

**BORAH PLAN IS ASSAILED BY JOHNSON**

California "Irreconcilable" See Scheme to "Dump Into America's Lap Economic Ills of Europe"

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23 (AP)—The proposal of Senator Borah, republican, Idaho, for an economic and disarmament conference to be called by President Harding was assailed tonight by Senator Johnson, republican, California, who said in a public statement that the plan would "dump into America's lap the economic ills of Europe and the reparations burden."

Senator Johnson's statement was the first overt evidence of a breach in the ranks of the senate "irreconcilables" over the Borah proposal now pending as an amendment to the naval appropriation bill. Senators Borah and Johnson were steadfast allies throughout the long fight against the league of nations and on many other questions of foreign and domestic policy they have acted together. Others of the "irreconcilable" group who reported tonight to be opposed to Senator Borah's amendment which is to come before the senate when it recesses next Wednesday, and Senator Johnson's public attack was interpreted as meaning at least that Senator Borah had not convinced him before offering the proposal.

White House is silent The administration's attitude toward the amendment has not been disclosed but a republican faction has expected to confer with President Harding before it comes to a vote. Senators Watson, republican, Indiana, and Johnson, republican, Indiana, are the opponents of the amendment. Senator King, democrat, Utah, would favor "reservations" dealing against amending Europe's debts to America and also against disarmament under the treaty of Versailles.

Democrats See Endorsement The democratic position on the plan also is in the making. Most of the democrats have been expected to give their support, although some have said they do not believe an European economic conference in this country would be impractical. In other demagogues quarters the Borah plan is hailed as an endorsement of the democratic position for American cooperation in European settlements.

Prolonged discussion of the Borah and similar amendments is predicted generally by Senator King, democrat, Utah, has a conference amendment pending and the bill already contains a house provision requesting the president to call another such kind of conference to deal with small vessels and aircraft not regulated by the Washington naval treaty.

Points Out Pitfalls The statement issued by Senator Johnson tonight, however, indicated that Senator Borah proposed was in reality an abandonment of "the traditional policy of America."

"An economic policy," said Senator Johnson, "that is not to be considered not only present, but also future, but the debts due to us, and of course, the reparations due from Germany. We are to invite the distressed nations to discuss these subjects."

**A Christmas Resolution (AN EDITORIAL)**

**FLAMES SWEEP MOVIE STUDIOS**

Blaze at Universal City Destroys Many Feet of Film and Causes \$350,000 Loss

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Dec. 23 (AP)—Fire at Universal City, a suburb, last night destroyed 1,100,000 feet of film at the Universal studios, gutted one building and resulted in the injury to one man. Damage was estimated at \$350,000, including the value of the motion picture film.

Between thirty-five and forty productions were included in the destroyed pile. The negatives from which the prints were made were saved.

Beside the one man, Edward Bush, a film cutter, who was said to be seriously injured, four others were slightly burned or overcome by smoke. They were Norman Kerry, an actor; Frank Archer, head of Art-Tite department; and Frank Atkinson and Edward Curtis, film cutters.

How the fire started could not be learned. The flames burst out suddenly and the studio fire department, assisted by "extra," property men and others, were a half hour to extinguish them. The prints destroyed were all insured, but Universal officials said their loss would defer the release of productions at least a month.

TWELVE SPANISH SOLDIERS KILLED IN TRAIN WRECK VALENCIA, Spain, Dec. 23 (AP)—Twelve soldiers of the Viesca regiment were killed and a hundred injured today when a military train out of control ran down a steep grade to a collision near Oriente station, Valencia province. **DEVELOPS PLAN OF INDUSTRIAL PREPAREDNESS**

Secretary Weeks Discloses Steps Taken by War Department to Marshal Material Resources in Emergency

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23 (AP)—How the war department is working toward a plan of industrial preparedness, capital of marshalling American material resources in order to support of American demands, should a national emergency demand it, is revealed by Secretary Weeks in an article prepared for the January issue of the National Business, official organ for the Chamber of Commerce of the United States.

Already, the secretary writes, "the ten ordnance districts" have been formed out as a part of the industrial mobilization plan. The industrial leader, a man high in the business life of his community, has volunteered to serve as a point of intimate contact between the government and business interests, which could be of service in war time production.

Progress also has been made toward establishing a similar contact with airplane production and a uniform fixed price contract has been drawn in tentative form for use in future war purchases.

Establishing Contact Points The logical development of this project, Mr. Weeks adds, would be the creation of a civilian general staff, which would be in charge of mobilization. It suggests that in furtherance of the scheme, it may be advisable to place, from year to year, "small educational units" in the hands of business leaders and to maintain a skeleton organization ready convertible to war requirements.

The light has a varying appearance, now like a luminous star, and again like a small crescent moon. HOPE OF PEACE  
DOMINANT NOTE  
OF ENCYCICAL

Pope Plus Suggests General  
Meeting of Whole Catholic  
Churchmen with View to  
Bringing Harmony to World

ROME, Dec. 23 (AP)—Pope Plus is considering the possibility of calling a general council in Rome during 1923 the next year. The council of the church, it was announced in the papal encyclical issued today of the whole general meeting of the whole Catholic church in the center of Catholicism says the encyclical would be most suitable to the jubilee year, when immense numbers might come to the center of peace after so long and so profound an upheaval. But the reassembling of the ecclesiastical council at the jubilee would be a great event that it is necessary "to wait and pray as well as the pious leader of God's elect people, until God gives a clearer sign of his wishes."

**Diplomatic Italian Encyclical**  
The encyclical begins by expressing regret for the strife and violence which recently have rent Italy, the Pope's own country, and the seat of the papacy. It then, in a dignified, calm, and dispassionate manner, outlines the document, seemed to threaten the very life of the country despite the efforts of the various to settle it.  
Proceeding to enumerate the evils of the present, the Pope says that many of the social classes and the various peoples have not been able to escape the terrors of war. He alludes to the public life of the peoples as still surrounded by a deep fog of hatred and mutual enmities and offenses. "If the vanquished nations are suffering gravely from this," the encyclical continues, "the victorious nations are equally afflicted. Small nations complain of being outwitted, victimized and exploited by larger ones, while the latter complain of being ill-treated and plotted against by smaller ones."  
This situation, the encyclical points out, increases the suffering of the peoples at the throat of new wars."

**Classes As War.**  
Another most deplorable evil is declared to be the loosening of social ties, chiefly through "the class struggle which have become the plague of all vital forces, namely, work, industry, art, commerce and agriculture, all of which contribute to the welfare and private welfare and prosperity. The struggle appears to be forever irreconcilable, being influenced, on the one side, by insatiable avarice, and on the other, by the tenacious selfishness of keeping material things."  
Between the lower and directing classes, the Pope notes, there is mutual competition to dominate and therefore, frequent strikes, with both sides contributing to the cause, together with enmities and rife, reaction and repression, reign among men, almost annihilating sentiments of mercy, charity and compassion, while the fitful peace written on paper has not yet awakened these noble sentiments of honor and revenge, making men lose the sense of personal dignity and of the value of human life. Owing to the prevalence of brutal force and of overwhelming numbers.  
Patriotism Warlike.  
"Love of country," the encyclical says, "incites to many virtues and even to admirable heroism, when it is guided by Christian law, but it incites to grave injustices, when it becomes unbridled nationalism, when it forgets that all peoples are brothers in the great family of humanity, that other nations have the right to live and prosper, and that it is never either wise or just to separate what is honest from what is useful."  
The encyclical denounces atheism as the deepest cause of the evils afflicting the world, as it separates men from Christ, who said:  
"We can do nothing."  
The document continues:  
"The atheists proclaim the necessity to have laws and governments without God, and finally without God, lowering the great sacrament of marriage to the level of a mere civil con-

tract, thereby undermining not only the domestic but also the foundations. "The atheists want God banished from the mechanism which therefore would become incapable of grasping the elements of peace, and order for families and for society.  
**Motely Suffers.**  
"We deplore that modesty in women and girls," the document says, "is treated with the same contempt as in dressing, in talking, in dancing unseemly dances with open insult to the misery of others, often rendered more acute still, if they are not free from ostentation and impudence of those whom sundry gales have enriched but not improved."  
The pontiff claims that in consequence of the war, the churches have not all yet been returned to religious services, while the rank of the clergy are still, in many instances, and missionaries are obliged to abandon the fields of their apostolic endeavors.

# TREATY MAKERS BUILD HOPES ON INTERMISSOINS

## Delegates at Lausanne Count on Two Days' Christmas Respite to Bring About More Conciliatory Attitudes

LAUSANNE, Dec. 23 (AP)—The Near East conference has taken a brief Christmas respite, and delegates attending there are general hope among the delegates that the two-day respite will aid the conference leaders in finding paths of wisdom and progress. Christmas week has not the conference back rather than forward, even the problem of the straits, which seemed to be a satisfactory subject for discussion, was placed in peril. **Set Prices of Guarantees.**

Turkey has been told to give one-year guarantee of non-aggression but such a pact will obligate the powers to be possible that will not be attacked; therefore give the international commission jurisdiction not only over the passage of ships through the straits but also over the demilitarization. Responsibility authority to prevent disaster.

But the Turks say that foreign supervision over Turkish zones would violate Turkey's sovereignty.

**Other Troublesome Issues.**  
There are other great conference difficulties—capitulations and customs duties—and the latter may never be settled at Lausanne. With respect to capitulations, which the Turks desire to be rid of, the allies and the United States, taking a firm attitude. They lack confidence in the Turkish judiciary and would be loath to have their citizens tried in purely Turkish courts. They wish to see a solution of this vital problem has not yet appeared.

The tariff question is vital to the United States, which, like Turkey, desires to make a general Turko-American treaty of commerce. The Turks seem unshakably determined to have their laws in their courts, and ascertains that their judges, some of whom are graduates of American law schools, are unbiased and capable.

# ROBBERS RIFLE JEWELRY STORE

New York Bandits Seize 71 Diamond Rings Valued at \$10,000 in Daring Raid

NEW YORK, Dec. 23 (AP)—Descending from an automobile into the midst of the throng of holiday shoppers on upper Broadway, three men tonight snatched the window of a jewelry store with a brick wrapped in towels and escaped with 71 diamond rings which flashed from trays in the display windows. The rings were valued at \$10,000.

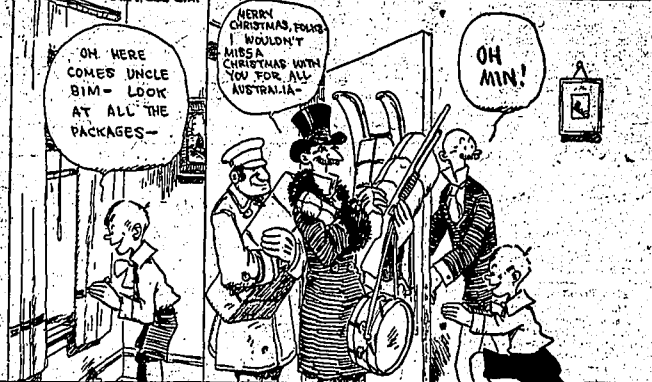

DEcries ALARM AT DIMINISHING OIL RESOURCES

Research Chemist Says Improved Methods Make Possible Use of Most Crude Product as Motor Fuel

CHICAGO, Dec. 23 (AP)—The alarm shown by the increasing oil supply, with the consumption of gasoline on the increase due to the increased use of the internal-combustion engine, would be needless were refiners receptive to evolution methods of distillation, asserts R. H. Manning of the Industrial Research Laboratories in discussing the motor fuel of the future. A single simple operation converting all crude oil except the very small portion into a high-grade motor fuel, out-ranking the present products, is advocated by Mr. Manning. "It is accomplished," he said, "by a single distillate from the crude to the refined without the distillate being redistilled, refining and re-refining as now very small portions. This, of course, will require a disregard for the lesser distillate, which would really be almost lost by many of the distilling oil supply. "The oil industry has outgrown its present methods. "It's production and chemical residues are being sold, and the agitation concerning the decreasing oil resources is weak and unfounded."

FREE STATE LIBERATES PRISONERS ON PLEDGES

Release of Nearly 100 During Past Two Weeks Is Announced at Irish Military Headquarters DUBLIN, Dec. 23 (AP)—Nearly a hundred prisoners have been released in the past fortnight, it was stated at Free State military headquarters today. Although the majority of them were given their freedom in the last few days, it was in no wise a Christmas arrangement. "The course of signing a pledge not to bear arms against the government has been opened to all prisoners for a considerable time, the officials added, but the approach of the holidays induced many of the republican prisoners to abandon their duty of arms. "Owing to previous experience with liberated persons breaking their promise, the military authorities made a careful selection of every case before granting release."

MEXICO GRANTS OIL CONCESSION

Los Angeles Interests Obtain Right to Explore Designated Fields Under Agreement

MEXICO CITY, Dec. 23 (AP)—Confirmation of the announcement made at Los Angeles today of an oil concession in the Mexican federal zone was obtained this afternoon from high officials of the department of commerce and industry, Secretary Rolles being out of the city. It was explained to the Associated Press that the Los Angeles interests were substantially correct, although "considerably less" than 11,000,000 acres is involved.

One stipulation of the agreement which up to today had not been known is that the promoters must drill at least three wells the first year and a similar number in succeeding years. Concessions involving federal lands in proven oil districts have been much sought by foreigners, especially American citizens. At the time of the big fire of the oil wells here last summer there were rumors that wholesale concessions were to be granted, but the project did not develop. In newspaper circles it is anticipated that the concession covering oil rights to the concession covering all federal lands, but the department of industry told United National that the grant was more for exploration purposes, relating to the fact that the government had reserved the right to designate drilling sites.

BABSON WARNS AGAINST BUILDING UP EXPENSES

Business Statistician Gives Advice to Employers Confronted with Present Scarcity of Skilled Labor

WELLESLEY HILLS, Mass., Dec. 23.—(Special to The News) Commenting on the present scarcity of skilled labor in certain lines, Roger W. Babson today issued a distinct warning to both executives and investors who would base future ventures on present conditions.

Employers, therefore, are going to be confronted with demands which, if granted, will of necessity mean increased production costs. In 1917 and 1918 we were in a similar position.

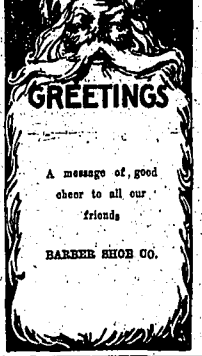

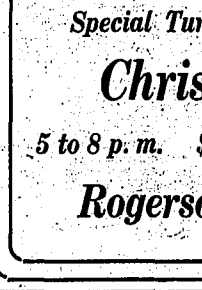
