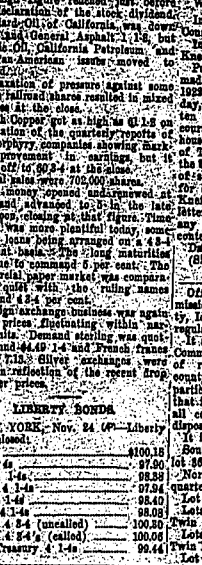
