

TRADE BALANCE TURNS AGAINST UNITED STATES

Situation Promises to Relieve American Monetary System of Excess Gold and Restore Foreign Credits

WASHINGTON, May 15, (AP)—The balance of international trade turned sharply against the United States in March, and continuing so during April, according to estimates made today by the commerce department which valued March imports at \$102,000,000, and exports during the month at \$311,762,000.

In a supplementary statement the department indicated that customs collections from April imports had been equally heavy and added that during the first four months of the calendar year the United States had taken approximately \$50,000,000 more in goods and commodities from abroad than it had sold.

The department's statement pointed out that in any consideration of trade balances, the "invisible" items of expenditures abroad by American tourists of money sent by persons in the United States to friends and relatives in foreign countries, of interest paid on investments in America by foreigners, and of shipping charges and insurance, must be included.

The sum total of these ordinarily is considered as a purchase by the United States of goods and services from abroad which do not appear in the formal accounts of merchandise bought and sold. The department said, however, that in previous years the first four months trade had almost uniformly resulted in a favorable balance to the United States, without regard to "invisible" items.

Harding Foresees Turn.

No mention was made of the tariff controversy in the official study, though President Harding some months ago was said to be expecting a turn in the trade balance against the United States and to consider that the tariff had in no way prevented the purchase abroad by Americans of vast quantities of merchandise.

It was also said at the time that the turn in the balance of trade against the country would have a final result of bringing about the shipment of part of the monetary gold stock of the United States which was swelled during and after the war, back to the countries from which it came, and this, it was officially declared, would be a benefit to all concerned.

A large part of it he attributes to the work of that busy little animal, the beaver. The beaver, he says, builds a dam across a brook that flows through a swamp. Painting One's Own Car

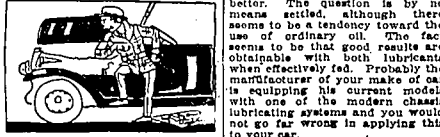
Worth Considering By Thrifty Owners, Who Are Not Too Fastidious

THE FOLLOWING WILL be of no interest to the "flicky" motorist who is satisfied only with perfection in car finish, but it may be worth reading by the motorist, who is satisfied with car finish which will pass a casual examination creditably, who has a little extra time, who is disposed to economize rather closely and who doesn't wish to lose the use of his car for several weeks by taking it to a shop for a "real" painting job. Refinishing an open car, by the application of one of the "one-day" drying varnish paints, is a job which can be performed by any intelligent person and, if carefully done, will give it a respectable appearance for a year or more. Unless one has a tightly built garage, from which dust can mostly be excluded and which can be kept warm, good results will hardly be obtainable. First sweep the garage floor thoroughly, jack the car up on all four, remove the hood, front wheels, all lamps, tire carrier, number plates, etc. It does not pay to take off the mud guards, but the rear wheels should be removed, if this can be done readily. With medium sandpaper, smooth off the worst of the roughness, but it will hardly pay to attempt the remaining job. With plenty of clean waste and gasoline, go over the entire surface to be treated and remove the grease and dirt from it conscientiously, for if this is not done, the new paint will positively not hold. The cleaning of the wheels, axles and other prominent exposed parts is rather a dirty job and must be done thoroughly, but it hardly pays to clean and refinish many under parts or the under surfaces of the mud guards. Remember that dust floating in the air and lack of cleanliness of the surfaces are the two most important causes of failure. Don't use waste or other fuzzy material about the car after paint has been applied. Rest the hood securely on two horses, so that you can get at it conveniently and take other detached parts to a dust free room for treatment. If extra space is restricted, refinish with the old color in the easiest, but these prepared paints cover other colors very well, nevertheless. Go to a reliable paint store and get a sufficient amount of the brand of single-cent quick-drying, automobile paint, which they recommend most highly and be sure and get first rate brushes of the sizes they consider right.

TIGHT PISTONS SCRATCH CYLINDER WALLS

A. E. B. writes: My car was delivered to me with the pistons so tight that after running 1,500 miles of running, the engine as still stiff, when hot. On removing the cylinder head, I find two of the cylinders scratched appreciably to the extent of touch, although hardly touching. There is no acetone blow-by and no oil pumple. I have always had this engine, as I know it goes tight. What had better be done to prevent matters from getting worse?

Answer: The best thing you could do would be to take out the engine and have it imbered up on a running stand by a steam power, but this would be quite an expensive job. If it were sure, we should try to assemble which one pint of cylinder oil had been added to each five-gallons of fuel and which the method of ordinary oil in the crankcase, oil containing defoliated graphite (not calcium soap) in the cylinder. We should keep on "sbying" the engine, never allowing it to assume



OLDEST ARTICLES IN WORLD

Chipped Stones, Found in England, Believed to Be Most Ancient of Made Implements.

According to an English antiquary, the oldest manufactured articles in the world are probably some chipped stones found on the Kentish Weald, in England.

Far back, countless centuries before any attempt at civilization, men were chipping stones into tools and weapons. Knives, axes, hammers, scrapers, spears, arrows, even axes for piercing skins, and roughly notched saws for cutting bone were made of flint or chert or obsidian—any stone that would chip to a cutting edge and hard enough to stand wear.

Some are clumsy things, some beautiful in design and finish, and their varying uses probably have far greater differences between the men who made them than exists between an Egyptian king of 1400 B. C., and an English citizen of this race.

Soluterian "lurel leaves," or "shouldered points"—spearsheads from Soluter, in France—are exquisite things, graceful in shape and finished in a manner which would be a credit to any modern craftwork. Yet they were made, according to some assertions, over 20,000 years ago.

Earlier still, Mousterian implements from the cave of Le Moustier, varying in shape and size, all have the bullet-nosed way cutting edge distinctive of their period. Centuries before these are ruler Chellean and Steypan implements were made, their unworked butts still showing the natural surface of the stone. And away back beyond them, thousands and thousands of years ago, in the very dawn of human life, were made the "Eoliths" of the Kentish Weald.

GOVERNMENT PREPARES APPEAL IN SUGAR SUIT

Department of Justice Completes Arrangements for Carrying Injunction Case to Supreme Court

WASHINGTON, May 15 (AP)—Formal appeal by the government from the New York federal court decision denying an injunction against the New York sugar exchange is to be filed tomorrow in the supreme court and on Monday the department of justice will move to advance the case for as early a hearing as possible. It is probable, however, that the hearing will not be held until the new session of the court begins in October. The court has closed its arguments, counsel for the exchange is reported to oppose an immediate hearing and officials say there might not be time, in any event, to prepare briefs and arguments for consideration before the court adjourns June 11.

The bill of exceptions and assignment of errors was prepared today in New York for presentation here tomorrow. Assistant Attorney General Seymour will continue in personal charge of the case and is determined to press it as vigorously as possible under the circumstances.

I. W. W. MEMBERS SENTENCED

LOS ANGELES, May 15 (AP)—Four men asserted to be members of the I. W. W. convicted last week of conspiracy to violate the California criminal syndicalism act, were sentenced from one to 14 years in the penitentiary. They were Paul Ware, Herbert W. White, John Nolan and Alfred Koha. They gave notice of appeal.

HELD FOR RABBI'S DEATH

SAN FRANCISCO, May 15 (AP)—Gladwin G. Richardson, alleged navy deserter, was bound over to the superior court today for trial on a charge of murder in connection with the beating to death of Rabbi Alfred G. Lefcoe, April 4. Richardson admits fatally beating Lefcoe, the police say, but says that he acted in self-defense.

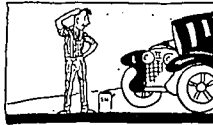
Fountain Pens Three Centuries Ago

D. L. writes: My 1919 car has gears cups only for lubricating the springs and steering connections and I am thinking of putting in a mechanical grease little handier. Which of the different methods do you advise?

Answer: Frankly, we do not know whether the grease systems for applying grease or heavy oil are to be preferred or whether some of the other greasing devices are better. The question is by no means settled, although there seems to be a tendency toward the use of ordinary oil. The fact seems to be that good results are obtainable with both lubricants when effectively fed. Probably the manufacturer of your make of car is equipping his current models with one of the modern chassis lubricating systems and you would not go far wrong in applying this to your car.

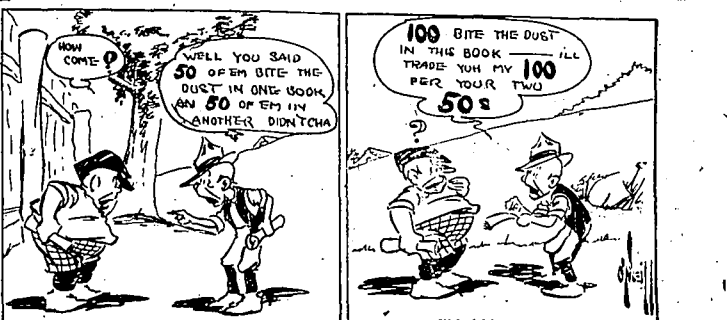

BRITISH AGREE TO DISCUSSION WITH RUSSIANS

London Government Consents to Negotiations Through Soviet Emissary, but Does Not Modify Demands

LONDON, May 15, (AP)—The outcome of the eagerly awaited Russian debate tonight in the house of commons was the announcement that there would be no immediate break between England and Russia but that negotiations would be started through Leonid Kravich, who was in the gallery listening to the debate.

Ronald McNeil, under-secretary for foreign affairs, announced on behalf of the government that Foreign Secretary Curzon was prepared to enter into discussions with M. Kravich and that, in order to enable the latter to communicate with his government in Moscow, the time limit mentioned in the British ultimatum to the soviets would be reasonably extended.

But, he added, this should not be taken to mean that the British will be satisfied with less than compliance with their demands.

Suits Lloyd George Former Premier Lloyd George expressed satisfaction with the announcement and said he thought the government had taken a wise decision. Gossip around the lobbies had it the time limit would be extended another 10 days.

J. Ramsay MacDonald, leader of the opposition, opened the debate with a strong attack upon the government's policy in which he attributed all the troubles between England and Russia to the failure to recognize the soviet government. He invited the government to produce documentary proofs of its charges against the soviet, and maintained that the Russian reply opened the way for a settlement through an international conference.

Mr. McNeil, in reply, strongly repudiated the suggestion that the government was toward Russia. He declared that the government might have made a casus belli of its grievances but that such an idea had never for a moment been entertained. The government did not desire to destroy the trading agreement between the two countries, but simply to ensure its proper observance.

Reply Wholly Unsatisfactory Except on the single point relating to the rights of British fishermen, the Russian reply, the government could not admit that the invasion of British rights in this matter could be met by holding an international conference on the question of territorial waters limits all over the world.

The government's concession took much of the sting out of the subject matter, but Mr. Lloyd George provoked hearty laughter by declaring that M. Tebitcher, the soviet foreign minister, was not a revolutionary in the commonly accepted use of the term, but was "as great an aristocrat as Czarism."

Sees Bolshevism as Decline The former premier maintained that bolshevism was a passing phase and that the government ought to realize it was something much more permanent than bolshevism that they were up against. They should, he said, take advantage of the present opportunity for conversations.

Former Premier Asquith expressed a desire to associate himself with everything Mr. Lloyd George had said.

NELLE GYWNNE NOT ALL BAD

Good Qualities of Famous Personage Shone in a Circle and Age Notoriously Immoral. Nelle Gywnne, orange girl, tavern singer, successful actress, and later mistress of Charles II, the "restored Stuart" to the throne of England, is a character in English history. She used improper language, had unbecoming manners, and lack of early training till the last showed in her exterior, but her nature was not necessarily corrupted or tainted. Terrible stories have always been told of her coarseness, plebeian birth (she was born in a coal cellar) and corrupt life, but her later biographers prove that she was not entirely good for nothing. She is said to have been the only woman living in England that exercised anything like a good influence over the wayward, frivolous Charles II. Her acts of charity were substantial and much needed, and as the years passed on, and the opportunities for wrongdoing increased, and her beauty and personal character increased, her behavior became more and more prudent and her character more and more circumspect.

Opps' they describes Nelle Gywnne as a good actress and a pretty one, a charming wit, and universally popular. She pleased every one, from the king to the charcoal-burner. Stories were written about her, styles of dress were named for her, and her portraits were painted.

Ingratitude. Most people dwell on their misfortunes so much that they forget the greater fortunes that are theirs. To these misfortunes there are plenty and these blessings in most lives, marked by health, intelligence, integrity, common sense, and energy.

RED MEN AS WOOD CARVERS

Many of the American Aborigines Were Experts, as Spoolmains Still in Existence Show.

It has been pointed out that the chief remainder of our aboriginal life is the woodwork and bone carving of the Indians of the Pacific Northwest. While the cities of that region are enterprising and important centers of industry, and while the inhabitants of many Indian reservations have adopted the latest farming methods and have become prosperous agriculturists, there remain some primitive workers whose wooden products have the same quiet appearance as those of their ancestors generations and generations ago.

When they possessed no better tools than stone axes and bone handled implements, before the white man had brought his iron instruments to this country, these Indians were experts at their chosen profession. With their crude implements they cut planks four feet wide by ten feet long from a tree. Many specimens of their carving in wood, bone and ivory, preserved now in museums, show considerable skill. Their canoes, hewn from a single log, were 50 feet in length, and a rible and rugged great was exhibited among the first Europeans that came to this country.

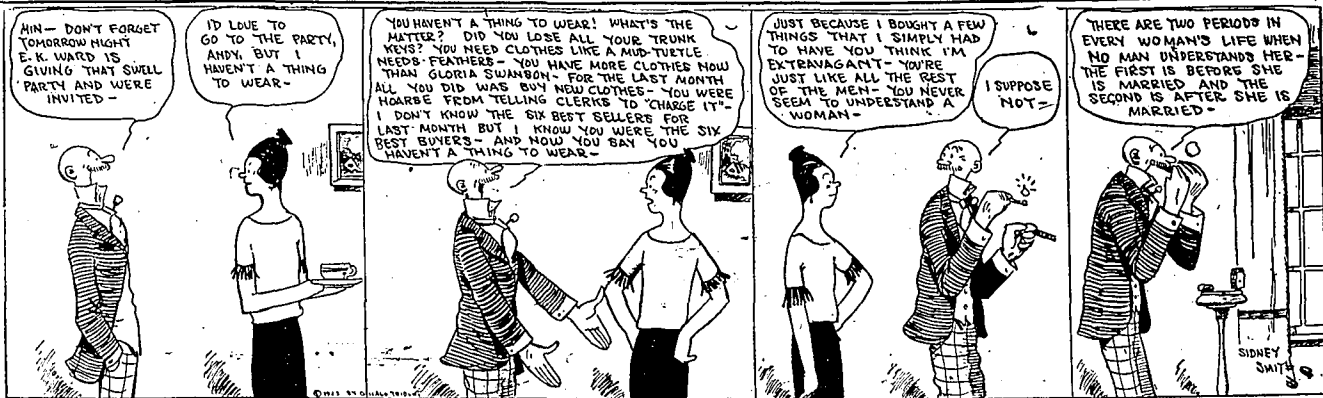

that infests the rivers of the south and the coast line from Hong Kong as far westward as Swatow, several instances recently boats plying up the Canton river from Hong Kong have been fired on by bandits and one, a Chinese-owned craft, was seized, beached and looted a few weeks ago almost within sight of Canton.

Coasting vessels have been seized by Chinese pirates traveling as passengers, the passengers robbed and the Chinese steamer Tamung, owned by Shiang Hai from Hong Kong yesterday, the craft was seized by pirates and held for 24 hours with her European passenger and the Chinese captain's cabin and her Oriental passengers forced into the hold. The pirates abandoned the ship near Swatow and escaped with \$50,000 worth of loot.

Fatalities Mark Rioting

Serious anti-Japanese riots broke out lately at Shansi, province of Hepeh. Shansi is on the upper Yangtsze river above Handow, from which latter point a Japanese gunboat has been pushed to the scene to reinforce the Japanese already there. Advertisements of the Shansi general were killed and a large number injured in the Shansi disturbance, which grew out of the Chinese boycott of Japanese goods as retaliation for Japan's refusal to accept the famous "Twenty-one demands" treaty of 1915.

The anti-Japanese agitation in Fuhkien province, entering principally at Amoy, has been in full swing for several weeks. An organized boycott has been launched there, with committees in charge and inspectors to make sure of the strictness of the boycott and sell Japanese goods.

War is in progress in Kwangtung province and between the constitutional army of Sun Yat-Sen, composed of Kwangtung and Yunnan troops, and forces from Kwangtung province which are said to have the backing of the northern militarists. At the moment the constitutionalists appear to have the advantage.

A struggle broke out in Fuhkien province recently between forces actively supporting the Peking government and a combination said to be composed of the backers of Sun Yat-Sen, Chang Tze-Lin, director of Manchuria, and those leaders who favor the independence of Fuhkien. This conflict still is in its early stages and only a few minor engagements have been fought, with the odds so far about even.

Successes Balance Scoff

The northern militarists recently scored some successes in the Szechuan province against levies declared to favor Sun Yat-Sen's southern government, but these victories for the north only followed earlier reverses the Peking faction had suffered in the same territory.

HELD "PEACE PIPE" SACRED

American Indians Attached Immense Importance to the Ceremony That Accompanied Its Smoking.

The smoking of the "Pipe of Peace" among the American Indians was a ceremony attended with great solemnity. The peace pipe, called by the French the calumet, was treated with great reverence and was brought out only on the most important occasions, such as the making of peace treaties, the reception of a distinguished stranger with whom the tribe wished to be upon good terms. If the occasion did not bring forth the pipe of peace, it was a sign of hostility. To refuse to smoke it when offered was a cause of offense. The calumet was between two and three inches long, and the stem rather than the bowl was the object of the Indian's reverence. The stem was of reed, artistically decorated with women's hair or eagle's quills. Among the western tribes the pipe bowl was of red cattilite, a flint-grained stone of deep red color found in Cotéau des Prairies, west of Big Stone lake, in South Dakota. The Indians of the South and East made the bowl of white stone pierced with several holes so that several stems could be used at the same time. The calumet quills were regarded as neutral ground among the warring tribes and there were many sacred traditions connected with these spots.
