WASHINGTON, Dec. 19 (AP)—Colorful stories of the privations and persecutions suffered by Christians in Turkey were told before the immigration committee today in support of the White bill to permit certain classes of Near East refugees into the United States.

Return Means Death George Horton, who was American consul in Smyrna during the recent Greco-Turkish hostilities in that region, corroborated many of the assertions made by the state department authorities, who came to Washington and, under duress, related how he had been carried into captivity by the Turks.

Representatives of the Near East relief, the Federal Council of Churches, the Young Men's Christian association, and the Young Women's Christian association were among those who appeared to ask for passage of the bill which would admit only near relatives of American citizens among the refugees and whose provisions would extend until June 30, 1924.

BETTERMENT SEEN AHEAD FOR FARMER

Secretary Wallace Predicts Marked Improvement in Agricultural Conditions and Relationship of Prices

CHICAGO, Dec. 19 (AP)—A marked improvement in the agricultural conditions of the country during 1923, not only in better actual prices, but as compared with the prices of other commodities, was predicted by Secretary of Agriculture Henry C. Wallace, in an address tonight before the Chicago Association of Growers.

Several forces are working toward a more nearly normal relation between things produced on the farm and things produced in the cities and industrial centers. More farms are growing crops this year than last year.

Secretary Wallace said the large advance in cotton prices has put the south in better shape than the rest of the country. The advance in prices of cereals, grain and the continuing profitable prices of livestock has led to marked improvement in the farm conditions.

Foreign Demand a Factor "There has been less improvement in the wheat growing regions of the northwest and the southwest," he said. "Price of wheat are much better, both in these sections and in the rest of the world."

# SENATE FAILS TO BREAK JAM IN LEGISLATION

## Efforts to Displace Shipping Bill Prove Unavailing; Enemies of Measure Hold Out for Delay in Test Vote

WASHINGTON, Dec. 19 (AP)—Efforts to bring about a vote on the motion of Senator Norris, republican, to lay aside the administration shipping bill in favor of the Norris measure, today failed in the senate and the session ended with the Norris motion more final than ever, embodied as the key log in a legislative jam.

Senator Jones, republican—Washington, in charge of the shipping bill, supported by administration leaders, proposed, as he did yesterday, that a time be set for a vote through unanimous consent, and while Senator Norris collected his dissent to the proposal, objection was raised by senators numbered among the forces supporting the Norris motion. Senator Jones, thereupon abandoned further efforts to reach a vote during the day and the remainder of the session was given over to a discussion of agricultural legislation by Senator Smith, democrat, South Carolina, and to an attack on the federal reserve board by Senator Fletcher, republican, Alabama.

Leaders Dodge Prediction  
When a vote might be obtained on the shipping bill subjected to its first test was a question tonight which leaders could not definitely answer. Senator Norris left the senate chamber at the end of today's session with the declaration that a vote might come tomorrow, but administration supporters, including the move to lay aside the shipping bill said they did not desire to hasten the vote because delay would work in their advantage in the fight against the shipping legislation.

Meanwhile, the banking and currency committee continued to work on rural credits legislation, and its chairman, Senator McJannet, republican, Connecticut, urged the senate not to take up the Norris financing bill but to await the credits legislation, which it hoped to report in a week. Several democratic senators, however, including Senator Robinson of Arkansas, announced they would vote to take up the Norris bill as it would afford an opportunity for discussion of farmer relief legislation pending a report by the banking committee.

**LAURENCE STEEL**  
**PROHIBITION OFFICE TO APPROVE**  
YOUNGSTOWN, Ohio, Dec. 19 (AP)—Purchase of the Butler Hill steel company of Youngstown by the Youngstown Sheet and Tube company, another local concern, was regarded in steel circles tonight as practically assured. The merger would make the Youngstown Sheet and Tube company the third largest steel company in the United States and the largest of the independent concerns, with a capacity of 2 1/2 million tons of the country's total production. According to officials, the consolidation would mean a saving of many thousands of dollars annually in overhead expense.

An inspection of Twin Falls mercantile establishments of various kinds shows an array of attractive articles from which Christmas gifts of every description may be selected. For men some of the gifts most popular are the warm, soft bedspread shirpers in felt at \$1 to \$3 with the leather or varieties and leather soled slippers at higher prices. Men's stores offer vast quantities of neckties at 50 cents to \$2.50 and higher, and in knit and cut silk of all patterns. There are also cuff links at 50 cents to \$1.50 for the higher grades. Silk and wool socks at 65 cents to \$1.50 are greatly in demand and there still remain vast quantities of sweaters, sport coats and smoking jackets at popular prices, and mufflers of unique patterns at 75 cents to \$5.

The jewelry stores have silver sets of knives and forks at \$18.50 per half dozen as the common price, salt and

# HERRIN DEATH RAMP SURVIVOR RELATES STORY

## One of Workers Who Escaped Massacre Testifies in Trial of Five Men Charged With Murder

MARTIN, Ill., Dec. 19 (AP)—The first survivor to take the witness stand in the trial of five men charged with murder in connection with the killing of 90 non-union men in the Herrin riot.

Officer, a bookkeeper at the "strip" mine where the trouble started, told of the attack on Monday and the terrorism of June 21, when three union miners were shot and killed.

### No True Agreement

Both Officer and Colonel Bush Hunter of the adjutant general's office in Springfield, another witness, said that there was no true agreement between the non-union workers and the local officials of the United Mine Workers for a truce and a safe conduct of the beleaguered workers out of the mine.

Colonel Hunter said that he had tried to arrange such a truce while acting in a purely personal capacity, having no authority to do so.

Officer said that Colonel Hunter had talked to him over the telephone and said that W. J. ... authorized the surrender of the property.

### Resigned Bats White Flag

Just before midnight, the witness testified, those in the mine who raised a white flag, but the explosion from surrounding hills continued all night and the flag was lowered at daybreak when the non-union men took refuge in some freight cars.

Then the fire started and the besieged decided to surrender, raising a white flag, he said.

After being accused of their safety, according to the witness, the 49 non-union men were led from the mine, G. E. McDowell, the superintendent, himself along in a big wooden cage. The crowd constantly increased and Officer quoted one of its leaders, who he could not identify as speaking, as saying: "They're nothing but strike-breakers and we ought to kill them all."

About a mile from the mine, the witness said, McDowell was led away by two men. Other witnesses have testified that the cries of "murder" were still on the spot.

### Party-Served in Chambers

Then the crowd marched about two miles further, at which time the routing of prisoners up before a barbed wire fence from a clump of woods, Officer said.

"We're going to give you a chance for your lives," he quoted one of the leaders as shouting and then the firing began.

Officer said he dropped at the first discharge and rolled under the fence, fleeing while the crowd was hustling down those who had escaped the rail of lead. He described the crowd as "swelling like water" but that it was stricken from the record on an objection by the defense.

"Only those who have guns can enter the woods," the witness said, and heard one of the mob leaders cry: "It was at the barbed wire fence that other witnesses have testified 14 bodies were found.
