

WINTER WHEAT IS SMALL CROP

Department of Agriculture Forecast Indicates a Heavy Shrinkage of Grain Acreage

WASHINGTON, April 9 (AP)—This year's winter wheat crop was forecast today by the department of agriculture at 572,317,000 bushels, the smallest crop since 1916, and 17,537,000 bushels less than the average production for the last 10 years.

The forecast was based on conditions prevailing April 1 and upon the assumption of average abandonment of acreage through the winter and average influences from now until harvest.

No estimate was made of the abandoned acreage, which will be indicated in the May crop report, but in summarizing conditions as they existed April 1, the department said abandonment promises to be heavy, although irregular, from Ohio westward to Kansas and Nebraska.

The acreage sown to winter wheat last fall was about 1,200,000 acres, less than sown in the fall of 1921, the total having been 46,059,000 acres for this year's crop, compared with 47,011,000 acres for last year's crop. The abandoned acreage last year amounted to almost 5,500,000 acres, and indications are that the abandonment this year will be more extensive.

This year's rye production was forecast at 75,781,000 bushels, which is almost 20,000,000 less than last year's crop, the third largest ever grown.

NEW ENGINE IS WONDER

Completed Tests for Airplane Motor Indicate Saving of 80 Per Cent in Operating Costs

WASHINGTON, April 9 (AP)—Completion of a record-breaking test of a new airplane engine was announced Saturday night by the navy department.

For 573 hours the machine, known as a Wright model E-4, ran without a stop with the throttle wide open, and data accumulated during the run indicated a "saving of 80 per cent in the operating cost of aircraft engines of this type." An indication of the remarkable endurance of the new engine will be given, engineers said, in comparison with the types used in the world war when 100 hours was considered a long run.

The engine was built by the Wright Aeronautical corporation of Paterson, N. J. During the test it would have covered at the usual cruising speed maintained by the navy at sea a distance of approximately 60,000 miles, in the period of a little more than three weeks, according to Rear Admiral William A. Moffett, chief of the bureau of aeronautics.

Admiral Moffett compared its record to the average better grade high-power automobile which, he said, traveled around 6,500 miles annually. At the rate theoretically flown by the new engine it could have carried the automobile for approximately nine years at 100 miles an hour.

"The improvement is the result of intensive work for more than a year in the engineering section of the bureau of aeronautics," Admiral Moffett said, adding that a new standard has been set up both in regard to operating cost and to dependability.

Two-Dollar Bill to Have No Place in New Currency

Protective Features, Not Superstition, Influencing Factor in Recommendation

WASHINGTON, April 9 (AP)—Recommendations for a general revision of the designs of all paper money have been almost completed by a special committee of treasury officials and are expected soon to be turned over to Secretary Mellon. If the findings of the committee are adopted, the two-dollar bill is shunned by the gambler and mutilated by the superstitious, and it of any ill omen—will be the first to go.

The committee will propose a standardization of designs of paper money of the same denominations so that the United States and federal reserves, gold certificates and other legal currency will appear the same except for the designation of its source. These plans call for similarity of color, portrait, which are regarded as the greatest protective feature of modern currency, and of general markings.

A call was issued for an all-race conference not later than April 1, 1924, at which negroes should consider lynching, Ku Kluxism, segregation, disfranchisement, unequal enforcement of law, and peonage.

SEVENTY-EIGHT CITIES TO PASS 100,000 MARK

Census Bureau Records Most Rapid Growth Among Ten Municipalities in New Classification to Flint, Mich.

WASHINGTON, April 9 (AP)—Seventy-eight cities of the country will have a population of 100,000 or more on July 10 this year according to estimates of the census bureau.

There were 68 in 1921, the 1923 estimates for which were published yesterday. Of the ten additional cities, Flint, Mich., made the most rapid growth, its estimate being 117,500, which ranks it as sixth largest city in population. Erie, Pa., is estimated at 112,571, placing it in sixth-sixth rank. Duluth takes rank as seventh city with 107,280. Elizabeth, N. J., now ranks as seventh-seventh city with 103,947. Estimates for the other cities which have advanced into the 100,000 class follow:

- Lynn, Mass., seventy-fourth, 102,683;
- Tulsa, Okla., seventy-fifth, 102,018;
- Tucson, Wash., seventy-sixth, 101,701;

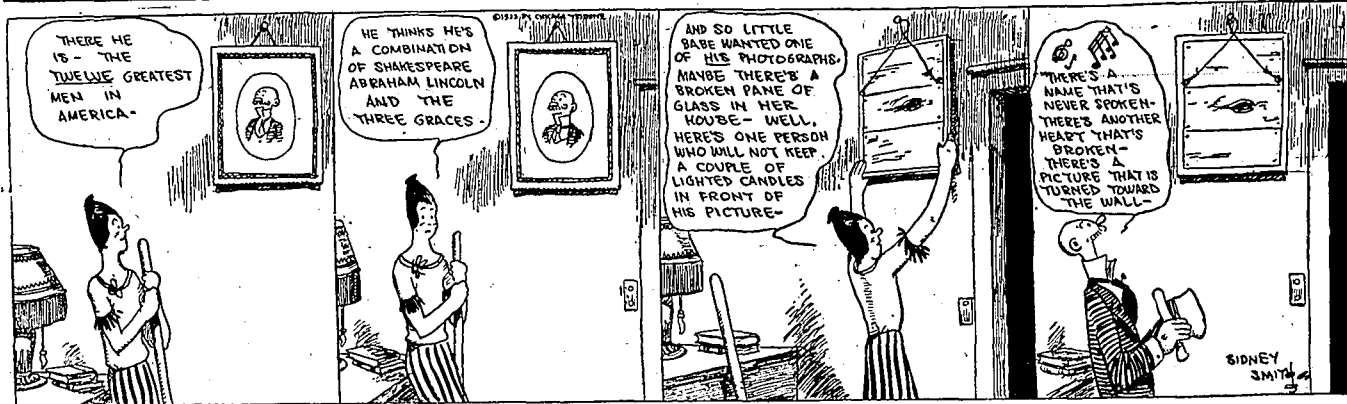

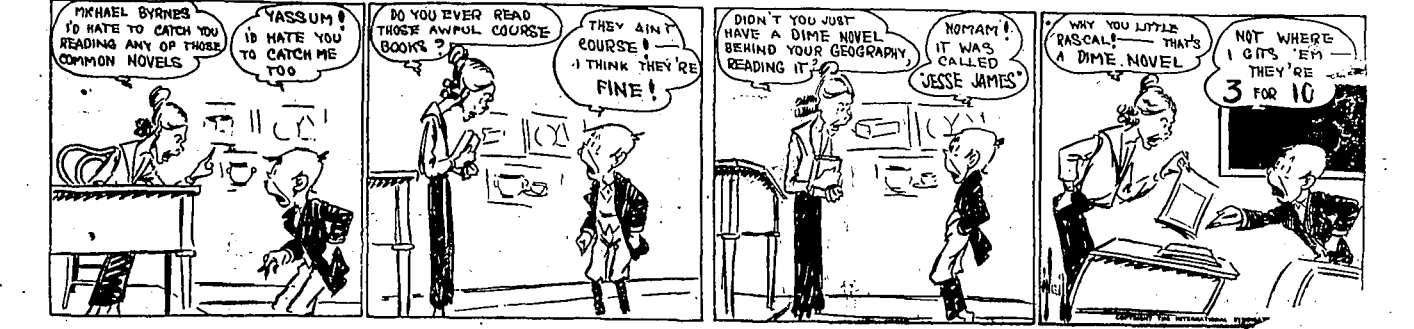
