NEW SUBPOENA OUT FOR PAYNE IN MORSE CASE

Newly Appointed Commissioner to Mexico is Wanted to Testify in Trial on Shipping Fraud Charges

WASHINGTON, April 25 (AP)—Events today in the Morse trial in the District of Columbia subpoena court for the newly appointed commissioner to Mexico to appear as a witness will delay his departure for Mexico City.

Whether service of the subpoena for Mr. Payne to appear as a witness will delay his departure for Mexico City to confer with Mexican commissioners relative to American recognition of the shipping board, the conclusion of the opening statement of the government's case and the beginning of a reply by the defense.

Mr. Payne is listed as a witness for both the government and the defense. Opening the statement for the defense, Attorney Noah Robinson of New York, asserted that not a single net set out in the indictments had been consummated and that the case narrowed back down to the proposition of whether the eight defendants had conspired together at a time of "great national stress" to defraud the government and to delay and hinder its program of ship construction.

HARDING'S PLAN DRAWS INTEREST

League of Nations Circles in Paris Welcome American Adhesion to Court

PARIS, April 25 (AP)—President Harding's declarations regarding American membership in the permanent court of international justice made in his speech at the Associated Press luncheon in New York yesterday, were given wide publicity here and have attracted much interest among Parisian circles.

"The United States is bound to interest itself in this way in the world's affairs," Senator Henri de Jouvenel, editor of the Matin and prominently identified with league activities.

"The Atlantic ocean is not a body of water separating the United States from Europe, it is in reality a highway of communication between the two continents."

"This step," continued Senator de Jouvenel, "will certainly be welcomed by the league of nations. What I have never been able to understand is the attitude of the United States. She gave us the league and then she said: 'It is a very desirable thing for us, but you keep it; it will do you a lot of good.'"

"Well, we have it, and it is doing us some good, but it would do us more if the United States joined and I am certain that eventually she will join. The league is certainly ready to receive any nation unsatisfied with the United States, such as article X."

Life Rafts for Wharves and Docks.
 Although ships have carried life rafts for many years, the only provision ordinarily made on docks and wharves for accidents is the common, round life preserver. These are inadequate at times, especially in the event of a gang-plank breaking and precipitating several persons into deep water at once. A California seaport, realizing this danger, has installed life rafts mounted on trucks for instant moving and launching. They are almost the size used by ships, but with a double deck body and a central cockpit for passengers, the whole being rigidly mounted on pontoons. The buoyancy of these rafts is sufficient to support a large number of persons.

Famous Chinese Tombs.
 The famous Ming tombs are located near Nanking, China. On the road that leads to them from Nanking are colossal figures of carved stone. These are statues of Chinese kings. The Mongols under Genghis Khan's successor swept across Asia and Russia and overran Hungary. He defeated the Germans and Poles in 1241. But the mongols were beaten by Egypt in 1259. After that their power waned, and China was able to throw off the Mongol yoke in 1290, when she established a rule of native kings—the great Ming dynasty. Under the Mings, China flourished until 1644. Then the Manchus, another Mongol people, reconquered China, and resumed masters until 1912.

There is a fence built around these statues, because the Chinese believe that the statues would be very mad if a common Chinaman were to touch them.

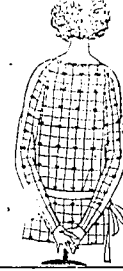

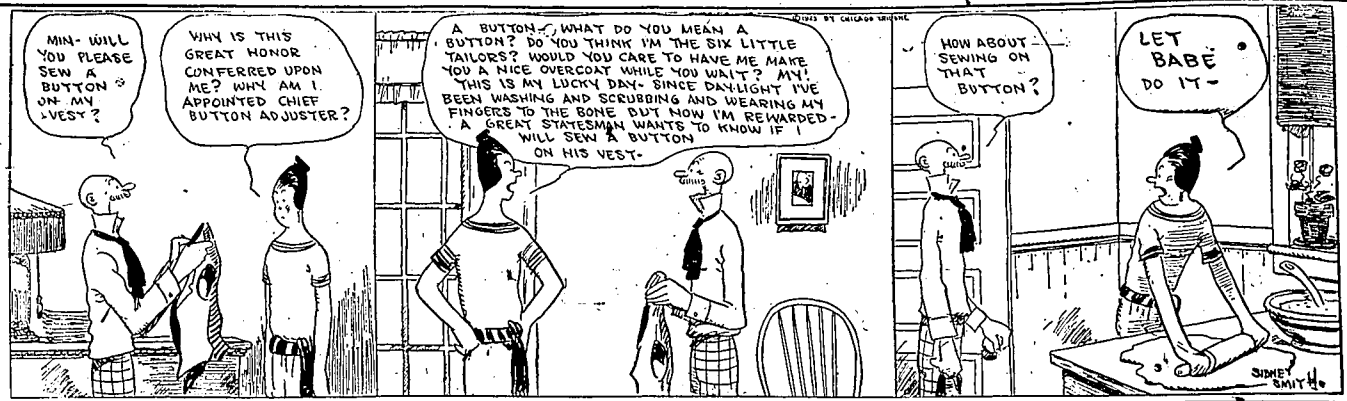

MILWAUKEE, Wis., April 25 (AP)—Charges of conspiracy to "throw games in world series contest of 1919 to the Cincinnati National league team are made against Oscar (Happy) Felsch and Charles ("Swede") Blumberg, in answers filed in circuit court here today by the Chicago American baseball club to the suits of the deposed White Sox players.

The club avers that Felsch and Blumberg neglected to inform the management of the alleged illegal arrangements to lose games and that they continued to play on the team until September 28, 1920, when for the first time the club learned of the scandal.

General demurrers made by the White Sox club to the charges of conspiracy and slander complaints are scheduled for argument before Judge Murray tomorrow.

NEWSPAPER MEN TALK PROBLEMS

Maintenance of School for Printers is Under Fire at Association Convention

NEW YORK, April 25 (AP)—Labor problems, with particular emphasis on the question of maintaining schools for printers, were foremost among subjects taken up today by the American Newspaper Publishers' association in annual convention here.

Printing local unions in some cities said a report on the Mason (Pa.) printing school, which the A. N. P. A. supports, "delight to crush the new operator if it is learned he is from the school." Many union members, the report advised, were "virious opposition" to it, giving student printers discouraging pictures of conditions in the industry and warning them that even if they completed the course they will be unable to find jobs until they have gone through a five-year apprenticeship and obtained union cards.

Further support of the Mason school was opposed by some eastern and middle-western publishers on the ground that it was too far away to be of service to them. They suggested transference of their support to the school operated by the New York State Publishers' association at Ithaca, or to various smaller regional schools.

A committee was finally appointed with instructions to report back tomorrow with a program on the school subject. Committee members were: G. C. Carter, Fort Worth, Texas; Star Telegram; Harry Chandler, Los Angeles, (Cal.) Times; J. D. Barnum, Syracuse, (N. Y.) Post-Standard; Urey Woodson, Orem, Utah; E. B. Piper, Portland, (Ore.) Oregonian; and W. J. Pattison, Scranton, (Pa.) Republican.

Other topics taken up included support of the association's bureau of advertising, various questions concerning free publicity and improvement of second class mail service. The latter subject occupied a large part of the forenoon session at which the publishers hear Postmaster General New. Mr. New explained that most of the trouble was due to failure on the part of publishers to wrap their papers for the mails so that they could be readily distinguished from third and fourth class matter.

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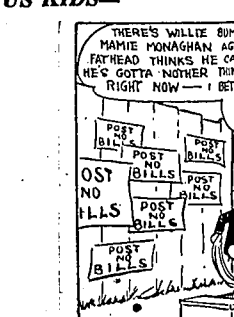
