



# FORD EXPLAINS OFFER TO BUY HUGE PROJECT

## Alleges Political Influences Were Brought to Bear Against Him from Obtaining Muscle Shoals Plant

DETROIT, Oct. 11 (AP)—Henry Ford's offer for the purchase of the Muscle Shoals project in Alabama is still before congress and will not be withdrawn, Henry Ford said today in a statement. He made public assertion since the sale of the Gorges plan to the Alabama Power company.

Ford charged that political influences were brought to bear to keep him from obtaining the plant and these "same influences prevented a vote in the house last spring" on the sale of Muscle Shoals to the Ford Motor company.

Mr. Ford's statement says: "The United States government, through Major General Lansing H. Beach, has offered to sell the Muscle Shoals, not on a piece of Muscle Shoals. I did so, and because my bid included all of Muscle Shoals it was the only one that would be reported to congress. But I have a very strong conviction that while we have been negotiating with Mr. Weeks, we have not been getting the full story of the States government. John W. Weeks' repeated assertion that Henry Ford would never get Muscle Shoals, neither with the Gorges plant, nor without it, is evidence that the political matter are not the bidder and the government, but other parties best known to the man who is at present secretary of war.

Attacks Weeks. "Long ago Mr. Weeks matured in his mind the plan to break up Muscle Shoals and dispose of it piecemeal. When he sold the steam plant at Gorges he pulled the first stitch in unravelling the greatest single peacemaker held out to the American farmer and manufacturer.

"The next steps are so plain that a child can see them. It only remains to sell the gigantic nitrate plant No. 1, and then nitrate plant No. 2, and finally the Wilson dam itself, and that is the end of Muscle Shoals as a possible demonstration of the cheapness with which power and fertilizer can be produced.

"They may get other offers for other pieces of Muscle Shoals and the total sale price will be far below what the initial payment called for under my offer, but the sale price is the smallest item at Muscle Shoals. Even if the friends of John W. Weeks should pay the original cost, dollar for dollar, Muscle Shoals would still be a complete loss to the people, because John W. Weeks' friends will not develop the matchless possibilities which will use it for the public benefit. It would be well worth while for the water power and fertilizer financiers who control the situation to pay \$100,000,000 if thereby they can retain the endless millions which they now make through exorbitant prices of power and fertilizer. The demonstration which would result from the sale of Muscle Shoals would be a death blow to such exploitation.

Offer Bill Stands. "My offer is still before congress. I shall not withdraw it. There is nothing whatever for me to explain. There is nothing that John W. Weeks can explain though he should talk from now until he leaves public life, but I want to say this: If I get Muscle Shoals, we will run power lines 200 miles in every direction from Muscle Shoals. We have been working and have learned how to send power long distances without losses by leakage. I say this for the benefit of the international financiers who, with the Alabama Power company, have Muscle Shoals almost hopelessly within their grasp.

"It is not to me that John W. Weeks has anything to explain. I know just how much value to attach to his explanations. Let him explain to the farmers."

## DISCUSS RAIL WAGE INCREASE

### Conferences Expected to Be Held Shortly to Talk Advantages of About \$80,000,000

CHICAGO, Oct. 11 (AP)—Conferences throughout the country are expected within the next 30 days relative to the wage movement of the railroad train and engine service organization, which government figures indicate involves on class one carriers 326,817 employees and requested aggregate increase of about \$80,000,000. ## MEXICO FAVORS NEW LINE

### International Railroad Project Running South from Salt Lake Meets Approval Among Engineers

EL PASO, Texas, Oct. 10 (AP)—Mexico looks with favor on proposals to build a new international trunk line railroad from Salt Lake, Utah to Guadalajara, Jalisco, according to Professor Fayette S. Jones, of Albuquerque, New Mexico, chief engineer for the proposed road, who has just returned from a trip to Mexico City.

The proposed road would have an approximate length of 2000 miles, about equally divided between the two republics, would cost \$30,000,000, or a total of \$60,000,000, and would take six years to construct, Professor Jones says.

From Minaca the road would go, it is proposed, to the rich mining districts at Parral and on to Durango City, and from there to the east of the Sierra Madre mountains, through Zaratecas and Guadalajara. On the northern side of the international boundary the road would run through the resourceful sections of southern Utah, the farm and oil sections of northwestern New Mexico, and cross the border at Columbus.

Within a few years, it is said, the Southern Pacific of Mexico will effect a connection with Guadalajara and

at El Paso, so that trains could run there could be an interchange of traffic from El Paso to Salt Lake and Guadalajara with the Southern Railway, it is said.

## ASSERTS JAPANESE ONCE INHABITED PHILIPPINES

ANN ARBOR, Mich., Oct. 10 (AP)—The veil has been lifted from the prehistoric past of the Philippine islands and discoveries have been made rivalling those in the tomb of Tutankhamen, according to a report received today at the University of Michigan from Dr. Carl E. Guthe, heading an archaeological expedition now in the islands.

Dr. Guthe's report hints strongly for the first time that Chinese formerly inhabited the islands, a conclusion which he says is substantiated by the deposits unearthed by him during the last year. Material so far discovered, Dr. Guthe's report says, included hundreds of pieces of pottery, broken and unbroken, much of it of the Ming period, some Tang, some Sung, and much to be identified. There also have been found human bones, chip-stone and iron implements

and weapons, copper and bronze articles, gold inlaid teeth, and gold, shell, coral, glass and stone ornaments. Dr. Guthe values several of the articles at many thousands of dollars.
