

INDUSTRIES OF WEST TO BE PUT ON WAR BASIS

War Department to Make Survey of Manufacturing Plants with View to Munitions Making in Event of Emergency

SAN FRANCISCO, Mar. 12 (AP)—A survey of every sizable manufacturing plant in California, Washington, Oregon, Idaho and Nevada was started this month by the United States War Department to list the munitions making potentialities of the Pacific coast with a view of utilizing these plants immediately in the event of a major war emergency...

Major Morgan L. Brett, appointed an executive assistant to Colonel Corwall is enroute from Washington, D. C. to make the survey, which Colonel Corwall says will require at least six months to complete. The work will be started in San Francisco, Portland, Sacramento, Stockton and adjacent cities; Los Angeles and San Diego, Berkeley, San Bernardino, and other Southern California points will be surveyed next, and Seattle, Portland, Bellingham, Tacoma, Spokane, Boise, Reno, Tonopah, and other cities of the northwest and of Idaho and Nevada will follow.

Essential Preparations Industrial preparedness demands consideration and the development of man power, because of the great length of time it requires to prepare industrially, said Colonel Corwall. "We must develop and perfect the industrial forces of the Pacific Coast to adequately support the fighting forces. We must counteract indifference and we must forget the idea which is prevalent that we did a good job in the last war and will do even better in another one."

"That is why we are going ahead in time of peace to perfect plans for war. We will make a survey of every manufacturing plant of the country, the men or more. However, in event we find smaller plants that are manufacturing something vital to warfare, or small plants that have potentialities for expansion, we will include them in our work."

Contracts are being prepared to be entered into between the War Department and these manufacturing plants. In addition to warlike contracts these contracts may also provide for small 'educational orders' to be placed for the peace-time needs of the army. The army arsenal are capable of producing only ten per cent of the army's needs therefore, we must look to the manufacturing plants of the country for ninety per cent of our war materials.

World Remove War Threat However remote another war involving the United States may now be, we may be sure that such sound industrial preparedness as is being undertaken will tend to remove it still further.

Colonel Curwall is one of thirteen district chiefs appointed in the United States to prepare the country industrially for war. The districts are stationed at New York, Philadelphia, Chicago, Pittsburgh, St. Louis, Detroit, Cleveland, Cincinnati, Bridgeport, Boston, Baltimore, and Rochester. All of these men are promising business men and are newly appointed dollar-a-year men.

"Gaze," I commanded, "on the greatest golf performer who ever missed a ball. Last week at Hillsdale I went around in 150, and I will now..."

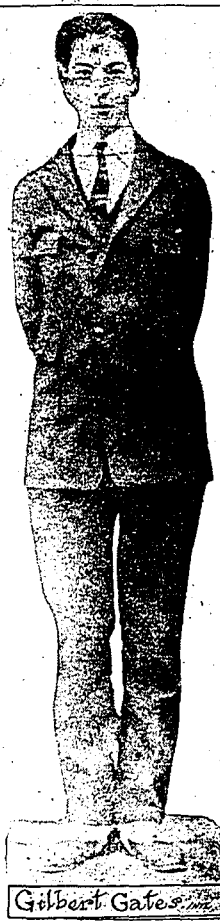

Lifts Mixed Motortrucks. For lifting motortrucks out of mud, sand or snow, in which they may be stranded, a portable attachment, shown in Popular Mechanics Magazine, for connection to a mixed wheel, is in the form of a wooden four-sided block, in length about half the width of the truck. About the middle of this block is an eyebolt through which a chain having a hook at one end is passed. The chain is long enough to encircle the rim of the wheel, against which it is made tight by aligning the hook into the link of the chain. A tubular extension at the end of the block is so made that, when two blocks are placed on opposite wheels, they will telescope together. The truck is lifted by the blocks when the wheels are rotated.

Wireless Hour Signals. When a ship is approaching shore great caution is often necessary because of uncertainty as to the vessel's precise position. It was some years ago that it was first proposed that wireless telegraphy be utilized to send hour signals over the sea round England to a distance of 200 or 300 miles from shore. In order that the captain of incoming ships might thus be enabled to rectify their chronometers to Greenwich time. The government of Canada thereupon established a system of this kind at Campdown, near Halifax. Every morning the exact hour is sent out over the sea, so that all vessels furnished with receiving apparatus may pick up the true time from the air.

Bar the Lightning Bolt. Lightning is quite likely to follow a drought or current of air, so during a storm it is wise to take refuge in a store and doors closed. If you are out in the open, don't run; running creates a draught that may be just enough to provide the path of least resistance that the lightning is looking for. In an open space in which you are the tallest object, make yourself as small as possible; in other words, lie down if you must shelter under a tree, select a beech, and avoid oak trees like poison; the chances of an oak being struck are 57 times greater than those of a beech. Better still, keep away from trees, especially isolated ones.

Tracing Migratory Birds. Returns from banded birds sent in to the biological survey of the United States Department of Agriculture constantly throw new light on the long distances traveled by migratory birds in their instinctive search for a warm place in winter. Mallard duck No. 102755, banded at Brownling, Ill., on March 12, was killed November 9 about seven miles southwest of Lexington, Neb., about 800 miles west. No. 102470, also a mallard duck, banded at Brownling on March 7, was shot November 12 at Leavenworth, Kan., some 50 miles west of where it started. Both of these ducks probably made a spring flight northward and then south in the fall to the point of capture.

FIRPO KNOCKS BRENNAN OUT IN 12TH ROUND

South American Heavyweight Cuts Loose with Terrific Attack to Earn Spurs as Contender for Title

NEW YORK, March 12. (AP)—Luis Angel Firpo, South American heavy weight, knocked out Bill Brennan of Chicago in the twelfth round of a sensational 15-round match tonight in Madison Square garden.

Firpo earned his spurs as a contender for Jack Dempsey's title by unleashing a terrific attack in the final round, after trailing his opponent on points for a number of rounds.

Brennan lay inert for several seconds after the count and had to be assisted to his corner. The victor was accorded a tremendous ovation.

The victory took Firpo a notch nearer a title match with Jack Dempsey. The South American, outgeneraled and outboxed by his more experienced rival for a good share of the contest, thought the bout to a sudden conclusion by an attack like this.

Firpo's dramatic victory drew forth tremendous acclaim from a throng of more than 12,000.

assault that drove Brennan to the ropes. Firpo published the Chicagoan with hard blows to the head and had the crowd in an uproar.

Round three—Brennan shot in several lefts but drew a series of rights to the head in retaliation. Firpo drove his opponent to the ropes and landed several body blows.

Round four—Brennan halted Firpo's rush with two hard lefts to the head. The Argentinian whipped over a right uppercut that dazed his opponent and followed with several smashes to the head.

Round five—Brennan swapped rights with Firpo at close quarters, but was sent back by a right uppercut. The Chicagoan blocked most of Firpo's swings and hoisted the South American with a left jab.

Round six—Brennan had Firpo caught up in a right uppercut. A flow of blood from the South American's injured eye. Firpo came back with a smashing drive and the two exchanged blows at a terrific pace in close quarters.

Round seven—Firpo took a hard right to the body and a left to the head. The South American landed a right to the jaw but missed most of his swings.

Round eight—Firpo shot in a hard right to the head and parried Brennan's attack. Brennan shot in a left jab but drew a stiff body punch in return.

Round nine—Firpo exchanged rights to the head and fired a lone with a two-fisted attack that rocked Brennan's head from side to side.

Round ten—Brennan forced Firpo back with a jabbing attack to the head. The South American missed two terrific rights.

Round eleven—They opened the round at a fast pace, trading hard blows to the head.

Round twelve—Firpo rushed from his corner and landed three smashing rights to the head.

Brennan blocked several rights to the head but the Argentinian was the aggressor and punned Brennan about the head.

Bonded Warehouse Necessary. In making advances on warehouse receipts, the credit banks can accept only receipts from bonded government warehouses or satisfactorily bonded warehouses operating under satisfactory state supervision and regulation.

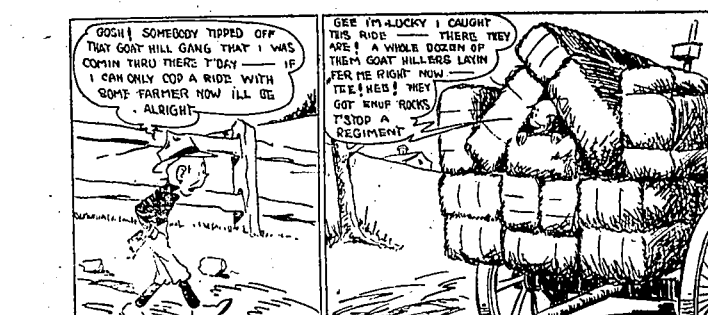
