CURZON URGES CONFERENCE ON REPARATIONS

Great Britain Again Asks for Cooperation of U. S. in War Debt Plan; Hughes Names Conditions in Reply

LONDON, Oct. 25 (AP)—Correspondence issued by the foreign office tonight showing that the British government had seized the occasion of the first public statement by President Coolidge on the situation in Europe to send another forceful invitation to the Washington government to cooperate in a new conference in an attempt to settle the reparations difficulty came tonight as a complete surprise to the public and newspapers. The secret had been well kept, especially considering the presence in London of all the empire representatives, who must have been aware of the move, which undoubtedly was discussed in the confidential debates in the imperial conference on foreign affairs.

Lord Curzon's request is for American participation in any form, either official or unofficial, or, alternatively, to participation in an inquiry by a special commission appointed by the reparations committee. Whether the government's move was prompted by General Smuts, or whether General Smuts' famous speech was intended to lead to the move, it is not known. It will be noted that General Smuts proposal was for a conference of all the powers including the neutrals, not merely those interested in reparations.

In his reply to Lord Curzon, Secretary Hughes declared that the United States is willing to take part in an economic conference in which all the European allies chief, while the German reparations participate for the purpose of ascertaining Germany's capacity to pay and an appropriate plan for payment. He emphasized three points, however: First, that while the United States has no desire to see Germany relieved of her responsibilities or just obligations, regard must be had for Germany's ability to pay and for the fundamental condition of Germany's rehabilitation; second, that such conference should be advisory; and, third, that the question of the interest debt is entirely separate from the question of reparations.

No official opinion could be gleaned at the foreign office tonight, but the general view seems to be that there is not a sufficient advance by Secretary Hughes' attitude, as revealed by the correspondence, as to warrant a very strong hope that the suggested conference will materialize.

CALL SINCLAIR FOR TESTIMONY

Will Tell Details of Negotiating Big Oil Lease; Denby Takes Witness Stand

WASHINGTON, Oct. 25 (AP)—Harry F. Sinclair, who obtained the lease to the Teapot Dome, Wyoming, naval oil reserve which is being investigated by the senate public lands committee, was summoned today to appear as a witness before the committee Saturday. Members of the committee indicated they wished to question Mr. Sinclair about various points in the contract.

Secretary of the Navy Denby, testifying before the committee today, assumed full responsibility for the transfer of oil administration of the three naval oil reserves from his department to the interior department. He also announced his full approval of the policy pursued by former Secretary Hall not only in handling of the naval oil reserve supplies at Teapot Dome but also upon the two reserves in California.

Commander I. N. Landis, U. S. navy, retired, who was in charge of the two reserves in California, testified that he had not been consulted concerning the transfer of the management of the reserves to the interior department. Secretary Fall, soon after assuming charge, discussed with him in San Francisco conditions upon the reserves, he said, adding that he had strongly urged upon the secretary the drilling of offset wells which subsequently were reported to be contributing to the draining of the oil on the reserves.

THE MARKETS

CROP REPORTS CAUSE OF NEW UPTURNS IN WHEAT

Prices Raised Slightly on Strength of Rumors of Damage and Continued Gossip on Federal Plan

CHICAGO, Oct. 25 (AP)—New upturn in the price of wheat resulted chiefly from reports of threatened damage by frost in Argentina and from continued gossip that the United States government would take some action likely to enhance wheat prices. The market closed unsettled 3-8 to 7-8c higher, with December \$1.07 to 1.08 1/4, and May \$1.11 5/8 to 1.12 3/4.

Knowledge that the wheat crop in Argentina is at a critical stage of development gave special emphasis to word of unseasonably cold weather, and bullish sentiment was further increased by the fact that leading commission houses kept their patrons on the alert for Washington news touching expected measures to help grain growers. Regardless of whether some of the proposed plans were considered wise or unwise, the immediate effect in the market here was to restrain speculative selling and to encourage buying.

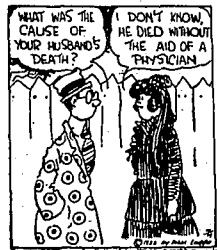

PRESERVATION OF CROPS CALLS OUT VOLUNTEERS

Saving of Potatoes is Deemed in Some Quarters Most Urgent Present Task; Labor Supply Meeting Demand

Volunteer workmen in numbers sufficient to supply the day's demand, presented themselves Thursday at the chamber of commerce offices and were sent out to assist in the community effort to save the district's perishable crops. Eleven crews of workmen were sent out, five of them going to bean fields and six to potato fields.

Estimate Work to Be Done. Estimates made Thursday evening by dealers and others familiar with the situation were that between 50 and 75 per cent of the county's bean crop has been harvested or protected against damage by storms, and that about 50 per cent of the potato crop has been dug.

The situation with respect to saving the potato crop is one that is most desperate now. It was urged in some quarters. Idaho's potato crop is being dug at the rate of 6 per cent daily, and 20 days' work will complete the task, according to figures at hand.
