# Today's Sporting News

## SUPREMACY IN ATHLETICS WON BY WESTERNERS

Year Sees Ascendancy of Men and Women from West in All Branches of Sports Several Hold Championships

**SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 23 (AP)—**Western athletes were supreme in various branches of sports during the year just closing. In football, boxing, track, wrestling, tennis, and automobile racing, based on the man from the far west continued high up among the leaders, several of them holding championships.

Probably the world's best known athlete is Jack Dempsey, heavyweight boxing champion. Colorado-born and Utah bred Dempsey now resides in Los Angeles. Although he did little this year in the ring, it was only because a capable opponent could not be found.

World honors also come to the west in wrestling. The world's best wrestler, Lewis of San Jose, Cal., won the heavyweight title from Stanislaus Zbyszko to whom he had lost it earlier.

Lewis formerly was a resident of Kentucky but in recent years has made his home in California.

On automobile speedways of the nation, a native Californian, Jimmy Murphy, has won the national title by both Los Angeles and San Francisco, forgone to the championship ring taking the title from another Californian, Tommy Milton.

In college athletics the University of California retained its title of national intercollegiate track and field champion at Harvard last spring. Jack Merrick, star, his work in the hammer, discus, 50 jumps and sprints causing observers to call him the greatest all-around athlete of the year.

Stanford University finished third in the Harvard meet. Glenn Hartrast, weight man and sprinter, making many of the best points. Cal. high school boys won the national intercollegiate shot put championship. Sprinters are still trying to break the world's elder records made by "Doc" Morrison, Edaddock, Los Angeles, the "world's fastest human being." Edaddock established more records this year and in 1921 than any other athlete in Southern California for active competition.

California this year produced another great football team, and by many is thought to be even greater than the "wonder team" of 1921 which blanketed Ohio State. Big Ten champion "Buck" Miller, California's All-American end, and "Doc" Morrison, All-American possibility, were the stars of the team.

Western baseball players this year brought prices higher than ever before paid to minor league owners. Jimmy O'Connell and Willie Kamm of the San Francisco Seals and Sammy Hale of the Portland Beavers were paid for \$75,000, \$100,000 and \$125,000 respectively. The Golden State was represented by the world champion New York Giants by George Kelly and Ed Conzogliano.

Probably the most picturesque figure in the western golf world this year was John Black, the grandfurther golfer of Oakland, who was defeated in the national open tour only by Gene Sarazen, present champion.

In tennis, four of the ten ranking players of the country, headed from the West. Fred Hunter, of Berkeley, William Johnston defeated the champion, William T. Tilden, at Berkeley early in the year. Helen Wills, a Berkeley girl, retained the national girls' title and was defeated in the national women's tournament only by the champion, Mrs. Molla Mallory.

If adopting is ranked as a sport, it will be recalled that Elmer E. Moughan of Mills, Calif., at Mt. Clemens, Mich., travelled at a speed of 248 miles an hour, and that Lieut. Oakley Kelly and John MacBee, of San Diego, Cal., together established a record remaining in the air continuously for 59 hours and shortly afterward broke the world's non-stop flight record with a trip of 5,000 miles.

In swimming this year, however, the west had to submit almost meekly to the invasion of the phenomenal John W. Gemberger, of the Illinois Athletic Club.

**LIBRARIAN'S AWARD BEST LEON BOOK PRIZES TO VAN LOAN**

**CHICAGO, Dec. 22 (AP)—**The "Story of Mankind" by Huxley and Gibbon has been voted the most important book published in 1921 by the Children's Librarian's section of the American Library Association. Out of 213 recent records, the chairman of that section, Van Loan's book received 154, with no other book receiving more than 23.

In a recent vote by the vote, Mr. Van Loan has been awarded the John Newbery medal, the gift of Frederick O. Melsner, by the Children's Librarian's section at Detroit. It is considered probable that the medal will be awarded annually in the future by this section.

## FRISCO CLUB RANKS HIGH

First-Place Honors in Nearly All Departments of Baseball Are Won by Seals

**SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 23 (AP)—**First-place honors in nearly every department in baseball were won by the champion San Francisco club of the Pacific Coast Baseball League during the 1922 season, according to the official averages made public here today by President W. H. McCarthy.

Besides leading the league at the close of the season, the Seals led in club hitting with a mark of 289, and tied with Vernon at .954 in club fielding. Four San Francisco pitchers were among the league's first five hurlers and eight San Francisco hitters were among the thirty sluggers who hit .300 or more.

Although the club led in many branches, two Salt Lake hitters, Paul Strand and Manager Duffy Lewis, were at the top of the hitting column, with percentages of .354 and .368 respectively, and a Vernon pitcher, J. L. Day, led with a mark of .780 for 33 games won and 8 lost.

Strand made 289 hits during the season, breaking a record for seasons hitting that had been held by Jay Kline, of the Louisville club since 1920 when he made 283 safe singles.

Several of the players who go up to the majors next were above the three hundred mark in hitting. Sam Rice of Portland, who goes to the Philadelphia Americans, hit into third place with a mark of .348, Willie Kamm, San Francisco, whose sale to the Chicago White Sox for \$100,000 set a record for high player prices, led his club with an average of .342, while not far behind came his teammate, Jimmy O'Connell, who reports to the New York Giants in the spring.

Of the thirty hitters who got beyond the charmed 300 mark, eight were with San Francisco, six with Salt Lake; four with Portland; three with Vernon; three with Los Angeles; and two each with Seattle, Oakland and Sacramento.

## KANSAS MIXES STATE POLITICS

Governor-elect Looks to Republican Legislature for Support of His Program

**TOPEKA, Kan., Dec. 22 (AP)—**In his message to the Kansas legislature which convenes January 9, Governor-elect Jonathan D. Davis will, he expects, emphasize the main points of the party platform on which he was elected. Repeal of the Industrial Court law is one of the planks. It was a Democratic platform and the legislature is overwhelmingly republican, the house 96 to 29; the senate 38 to 2.

Other points are reduction of taxes; abolition of many panels, boards and commissions and consolidation of many others; abolition of the State Highway Commission; place control of highways; construction with boards of county commissioners; restore "home rule" to cities in regulation of its public utilities (power now vested in the state public utilities commission); and "passage of an act creating a board of conciliation and mediation with full power to investigate, advise and recommend and give all said facts, advice and recommendations to the public."

Announcement by the State Tax Commission that it favors a state income tax and will have a bill introduced in the legislature, has created much interest. Other important measures in sight are:

List of child welfare laws prepared by a committee appointed by the state; revised edition of the Statutes of Kansas; establishment of state farm warehouses; establishment of farm marketing bureau; codification and revision of state school laws; adoption of state highway system to be constructed by the state and financed by \$20,000,000 and lanes destroyed by automobile license revenue; reclassification of property for taxation; revision downward of salaries of state officials. The legislature is obligated through adoption of the soldier bonus amendment last election, to vote \$25,000,000 bonds to pay this compensation—\$1 a day for each day in service.

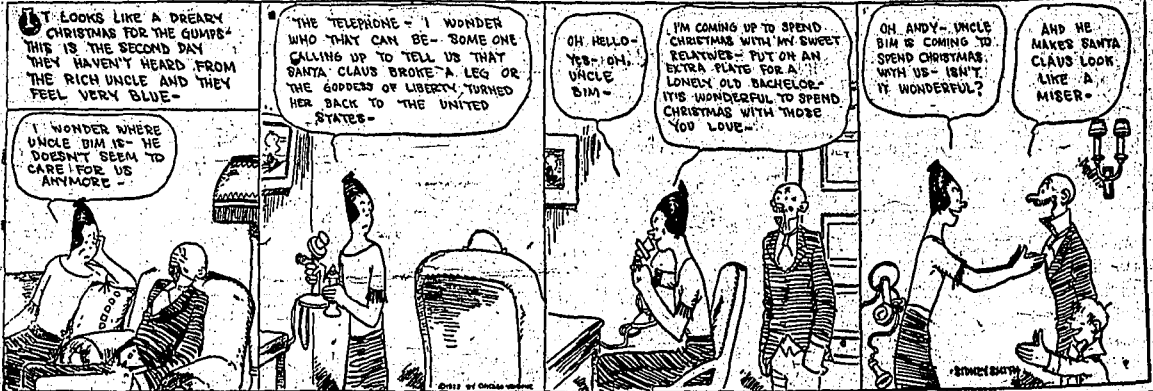

RAILROADS COUNT COST OF FREIGHT RATE CUTS

Reductions Averaging 15 Per Cent and Representing \$471,000,000 Annually Are Reported by Committee

# SENATE SEIZES ON NAVAL BILL PARLEY CLAUSE

### Borah Urges Approval of the House Suggestion for Limitation Conference—Reserves Discussion of Own Scheme

Washington, Dec. 22 (AP)—Extension of naval disarmament among world powers was the subject of the Senate for several hours today, but without action and a virtual adjournment was taken over Christmas. A brief session "to be held tomorrow" was postponed as the "Christmas" reached yesterday, to meet and adjourn until Wednesday.

Calling of an international conference to curtail construction of naval vessels of less than 10,000 tons and aircraft not covered by the Washington armament agreement was urged by Senator Borah, republican, Idaho. He deferred discussion, however, of his amendment to the naval appropriation bill, requesting the president to call an international conference to deal with economic problems and with land and sea armaments.

Senator Borah, declaring that a new naval building program appeared imminent, cited the heavy expenditures and taxes of this and other countries and declared any agreement through construction of armaments.

Senator Pendergrass, republican, Washington, in charge of the naval bill which was given constructive right of veto over the administration shipping bill, declared the provision in the bill, as passed by the house, proposing a conference on limitation of naval vessels and aircraft, was designed to correct the conditions pointed out by Senator Borah. He agreed that competition was reported between naval powers in armaments not covered by the recent arms conference naval limitation treaty.

### Other Tax Excess

Senators Pendergrass and Stanley, Kentucky, declared substantial tax reductions would not be brought about even by abolishing the navy. Senate leaders said they are demanded for lower taxes might be met in part by abolishing useless government commissions and boards.

### ASKS FOR RENEWAL OF 13-CENT STAMP ISSUE

History Class of West Virginia Normal School Gives Historical Reasons for Request to Postmaster General.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22 (AP)—Postmaster General Work has received from members of the American history class of the Shepherd College State Normal School, a petition that the postoffice department again issue stamps of the thirteen cent denomination, which was recently issued.

The petition declares that the entire history of the United States is bound up in the figure 13 and gives the following historical facts: The thirteen cent stamp should be issued.

The first official flag had thirteen stars and thirteen stripes. The American flag requires thirteen letters to spell it, as does the motto, "E Pluribus Unum."

The first word to pass over the transatlantic cable was thirteen on the thirteenth of the month. The silver quarter is written all over with thirteen. Around the head of Liberty are thirteen stars and the eagle bears an olive branch with thirteen leaves in one claw and thirteen thistles in the other. On his breast is a shield bearing thirteen bars and on his back is a ribbon bearing the motto with thirteen stars, each with thirteen feathers and it takes thirteen letters to spell quite correctly. There are thirteen letters in John Paul Jones' name.

There were thirteen ships in the first American navy. Perry's victory on Lake Erie was won on the thirteenth of the month. # Desperate For Clothing, Russians Use Animal Skins; Hoover Devises Relief Plan



Russia is running out of raw, according to American Relief Administration officials on the ground who are alarmed about the clothing shortage and are writing for help in the emergency. Practically all respectable clothing gave out long ago. The famine sufferers sold it for water for such a low price as to reduce to paper, sack cloth, torn carpets and tipped-up mattresses. Even these are nearly worn away and unless more clothing is supplied a million children and several million adults will suffer extreme hardships from exposure through the long northern winter.

The most serious feature is the danger of starvation. More than 1,000,000 children are being fed by agencies. They get their one and only meal a day at the American Relief Administration food kitchens scattered through Russia. The "meals" are in such a pitiable state of "ness that many of them can't go to the kitchens at all. They do nothing to wear outdoors and they fear the cold more than they do hunger. They simply stay huddled in their bare

### FAMED NEW ENGLAND CHURCH

Edifice Erected at Bennington, Vt., 160 Years Ago, Known All Over the Country.

Early this month the First Congregational church in Bennington, Vt., which has the double distinction of being the first church built in the state of Vermont and the reputation of being the most beautiful example of colonial church architecture in northern New England, celebrated its 160th anniversary.

The Bennington church is famous all over the country. It has been photographed perhaps as often as any church in the United States, and day seldom passing without some tourist halting for a snapshot. It is located on the heights at the western side of the township overlooking Bennington village.

The first church was organized the first week of December, 1762. This was before Vermont had become a separate state, and while it was a part of New Hampshire.

In connection with its construction, there is an interesting legend in the days when the Bennington folk decided that they must have a church; there was but one book on church architecture in the whole district, and this was owned by an architect in Bennington. The local folk studied the book and desired the church after suggestions contained in it.

After the church was built it became famous throughout the district and soon, other townships wanted to build and sent to Bennington to borrow the book. Bennington informed them they would have to come and do their studies in architecture on the spot, as the book would be kept in the town.

From village and hamlet, came committees of laborers, carpenters, stone workers and window and interior finishers. The book was lent to them and they met in the church to read and digest it. After their studies were done, the committee used to assemble and discuss the plans for their own church, devising modifications of the design used in Bennington, in order to get original results.

Thus the church became the model for all Vermont's church-builders.

Mrs. White places this indebtedness at \$125.00 per acre and offers as her authority a compilation made last summer by an officer of the Federal Farm Loan Bank.

The figures are interesting if only to show the possibilities of figures—there are a good many points covered by the proposition as a whole which do not appear in the compilation.

To begin with the actual share of bonded indebtedness chargeable to farm land in the County amounts to twelve dollars and fifty cents per acre. This figure was reached after an exhaustive survey of County, highway, school district, and similar records and the correctness of the result obtained cannot without reason be questioned.

The figures simply refuse to square with common sense. There are a number of explanations for the assumptions of the Federal Farm Loan official to whom Mrs. White says credit should be given for the compilation, the most charitable of which is that he made a poor guess.

Today, in Twin Falls county there are four hundred thousand migratory sheep that is to say, sheep owned in Boise and elsewhere and kept for feeding purposes in Twin Falls county, probably eighty per cent of these sheep are mortgaged to the extent of five or six dollars a head and the mortgage goes upon record in Twin Falls County—such mortgage bearing about as much relation to land indebtedness in Twin Falls County as the stock of a mining company operating in the Coeur d'Alene.

Another example of the fallacy of regarding evidence of debt in the light of actual indebtedness is to be found in the fact that hundreds of loans are confidentially made upon double security, that is to say a note executed the sum of two thousand dollars will be secured by a real estate mortgage of two thousand dollars and a chattel mortgage of the same amount.

Still another evidence of the possibilities of figures employed without regard for the facts is readily apparent in the many mortgages given to secure sellers of Twin Falls county lands during the inflation period of two or three years ago.

As the days go by I find that the statements which I made in the course of my talk in opposition to going into the Federal Farm Loan irrigation district are being more and more misquoted, especially the statement that our average indebtedness per acre in this county is \$125.00.

The following is exactly what I said, and I am sure at least three-quarters of the audience got it straight: "Our average indebtedness per acre is \$125.00. This includes everything—bonded indebtedness, canal bonded, first, second and third mortgage, crop and chattel mortgages. These figures were compiled last summer by an officer of the Federal Farm Loan bank and on the strength of them the maximum loan per acre was set from \$120 to \$75.

In selecting this authority I felt that he was in a position to enable me to get somewhere near the truth and that he would not use his income tax pelt. Debts are debts.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22 (AP)—The Commodity Council Plan is the name given to a new method of handling certain of the big agricultural problems by the United States Department of Agriculture.

Councils already have been called to discuss the cotton and potato crops and recommendations have been made for action that would be beneficial in view of present conditions.

As a result of the Potato Council, much waste and loss in growing, storage and marketing of potatoes in this country have been reported.

It was suggested to the farmers that if all the crop, including stalks, were shipped, food would rot or spoil in markets or in transit.

It was also declared that poorer potatoes could be sold through the market, feeding to livestock, and in certain localities, for selling to starch and flour mills.
