WETS AND DRIES WAGE WORD WAR OVER MEASURE

New York Governor Hears Arguments on Repeal of State Prohibition Enforcement Act—Keeps Own Counsel

ALBANY, N. Y., May 31 (AP)—Governor Smith today listened, inscrutable of feature, but attentively to a flood of oratory for and against his signing of the legislative repeal of the Mullan-Gage state prohibition enforcement act.

When both sides had talked their fill and weighed in down with briefs the governor walked directly from the room without having betrayed by a single gesture or word the answer to the momentous question.

His decision will be announced sometime between tonight and midnight Sunday, at which hour the repeal bill, if the governor does not act, will automatically die.

Importance is stressed The great importance of the decision he is to make was driven home by speakers for both sides, with all the fervor and earnestness at their command.

The principal arguments of the enemies of the repeal, who numbered in all about 30 speakers, were that to sign the measure would be to turn loose on the state a rapidly growing horde of bootleggers, bandits and crooks of every description; to nullify the eighteenth amendment; to secede from the Union; and to deprive the federal government of the most powerful instrument now being used to enforce prohibition.

The principal arguments of the proponents of repeal, whose speaking platform was crowded by 20 opponents, were that the Mullan-Gage act ought to be repealed because it subjected persons accused of violating the dry law to "double jeopardy" in the courts; that it was exclusively the government's function to enforce prohibition and that shouldering part of the burden the government entailed an unnecessary and useless expense.

Volstead Act Discussed Several of the pro-repeal, even denouncing the Volstead Act and eighteenth amendment as "iniquitous and subversive of state rights" urged on the governor the repeal as the first step in a campaign to wipe the eighteenth amendment and the federal enforcement law off the books.

The hearing throughout was orderly for the most part, only an occasional and quickly suppressed hiss, and a few jeers, were heard. Supporters of the opposition faction were loud in their applause of their own respective speakers, however, each apparently trying to impress the governor by the volume of their cheers.

For Workers' Boer James P. Holland, president of the New York state federation of labor, who also represented Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, was the first to speak. He devoted most of his time to reading a letter, sent by Mr. Gompers, who was unable to attend. Both Holland and Gompers urged the governor to sign the repeal as the first step in a campaign for modification of the national prohibition enforcement act, so as to give the workingman his wine and beer.

Court Upholds Idaho Criminal Syndicalism Law

Decision Declares Act Valid but Reverses Conviction of Alleged I. W. W. Organizer

BOISE, May 31 (AP)—The constitutionality of the Idaho criminal syndicalism law was upheld today by an opinion handed down in the state supreme court in the case of the state of Idaho versus William Dingman. The order of the district court, containing both a violation of the law, however, was reversed and a new trial was ordered.

The opinion was prepared by William T. Lee, associate justice, and was concurred in by William E. Lee, associate justice, and Bert S. Varian, district judge and acting supreme court commissioner. Justice Charles P. McCarty and Chief Justice Alfred Budge concurred in the upholding of the constitutionality of the law, but dissented in the conclusion.

Dingman was convicted in the district court of being an organizer of the Industrial Workers of the World and was charged, with some 20 others, all of whom were acquitted. The case was appealed from the district court for Bonner county.

Race Goes Leaves Track to Rescue Horses From Fire

Eight Thoroughbreds and Pony Out of 150 Racers Trapped in Barns Victims of Blaze

CLEVELAND, May 31 (AP)—Eight thoroughbred race horses and a pony were burned to death in a fire which destroyed five barns at the Ohio State Jockey club's race track at Maple Heights, near Bedford, Ohio, late today. Nearly 150 racers were trapped in the barns and that more were not lost was due to the efforts of racegoers and attendants who cut the animals loose. Several were so badly burned they have to be destroyed.

Those killed were well known to followers of the race horse world. They were Sultan, a 3-year-old, winner of two events at the present meeting; Huren 11 (7) and Shortstop (8), owned by J. A. Parsons of Channah, Wyo.; Long Island (4), Portland (10) Mambi (5), and the Uster (3) in the stable of A. S. Eastman of Toledo.

MEXICO CITY, May 31 (AP)—Ten persons were killed and 17 were wounded in a religious riot in Durango City this evening when a mob attacked the provincial palace and disarmed the mounted police, according to special dispatches to the newspaper, Excelsior.

Federal troops are being concentrated in Durango for the purpose of preventing further disorder. All places of amusement have been closed and soldiers are patrolling the streets.

AMERICA MOVES FOR AGREEMENT WITH OTTOMANS

Minister Grew Negotiates With Ismet Pasha Under Authority of Washington Government for New Treaties

LAUSANNE, May 31 (AP)—Joseph C. Grew, the American minister to Switzerland, had a long conference with Ismet Pasha, head of the Turkish delegation late tonight and impressed on him the desirability of building up in the United States an atmosphere of confidence in Turkey. He advanced several suggestions relative to the powers of the foreign legal advisers.

Should Mr. Grew's representations bring about any widening in the scope of the authority of the advisers other countries would benefit as well as the United States.

Turks Ignore Existing Treaties. The Turkish delegates, in their conversations with the Americans, ignore the existing Turco-American treaties on the ground that they are "tainted with capitulations." The Americans, nevertheless, are proceeding on the theory that the treaties continue valid until new treaties are concluded, but avoid the use of the word "capitulations" in deference to Turkish susceptibilities.

As soon as the delegates are agreed on the general lines of a treaty, Mr. Grew will, according to the present understanding, notify the Swiss government and notes will be formally exchanged between him and Ismet Pasha. Formal and separate negotiations then will be opened, the procedure being similar to that between Poland and Turkey.

While the United States presumably will accept the arrangement made by the allies on the subject of the status of foreign residents in Turkey, Mr. Grew wants the power of the foreign legal advisers made as large as possible.

Rapid Procedure Likely. As new American treaties will duplicate the original Lausanne treaty, which it is hoped will be signed before June 15, after which American negotiations are likely to proceed rapidly. Allied leaders and Ismet Pasha discussed the great financing problem of the Near East conference—the payment of interest on the Ottoman debt. Turkey desires to be relieved of the obligation of paying the coupons in foreign currency, asserting that such payment will be tantamount to financial

Children Bombard President and First Lady with Flowers

Serenade Feature of Washington's Music Week Takes Unexpected Turn When Youngsters Claim Attention

WASHINGTON, May 31 (AP)—Eight thousand school children gathered in American League park today to serenade President and Mrs. Harding as a feature of Washington's music week, broke away from their teachers and through a marine guard before the program was ended, and, rushing god-undoubtedly but wildly across the field, hid under a barrage of flowers on the presidential party.

What was started as a quiet serenade turned into a wild rush of eager children when each, anxious to present a bouquet to either the president or Mrs. Harding, took the short course of hurling the flowers at them. The president and his wife were compelled to ward off the rain of blossoms.

The children had been massed for the serenade in the right and left field bleachers of the ball park. Parents and others interested in music week festivities were in the grandstands. President and Mrs. Harding occupied a small improvised stand near the center of the field.

Most of the program had gone off as scheduled. Then came a number designated on the program as "The President's Surprise." It proved to be a drill by several hundred tots of kindergarten age who, after completing their exercises, gathered around the presidential stand and sang themselves and shook hands with a number of them as preparations were being made for the next number.

The sight of the little ones basking in the presidential favor was too much for the older children and with a wild shout they rushed from the bleachers onto the field.

LAKE GIVES UP VICTIMS

Bodies of Four Persons Drowned when Boat Capsizes with Fishing Party Recovered Near Shore

CLEAR LAKE, Iowa, May 31 (AP)—The bodies of four persons drowned in Clear Lake Wednesday night when a launch capsized with a fishing party. The bodies were recovered near the north shore of the lake here tonight after a search of several hours.

The victims were Mr. and Mrs. Dan Hickman, George Stuebgen and Miss Bess Parks, all of this town. The fishing party had been missed since about midnight and a crew started dragging the lake about noon.

SUN'S FORCES ADMIT REVERSE

Official Advises Balance Defeat on Kwantung Front by Victory in Waichow Sector

HONG KONG, May 31 (AP)—Sun Yat-sen government advisers here officially admitted that its army on the eastern Kwantung front facing Peking province, has suffered reverses but asserts that the enemy has been driven in disorder from Waichow, according to advices received here today.

Waichow is about 50 miles from Canton and is the home of General Chen Chung-ming, the man who drove Sun Yat-sen from power last June and who is one of the leading figures in the present drive against the Canton administration.

The official statement from Canton says that the cities of Chaiochowfu and Swatow, in eastern Kwantung, were evacuated by Sun's general, Hau Tung-chi, "for strategic reasons."

AGED SETTLER IS SLAIN BY TORNADO IN WYOMING

Twator Demolishes Schoolhouse, Damages Ranch Buildings and Levels Wires Over 300 Yard Path

SHERIDAN, Wyo., May 31 (AP)—W. P. Mincey, 80, a homesteader, was killed by a school house was demolished, many ranch buildings were damaged and telegraph lines were leveled when a tornado accompanied by hail and rain swept a 300 yard path near Laramie, Wyo., 60 miles southeast of here today, according to reports received here.

Mincey's homestead shack was hurled several hundred feet and he received injuries from which he died in less than a hour later. His death was the only fatality reported late tonight.

BULLETS STOP GERMAN EXPORT TAX EVADERS

Roxheim Citizens, Engaged in Smuggling Activities, Suffer Casualties When Surprised by Soldiers

MANNHHEIM, May 31 (AP)—Smugglers along the Rhine are resorting to the use of rafts in trying to avoid the Franco-Belgian 10 per cent export tax on goods going out of Germany. This fact was revealed today in a dispatch from Mannheim which said a party of citizens of Roxheim were surprised by soldiers late tonight while attempting to take goods across the river from the Rhine. RUEH BANKS UNDER TENSION

BERLIN, May 31 (AP)—The Ruhr banks are operating in a state of tense preparedness to guard against French seizure of their funds, a statement issued by the Reichsbank yesterday. It explained the precautionary measures which were in effect at the Essen branch of the bank where 25,000,000 marks recently were seized.

Learning that a seizure might be attempted, the bank had installed a type of burglar alarm from the main entrance to the interior. An employee was constantly stationed at the entrance during banking hours to set the alarm in action the moment he detected anything suspicious outside. By means of these documents, arrests of conspirators and the seizure of explosives in other towns were made possible.

Fight on Croker Will Is Opened in Dublin Court

Council for Widow Says Case Turns on Question of Alleged Bigamy

DUBLIN, May 31 (AP)—An action designed to upset the will of the late Richard Croker, once Tammany chief, was opened today in what formerly was the Richard Croker's Dublin castle. The most prominent Irish lawyers appear on one side or the other, and Sergeant Sullivan, who abandoned Croker's wife, the English bar, has been brought back to aid in the impachment of the will. The main feature of the case is expected to be the cross-examination of Mr. Croker's widow. In his address to the jury, Sergeant Hanna, counsel for Mrs. Bula Croker, said the case would turn on whether the jury believed Mrs. Croker's account of her husband or accepted the allegation that she was a bigamist.

Richard Croker, Jr., and Howard Croker, who instituted the action, set far back and during the adjournment several parties of Americans formed obnoxious and noisy groups.

# TEACHERS SEEK SUBSTITUTE FOR OLD INSTITUTE

## Radical Changes in the State School Law Made by Last Legislature Present Important Questions to Educators

POCATELLO, May 31.—(Special to The News.)—Important educational policies for Idaho are being agreed upon by Idaho county superintendents in annual convention at the Technical Institute this week. In view of the many radical changes in state school law made by the recent legislature, the meeting is considered one of the most important ever held.

Let's not look upon the killing of institutes as a calamity, but as an opportunity," urged State Superintendent Elizabeth Rissane. "The convention has gone on record as favoring short teachers' meetings for practical demonstration work and for the announcement of important county policies as a substitute for the longer institutes."

Among the changes for which suggestions by various county superintendents were: Visiting days in which inexperienced teachers might observe the work of the best teachers in their own lines; special Saturday teachers' meetings, sometimes covering all the teachers in a county, at other times including certain grades; joint teachers' and trustees' meetings for the purpose of acquainting directors more thoroughly with the problems of the schools.

**Up to Superintendent.**

The agreement reached on the matter of institutes is that each county superintendent is to try the plan that seems best adapted to her own situation and report success or failure at the next annual convention. From these reports a recommendation to the 1924 legislature will be based.

That henceforth they will put the matter of vacation pay in black and white into teachers' contracts to avoid misunderstandings arising out of the "changes" in the law made at the last legislature; that circulars and examination sheets should be made more uniform in every particular; that the work below the eighth grade should be strengthened; and that superintendents should exercise even closer supervision over school district budgets were other policies agreed upon. The superintendents were welcomed to the Tech by a program of patriotic talks and songs the day before Memorial Day.

## BRITISH PREMIER VALUES AMERICANS' FRIENDSHIP

### Baldwin Declares Furtherance of An Amicable Relationship is 'Important and Congenial' Duty

LONDON, May 31 (AP)—Prime Minister Stanley Baldwin Tuesday issued a statement to the American press in which he declared that the furthering of Anglo-American friendship would be one of the "most important and congenial" of his duties. The statement follows:

"During the last week I have received many messages of good will from the United States and numerous requests for statements to be published in American newspapers. I should like to answer all these messages or individually, but, as I am sure my American friends will understand, the pressure of work renders such a course physically impossible.

"I indeed, a pleasure to find that I have the good wishes of so many of those among whom it was my fortune to spend my first winter, some of the most enjoyable and profitable days of my career.

"I left Washington more than ever convinced that the prosperity and peace of the world depends upon, to no small extent, the steady growth of Anglo-American friendship, and I need hardly say that during my term of office the furthering of that growth will always be one of the most important and congenial of my duties."

## CREDITORS CLOSE DOWN BIG BROKERAGE HOUSE

### Petitioners with Claims Amounting to \$3,500 Throw Jones and Baker Into Bankruptcy

NEW YORK, May 31 (AP)—One of the oldest and largest stock brokerage firms trading on the New York curb market, Jones and Baker, today was plunged into financial difficulties when three creditors filed a petition in bankruptcy and shortly afterward the curb suspended the firm. The curb had been secretly investigating its affairs for a week.

While the assets and liabilities were not given in the petition, unofficial estimates of the liabilities ranged from \$5,000,000 to \$10,000,000.

The company had scarcely 1000 customers' accounts here and in nine large branch offices in other cities. Officials of the company declared their belief that the firm was solvent.

Control for petitioners whose claims totaled \$3,500, said the action was taken as a result of newspaper reports to prevent disorderly liquidation of assets which would have meant ruin to the firm's customers.

Immediately after the appointment of Alfred C. Cross, Jr., as receiver by Federal Judge Goldhamer, the firm issued a statement denying that it was insolvent and declaring that "with a careful liquidation of our assets, none of our customers will suffer a loss and we will be able to pay 100 cents on the dollar."

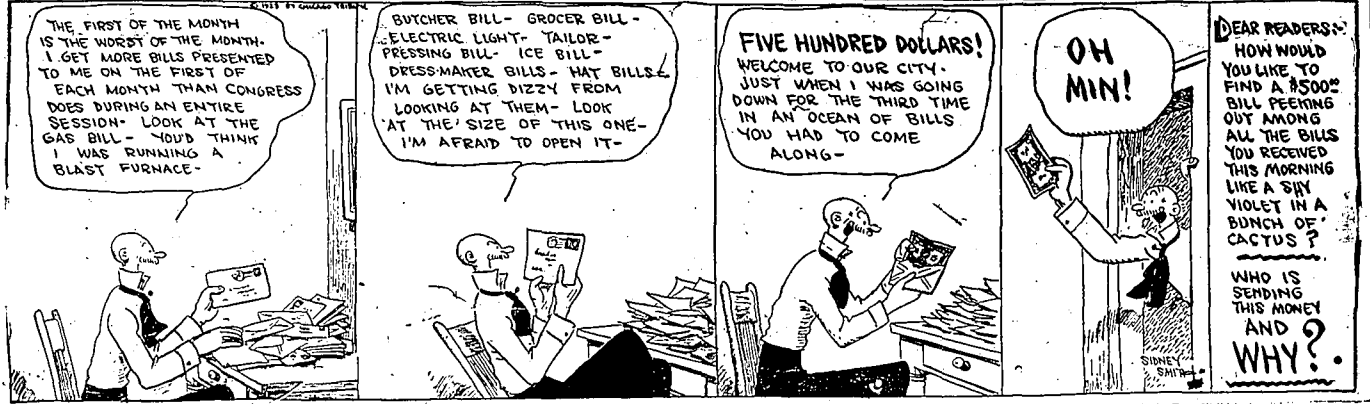

CHURCH LEADERS FAVOR TRIBUNAL

Federated Council Calls on 125,000 Congregations to Support President's Proposal

WASHINGTON, May 31 (AP)—A call to 125,000 congregations in America to rally to the support of President Harding's proposal that the United States enter the permanent court of international justice was issued here today by the Federated Council of the Church of Christ of America.

"A day of great occasion for our country and the world has now arrived," says the call, adding that the issue which the world court presents embodies the age-long conflict between law and force.

"Widespread around the earth," the message continues, "the people know that if nations are to survive they must observe their individual wills to establish a process of law; their individual wills to the welfare of all mankind. All that the Christian church itself has built up in the hearts of people through centuries of effort hangs in the balance."

"For war, in the future, aided by the powers of science, simply means self-destruction. This appeal to the sword can be advised by only one means, the means already found within the state—by building up an appeal to law instead. That is exactly the purpose of the permanent court of international justice. In it we see a great advance in the long struggle of man to civilize himself."

"The court is not a 'private' court of the league nations. By a decision of the council of the league on May 12, 1922, it has been opened to all the world. It must cases parties to dispute must consent before the court can deal with the dispute. An optional clause in the treaty establishing the court has now been ratified in most countries upon condition of reciprocity by 15 states, giving the court jurisdiction of every dispute between these states wherever it is involved any question of international law, of interpretation of a treaty, or of a breach of an international obligation."
