

COURT CLOSES 3-MILE LIMIT TO INTOXICANTS

Sustains Daugherty's Ruling Except with Regard to Right of American Ships on the High Seas

WASHINGTON, April 30 (AP)—Intoxicating liquors, even under seal, cannot lawfully be brought in American or foreign ships within three miles of the shores of the United States, the supreme court held today in a decision which declared, however, that outside the three-mile limit American vessels can legally sell intoxicants to passengers. The right of foreign ships to do so had not been questioned.

The opinion, rendered in 10 cases brought by foreign and two by American citizenship companies, was written by Justice Van Devanter. Without expressing his views, Justice McReynolds dissented. Justice Sutherland, in a dissenting opinion, agreed with the majority of the court in reference to American ships, but declared that foreign vessels had the right to bring liquors to American ports under restrictions adequately guarding against leakage ashore.

The effect of the decision was to affirm that of Judge Nathan in New York, insofar as it sustained the opinion of Attorney General Daugherty that intoxicants could not legally be brought into American ports and to reverse it with respect to the right of American vessels to have liquor aboard high seas and in foreign ports.

Days to Press Advantage.

The court today pointed out specifically that congress has the power, if it sees fit to exercise it, to forbid all ships flying the American flag to carry and serve liquor outside the three-mile limit. This view of the court resulted in predictions by many "dry" leaders, after the first of the decision, had become known, that an attempt would be made to obtain legislation of this point at the earliest opportunity.

Swinging in its scope, the decision left administration officials somewhat at sea as to how they would proceed as a matter of permanent policy. Chairman Lusk of the shipping board announced for the present at least, the ban on liquor would be kept on all shipping board vessels. The treasury, it became known, intends to begin next week to retrofit its fleet of boats and American vessels being placed on the same basis within the three-mile limit.

Haynes Voices Gratification.

Prohibition Commissioner Haynes, expressing gratification at the court's decision, said that it would greatly simplify prohibition enforcement within American territorial waters, his view being that a benefit would be gained by the removal of American vessels being placed on the same basis within the three-mile limit.

The question is expected to come up for discussion at tomorrow's cabinet meeting. Attorney General Daugherty will participate in discussions for the first time in more than two months and it is likely that he will have suggestions to make as to policy. He declined to discuss the decision today, but began an extensive study of the various points made by the court.

GOETHALS DETAILS DEAL WITH MORSE CONSENSUS

First Head of Emergency Fleet Corporation is Called as Witness in Trial of War Time Ship Frauds Case

WASHINGTON, April 30 (AP)—Renewed efforts by the defense to have Charles W. Morse and others with war time ship frauds and the beginning of the testimony with Major General George W. Goethals, retired, as the government's first witness, were developments today in the Morse trial. The question of discussing the indictments went over. It was raised by Attorney General Lambert who presented affidavits to support the contention that one of the Morse concerns who returned the true bill was not a resident of the District of Columbia.

During the examination of Major General Goethals, the defense attacked the organization and was the first general manager of the Emergency Fleet Corporation, it was brought out that the first offer of the Morse concerns to build wooden hulls for the government was on a cost plus basis and that this offer was rejected. A contract for 12 such hulls on a lump sum basis later was awarded to the Gorton Iron works at \$300,000 for each.

TASK OF SHEARING NATION'S SHEEP SWINGS UNDER WAY IN THE WEST

Shearing some 200,000,000 pound of wool is the gigantic task begun by American sheep growers. Gathering the gray mountains of wool starts first in California and Arizona. Then the fleecy cloud moves east and north into less temperate climates, with the clip... started by early June.

American wool importations, however, are several times the domestic production. This country produced 281,095,000 pounds of wool in 1922, but according to J. C. Wilson, secretary of the Wyoming Wool Growers Association, it is too early to predict the crop of 1923. Unlike most crops, the wool supply per sheep increases with the severity of the weather.

This year the shearing of some

35,000,000 sheep is simple compared with the old days of hand shears when gangs of reactive workers swept along with the tide of the clip, much as the harvest army surges north with the whirl of the reaper. Mechanics have largely solved the annual labor problem and likewise effected a huge saving in wool. On such great shears as those Senator Robert N. Stanfield of Oregon... perhaps the largest American wool grower, are shearing factories through which 2,000 sheep pass in a day. One automatic shearer removes thin thick coats of 150 sheep in twelve hours. Besides the labor saving, the saving in wool is considerable. Old blades are estimated as high as 15 per cent.

The sheep are sheared close to the hide. On fleeces such as Senator Stanfield's... from 200,000 to 800,000 animals, the saving is enormous, and even farmers with as few as twenty animals are profiting by discarding the old blades for the small automatic shearer.

Experts say that the future holds better days for the wool grower as the pendulum swings from the long period of depression.

LEGION COMMANDER HITS MEMORIAL DAY SPORTS

Wyoming Department Head Denounces Revelry on Day Set Apart for Remembrance of Dead Comrades

CHEYENNE, Wyo., April 28 (AP)—Dr. A. B. Tonkin, commander of the Wyoming department of the American Legion, tonight issued a statement denouncing the custom of holding frontier exhibitions, rodeos, races, athletic exhibitions, shows and other amusements on Memorial day and calling upon all communities in this state to prohibit such affairs in the future.

Memorial day should be kept sacred to the memory of the dead," read the statement. "It is not a day of revelry or rejoicing or celebration, but a time for reverence, honor and respect to dead comrades."

"It is not in any manner a day for the celebration of victory, but a day to pay tribute to those who gave their lives in the service of their country."

Blind Spots.
The world has its "blind spots" for thunder and lightning, says a bulletin of the National Geographic society. The brilliant flash of lightning and the crackle and rumble of thunder would be as impossible of conception by many Eskimos as would "solid water" by equatorial savages.

In general the frequency of thunderstorms decreases as one goes north, until within the Arctic and Antarctic Circles they seldom occur.

When Katmai volcano, on the Alaskan peninsula, erupted in 1912, some of the adult natives of the vicinity were more terrified at the lightning and thunder that accompanied the dark clouds than at the possibility of being buried by ash, because they had nothing in their lifeline experience by which to judge the blinding and deafening noise from the skies.

Mahogany Woodwork.
Mahogany was first introduced in Europe by a Captain Gibbons, who, thinking it worthless, ballasted his ship with the wood when returning from the West Indies. Woolston, a cabinet-maker in Long Acre, London, made a bureau for the captain's brother, and the wood was so admired that it quickly became fashionable and valuable.

"CANNON" PROVED A FAILURE

Indian War Party Suffered Through the Inventive Genius of One of Their Number.

One of the most peculiar pieces of ordnance ever invented was that which was tried for its sole occasion at the burning of Hot Springs, in what is now West Virginia, by Simon Girty, the famous renegade, and his several hundred Indian followers, on September 1, 1777.

All day long, without success and with considerable loss, the savages and their still more savage leader had been attempting to carry the little stockade with its handful of defenders. Night had settled down and their patience was short, when some inventive genius amongst them suggested the making of artillery with which to batter down the stubborn walls.

A simple log, already followed by the process of time, was bound with chains, plugged at the breech with wood, filled to the muzzle with stones, pieces of iron and other missiles. It was then conveyed to within 60 yards of the gate and discharged. The log burst into a thousand pieces, its fragments scattering in all directions and killing several of the attackers. And not a picket of the fort was injured.

BABE'S DEATH CHARGED TO GIRL SCHOOL TEACHER

Accused Woman Admits She Mailed Infant to Fictional Person, Federal Agent Declares

CROWLEY, La., April 30 (AP)—Miss Jovie Fultz, 21, of Newellton, La., admitted today, according to United States Commissioner Leon Bous, that she had mailed a young girl, an infant from Scott, La., where she was teaching school, to a fictitious person at Duncan, Okla.

Sheriff Letolas of Lafayette parish, went to Opelous today with a warrant for her arrest on a charge of murder. The young woman is being held by the federal authorities.

The girl, who was highly esteemed in the community, is in a serious condition because she had not received medical attention either before or after the birth of the child. Federal officials placed her in a hospital in Opelous as soon as they ascertained her condition.

What and Where Kent's Hole is.
A cavern in the vicinity of Torquay, England, famous not only for its relics of primitive man, but also for its remains of extinct animals, is known as Kent's Hole. Although the existence of this cave had been known from time immemorial, it did not attract the attention of scientists until 1825. Excavations were carried on by Pengelly from 1835 to 1850, at a cost of nearly £2,000 and yielded results of the highest importance to the science of anthropology.

There were found flint tools of the paleolithic age and implements of bone, such as needles, awls and harpoons. The animal remains discovered comprised those of the lion, hyena, bear, wolf, fox, rhinoceros, mammoth, Irish elk and reindeer, showing that those animals once lived in Britain and were contemporaneous with men of the Stone age.

URGES POWERS TO INTERVENE TO AVERT WAR

Adviser to President Li Yuan-Hung Solicits Aid of Foreign Diplomats to Prevent Civil Conflict in China

PEKING, April 30 (AP)—Intervention by foreign diplomatic representatives to prevent impending civil war which many observers believe is about to break out between the Fengtien faction, headed by Chang Tso-Lin, dictator of Manchuria and the Chihli party, led by Tsao Kuo, was urged today by B. Lennox Simpson, adviser to President Li Yuan-Hung.

Emissaries from President Li have been assured by Chang most emphatically that he has no warlike intentions and the chief executive, it is reported, has repeated this statement to the Manchurian war lord to Tsao Kuo, with the recommendation that Tsao cease his recent menacing troop movements. Mr. Simpson, drawing his deductions from nightly news broadcasts of Chi Li troops northward through Peking, credits the belief expressed elsewhere that another clash is imminent between the two powerful forces, which last year battled for control of Peking, when Chih Li won and Chang, with his defeated Fengtien forces, returned to his Manchurian stronghold.

Mr. Simpson recommends that the foreign diplomats demand pledges that China adhere to her trade treaty stipulations, which include demilitarization of the Mukden railway in conformity with the protocol of 1901 and consultation of the wishes of the Chinese people through the president, the provincial assemblies, trade guilds and chambers of commerce. In this way, the presidential adviser points out, developments might be influenced by legitimate diplomatic methods and the president's hands strengthened in his efforts to avert civil war.

Meanwhile Tsao Kuo's Chi Li forces are pouring northward along the Kalgan railway, while it is said that a year's accumulation of ammunition at the Tschow arsenal has been shipped in their wake.

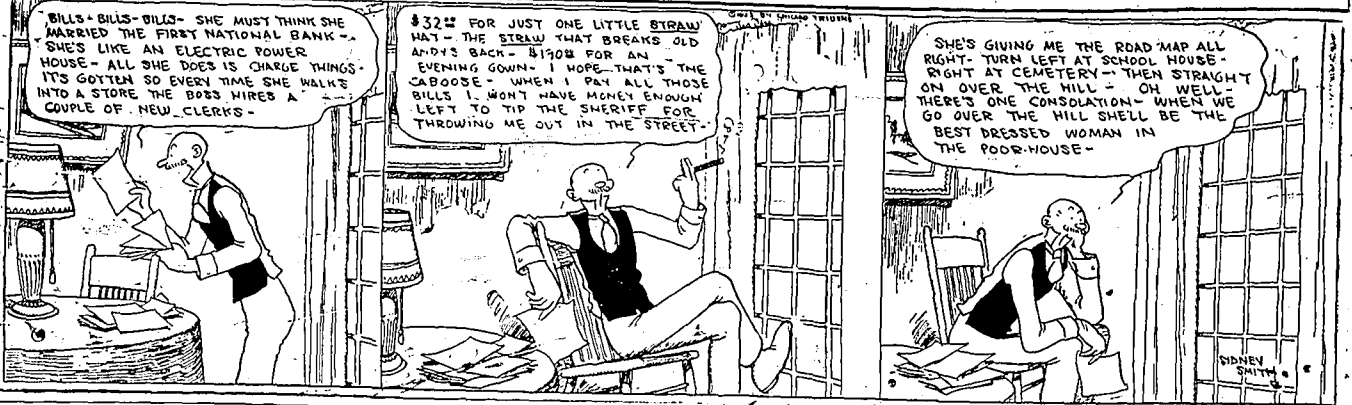

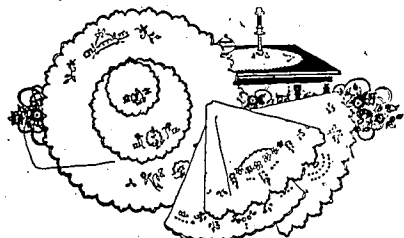
