Sets Out Evergreens. The Conservation and Recreation Association of Chautauque County at Dunkirk, N. Y. during the last year and a half has planted 9,000 spruce and Scotch pine on a tract the organization is returning.

In New York this spring thousands of trees will be set out by many towns. Orders to the New York State Conservation Commission have passed the two million mark for trees. Glens Falls takes 300,000 trees; Utica 10,000; Oneonta 35,000; Malone 25,000; while Little Falls which has a municipal forest wants 100,000 more trees and the East Aurora Fish and Game Club has entered an order for 100,000.

The Bankhead Highway is to be made a great Road of Remembrance and the plan has been endorsed by the Southern Council of Federated Club Women. The plans call for the planting memorial trees for the men of the world war, proper placing of shrubs and flowers along the highway with a view of giving any other form of memorial the proper status.

ECONOMIC CONGRESS TO BE CONVENED BY TURKS

Algiers Government Issues Decree for Assembly of Representatives of the Various Interests

CONSTANTINOPLE, Feb. 17 (AP)—An economic congress of Turkey is to be held at Smyrna at a date next month yet to be named. The decree ordering the election of delegates has been issued from Ankara. It provides that every Cassa, or district shall have eight delegates, one to represent commerce, another artisans, another workmen, and the fourth a chartered company of some kind, the fifth banking interests and the remaining three the agricultural community.

The congress will formulate recommendations for the economic organization of the country to be presented to the National Assembly. Kemal Pasha will preside and make the opening address.

SLEUTH TURNS UPON ACCUSER

Burns Agency Manager Starts Suit Against Confessed Spy Working for Reds

CHICAGO, Feb. 17 (AP)—Albert Ballin, alias Balanow, confessed spy and agent provocateur of various detective agencies, today was arrested on a charge of criminal libel proffered by Allen W. Myers, assistant manager of the W. E. B. International Detective Agency.

The charge grew out of Balanow's sworn statements during a deposition taken by Frank P. Walsh, for the defense of 22 alleged communists facing trial in St. Joseph, Mich. Myers charges that Balanow libeled him when the agent throve to be in a position threatening to blow up the Woolworth building and kill the postmaster of New York, by order of Myers, who at that time was in custody of the New York secretary of the Chicago Federation of Labor, paid \$5000 in cash for Balanow's bail and he was released.

Myers, on the stand today, described his work for the Burns agency and the activities of a former Burns operative, Lindenfeld, who after investigating the Wall Street bomb explosion for Burns, was arrested in Warsaw, Poland, and a "Red" in the hands of the British.

Served Communists. Lindenfeld told him, Myers said, that the Burns agency had given him \$2,500 to make the trip to Europe, which ended in his arrest at Warsaw on a bomb suspect, but Myers said he had no other knowledge of the payment or its purpose.

Myers, responding to Mr. Walsh's questioning, said Burns was working on radical cases, occasionally contributed funds to radical organizations, but said he was unable to estimate over approximately what those contributions totaled in any given year. The depositions here will be completed Monday morning with the cross examination of Myers.

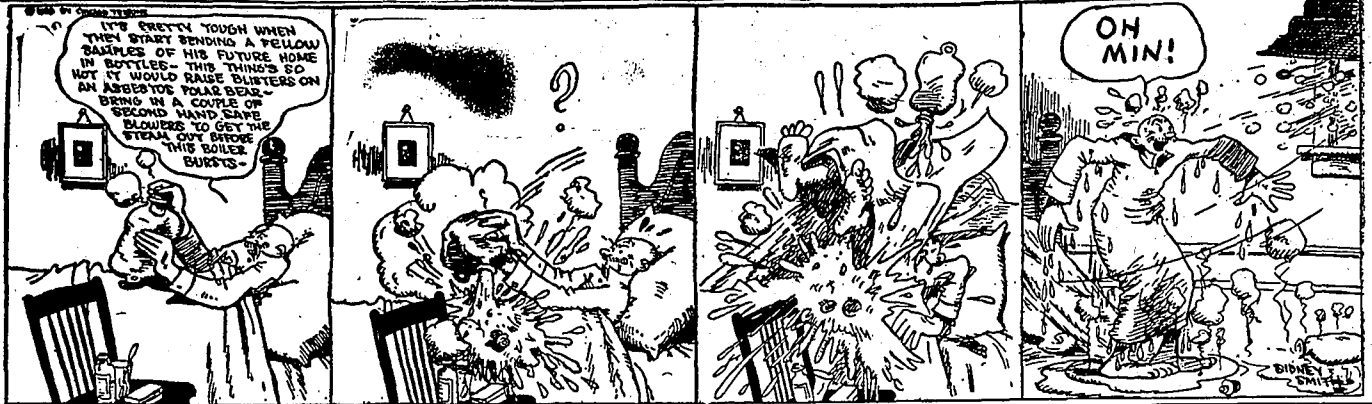
