FOOD IS HIGHER IN FACE OF CUT IN BASIC COSTS

Building Materials Show Heaviest Decrease; Lower Level of Commodity Prices Prevails During Month

WASHINGTON, July 18 (AP)—Although the general level of wholesale prices throughout the country decreased nearly two percent from May 16 to June, according to figures assembled by the bureau of labor statistics, the retail food index showed an increase of one percent.

Among the 494 commodities included in the wholesale price statistics, building materials showed the largest decrease, averaging 4.34 percent, while metals declined 2.34 percent, chemicals and drugs 1.4 percent, and food and kindred materials about 2 percent. Farm products, food, clothing and kindred miscellaneous commodities registered a smaller decline. Increases were shown in 100 commodities, increases in 53 and 101 were listed as unchanged.

The increase in the retail food price level from June 15, 1922, to June 15, 1923, averaged 3.9 percent. The general wholesale market, however, registered an advance of 2 percent. During the month ending last June 15, food prices advanced in 32 cities, rising as much as 10 percent in New York, N. J., Pittsburgh and Washington, D. C. The level decreased in 16 cities and was unchanged in three, but in only one did the level of food prices decline more than one percent.

MITCHELL LOSES BOUT TO WHITE

Chicago Lightweight Scores Technical K. O. in Hard-Fought Ring Battle

NEW YORK, July 18 (AP)—Charley White, hard hitting Chicago lightweight, scored a technical knockout over Ritchie Mitchell of Milwaukee tonight in the fourth round of a 15-round match at the New York Velodrome. Mitchell's seconds threw a sponge into the ring when he went down for the second time in the round from a right jab, followed by a smashing left hook.

Mitchell forced most of the fighting in the first round and landed several hard rights on White's head, but the Chicagoan had the better of the fight at close quarters. White sent Mitchell to one knee with a left hook in the second round, but the Milwaukeean came back to stagger his opponent with two smashing rights to the head. White's mouth was bleeding and Mitchell's left eye was cut after a furious exchange.

They battled at a fast clip in the third. White had Mitchell on the ropes in distress with a battering attack to the head but Mitchell weathered the storm and sent White back with several rights to the head.

White started the fourth round intent upon making a cut ending to the battle. He floored Mitchell with a right to the jaw for a count of eight and drove Ritchie about the ring with his battering attack to head and body. Groggy and reeling, the Milwaukeean went down again from a right and left to the jaw, his second knock out in the round. The fight was held before a crowd

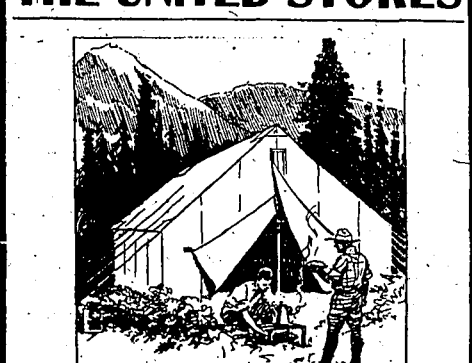

JACKSON GIVEN WELCOME

Outlawed American League Player Greeted by Hundreds; Proves Embarrassing to Directors of Baseball

Nature of Problem Holding Up Negotiations for Dempsey-Firpo Battle Not Made Known; Fail to Pick Site

NEW YORK, July 18 (AP)—Tex Rickard's efforts to sign, seal and deliver the proposed Jack Dempsey-Firpo match for the world's heavyweight championship either in the United States or the Argentine, apparently were no nearer completion today after a series of conferences among the promoter, Firpo, the latter's trainer, Jimmy DeForest, and Jack Kearns, manager of the champion.

AMERICAN, Ga., July 18 (AP)—While being greeted by hundreds of local baseball fans throughout today, Joe Jackson, former American league player "outlawed" from organized baseball, was proving to be "a lion in the sides" of the directors of the American baseball team. It is generally understood Jackson will hold the American team to its contract of \$75 a week for five weeks.

Regarding this, Firpo reiterated to Rickard his desire to fight Dempsey in his native city, Buenos Aires, while Kearns adhered to his preference for two title bouts in this country, the first with Firpo around Labor day, and the second with Harry Wills, negro challenger, about world's series time. The manager's manager then was decided definitely today on Rickard's proposal to stage the Firpo match in the Argentine, but as reserved final answer pending possibilities of arranging the match in this country.

NEW PLAYER TO BE SEEN HERE

Jack Bailey, Formerly of Vinton, to Occupy Place in Local Line-up; Snappy Fielder

TURK-AMERICAN TREATY PARLEY TO BE DELAYED

Three Main Points Appear and Conferences Between Delegates Necessary; Insist on Rights of Citizens

LAUSANNE, July 18 (AP)—The Turco-American treaty negotiations are delayed over three main points, which probably will require further conferences between Joseph C. Grew, American ambassador here, and Ismet Pasha before real progress can be achieved in drafting the new treaty. The United States wants Turkey to ratify the treaty on the American naturalization laws, but the Turks point out that Turkish laws prevent Turkish subjects who become citizens of other countries from coming back.

If the Americans insist upon such recognition, the Turks will demand that the provisions relating to Turkish subjects shall be added to the treaty clause. But the Americans cannot accept any treaty denial of the rights of American citizens and the subject has been left for further consideration. The Turkish experts realize that whatever may be the outcome of the negotiations on this question, the United States government will always insist upon public respect for the rights of Americans, and, as a matter of fact, the American representatives say they proposed their clause merely to fight into the protection of American citizens by Turkish officials and reduce the possibility of misunderstandings.

FIRE THREATENS RESORT

CINCINNATI, July 18 (AP)—Fire which broke out in the car barns of the Cincinnati Traction company just before midnight, spread to Chester park, a pleasure resort, where the Cincinnati pure food exposition is being held this week. Buildings housing the exhibits from all sections of the country were threatened.

Most of the buildings being of frame construction the fire spread rapidly and within an hour had destroyed a number of the park concessions, including a large section of the bathing beach lockers and the dance hall. An hour after the blaze started firemen had it virtually under control and it was believed the greater portion of the pure food show exhibit would be saved.

MOB SEEKS REVENGE FOR ATTACK ON GIRL

NEW YORK, July 18 (AP)—More than 1,000 men and women were frustrated by police reserves tonight in a mob attack on a girl, 23-year-old negro, alleged to have attacked an 11-year-old white girl. He was alleged to have found the child playing under a porch in a section almost exclusively occupied by negroes. He was saved from the mob and arrested.

BEER PROPOSAL FAILS

DULUTH, MINN., July 18 (AP)—Opposition of women delegates today resulted in the withdrawal of a resolution introduced yesterday at the convention of the Minnesota Federation of Labor by the brewery workers' delegates favoring legislation of the manufacture of beer in the state. This is considered by the delegates as settling the wet and dry question for this convention.

BRINGS BACK FRONTIER DAYS

Relic Recalls the Time When Indian Raids Were an Ever-Present Terror to the Settler.

Several years ago a rusted log iron was found near Snake Butte, four miles north of Okfuskee, a collection which the Black and Yellow trail strikes north. Besides the iron was also found a die. The iron was placed in the state museum, although there was nothing of historic interest attached to it at the time, and even now the find is unknown.

Recently Thomas Tuttle, an educated Yanktonian Indian from Fort Thompson, was going through the state house looking at the relics in the museum, accompanied by an older Indian, Okfuskee—the Whipper, who was much interested in the collection. Okfuskee at once recognized the iron and told the dramatic circumstances surrounding it, as follows, says the Evening Huronite.

In the autumn of 1863 a scout camp of Yanktonians in the government employ was located near Snake Butte. One of the scouts was on duty on the peak of the butte, as a sentry, and this man noticed some Indians approaching from the north. He watched the approaching Indians and soon discovered they were Santees, being Two Bull and his son and a nephew on a horse stealing in the fort.

The Yanktonian scouts spread out and captured the Santees, turned them over to the soldiers at Fort Scully and they were placed in irons. Soon afterward Two Bull's nephew escaped, but blundered into the Yanktonian camp at the site and again was captured. A council was held and it was proposed to put the captured man to death, but it developed that he was a nephew of one of the scouts, therefore it was determined to set him at liberty.

The young man said where the leg irons which had been put on him at the fort. He succeeded in removing them by driving the rivets with the aid of a file which he used as a punch. In his flight he dropped the irons where they were found years afterward.

MARINE CORPS COMMANDER HAS NEW-AIDE

Neville as assistant to the commanding general. He has served with the Marines since 1899 and was among the first to sail for France where he won the D. E. C. and the D. S. M. and the rank of Officer in the French Legion of Honor.

NATIONAL LEADER WILL SUSPEND PUBLICATION

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., July 18 (AP)—The National Leader, official organ of the National Non-Partisan league, which has been published here since founded by A. C. Pennington, former president of the league, in 1915, will suspend publication with its July issue, according to an announcement in its editorial column.

MORELAND FUNERAL HELD

BOISE—Funeral services for Jesse C. Moreland, who was electrocuted Friday evening, were held here Wednesday afternoon. The Rev. Floyd Beck with conducted the services and burial was in Morris Hill cemetery. Mr. Moreland was killed when he touched a fallen high tension power transformer near the Boise butcher company's packing plant, when he was picking peaches.

FIRES DO LITTLE DAMAGE

Sault Ste Marie, Mich., July 18 (AP)—Forest fires which clouded all Sault Ste Marie last night and today hampered the progress of vessels in the river during the night were apparently burning out late today. The only damage reported was to hay, wheat and blueberries. A number of farm houses menaced by the flames, were saved by volunteer brigades of farmers.

Woodcuts

both are in line with the duties of railroads with respect to development. No independent company could successfully operate a line from Rogerson to Wells, Nevada, and even if it should succeed, Twin Falls would not receive the measure of benefit from such operation as will be the case through the operation of the line by the Short Line. To begin with, in the case of an independent company, the terminus in Idaho would be at Rogerson instead of Twin Falls. With the growth of the country and the increase in the work of this line Twin Falls will have many more families to find homes for, many more men with established incomes to provide for and the growth and population and importance consequent upon these changes.

Outlines Benefits

One of the finest things about the railroad business is the benefit and development which follows the extension of railroad activity through and into new territory. The satisfaction that comes from this service to communities to some extent for the fact that personal contacts in the railroad business are difficult of accomplishment and that with the growth of the railroad systems of the country necessary organization has done away to a large extent with the old familiar personal connections between railroads and the public of a decade ago.

There is no objection that I know of in the way of the Short Line program for the Wells-Rogerson road. There are no protests of record against the granting of the certificate of necessity and no reason that can now be foreseen why the permit should not

be in the regular course of events. It is perhaps natural that a certain amount of doubt should exist in Twin Falls with respect to the building of this line, but there is no real basis of any kind for this. The board of the Union Pacific has approved the construction and my word of honor goes with the statements already made with respect to our intention to carry out our pledge to build this line.

PARTY SPLIT EVEN

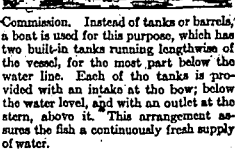

An Improved Smokehouse

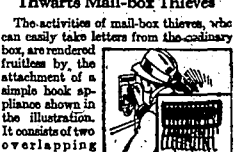
When it is necessary to smoke small quantities of meat, and no smokehouse is available, one can readily be improvised from a laundry sash, a barrel, and a support.

The activities of mail-box thieves, who can easily take letters from the ordinary box, are rendered fruitless by the attachment of a simple book apparatus shown in the illustration.

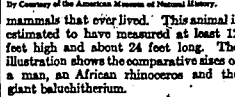


A Clothes Washer You Can Make

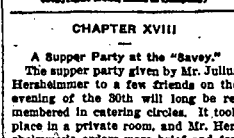
