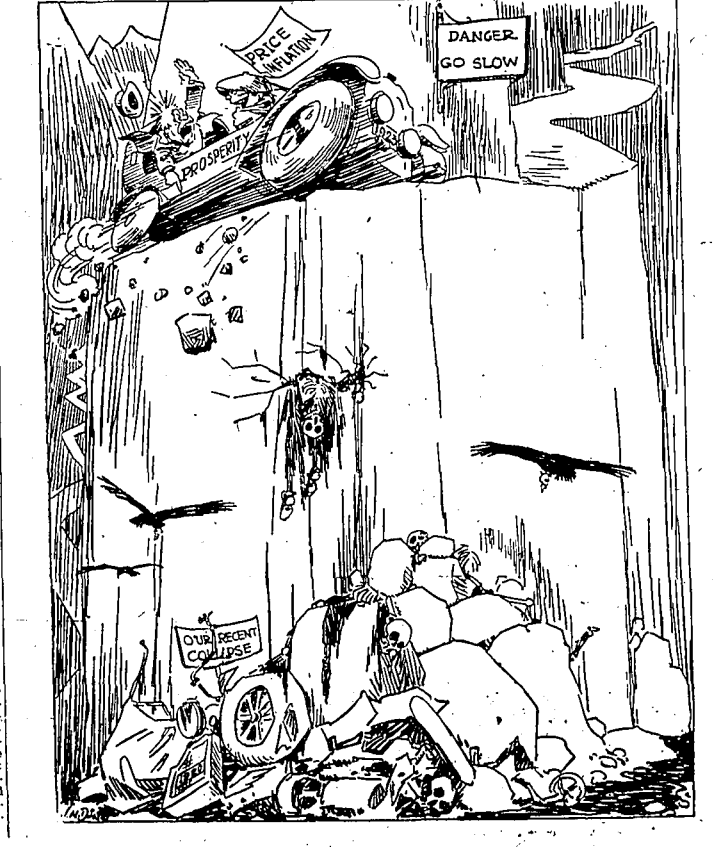

EARTH TREMORS PLAY HAVOC IN MEXICAN STATE

Supreme Court Upholds Grain Futures Act Placing Exchanges Under Federal Control

CONGRESS WINS POINT WITH SECOND ATTEMPT

Decision, Reached by Court with Division, 7 to 2, Marks Attainment of Goal after Years of Agitation for the Suppression of "Gambling" by "Wire Houses" Using Quotations

Non-Stop Dancers Continue Stepping in Hall on Wheels

Participants in Endurance Test Evade Police by Transferring Activities to Truck

NEW YORK, April 16 (AP)—New York's eight non-stopping non-stoppers, who have danced their way from this state to New Jersey and back again in their attempts to set a new dancing endurance record, despite the rulings of the law and ballroom proprietors, started a jazz journey to Connecticut tonight.

Threatened by the police here last night, they forsook their moving van, where a phonograph furnished music while they crossed the Hudson to a Fort Lee, N. J., hall. They shuffled peacefully there until this afternoon. Then the police invited them to leave.

The manager there allowed them to stay only a few minutes and they walked into their van once more and headed for "somewhere in Connecticut." The managers of none of the dance halls knew what town they might land in.

Defend Profit Margin. Counsel for the exchanges pointed out that their members were required to charge uniform commissions on trades made by them, whereas congress proposed to fix a maximum rate...

Taft Delivers Opinion. Chief Justice Taft, who delivered the majority opinion, to which Justices McReynolds and Sutherland concurred, dissent without delivering minority opinion, stated that decisions referred to established, in the judgment of the court, clear grounds for holding the new law valid.

Under the showing made by the evidence and argument presented in the case, he said, the court would not question the necessity of the decision of congress that transactions on grain exchanges were susceptible of being made a restraint on interstate commerce.

So impressed with the public interest in transactions in grain, he added, that exchanges on which they are made necessarily become legitimate subjects for federal supervision, including even their membership. It was properly within the functions of congress, the court held, not only to impose supervision over the transactions, but to define what should be permitted to engage in interstate commerce.

WASHINGTON, April 16 (AP)—The grain futures act, placing all grain exchanges under federal control and compelling them to admit to membership only bona fide farmers' cooperative associations, was declared constitutional by the supreme court today, the court dividing seven to two.

Directs Federal Marshal to Bring Whale into Court

BLOXI, Miss., April 16 (AP)—As a result of a legal quibble over the ownership of a whale found several days ago off the coast of Bloxi, the federal court for the southern district of Mississippi today issued a writ of execution directing the United States marshal here to "seize and bring into court" the whale, weighing more than 75 tons and measuring more than 65 feet and valued at \$100,000.

GRAIN TRADERS TAKE CHEERFUL VIEW OF RULING

Board of Trade President Predicts Greater Use of Futures System; Pledges Co-operation in Enforcement

CHICAGO, April 16 (AP)—American grain exchanges have given the stamp of governmental approval, John J. Stream, president of the Chicago Board of Trade, declared in a statement tonight on the supreme court decision upholding the grain futures act.

"It's well," he continued, "that this action will tend to encourage the grain trade into greater use of the futures trading system for hedging and for commercial price insurance purposes. As the law is interpreted, the futures market will not be interrupted in any way during the formalities incident to the application of grain exchanges for designation as contract markets."
