Claim Success in Marketing Spuds Under New Scheme

IDAHO FALLS, Nov. 3 (AP)—The Idaho Potato Exchange, the cooperative marketing organization for selling the Idaho potato crop, is making good progress, according to Field Secretary W. H. Hill, during the past week ten cars of number one Russets have been sold at prices ranging from \$1.75 to \$2.15 a hundred, with an average for the brand called "State Exchange Brand." Mr. Hill said. Russets were sold mostly in the Texas market, 20 cars having been sold during the same period at prices ranging from 75 cents to 95 cents per hundred f. o. b. Idaho Falls.

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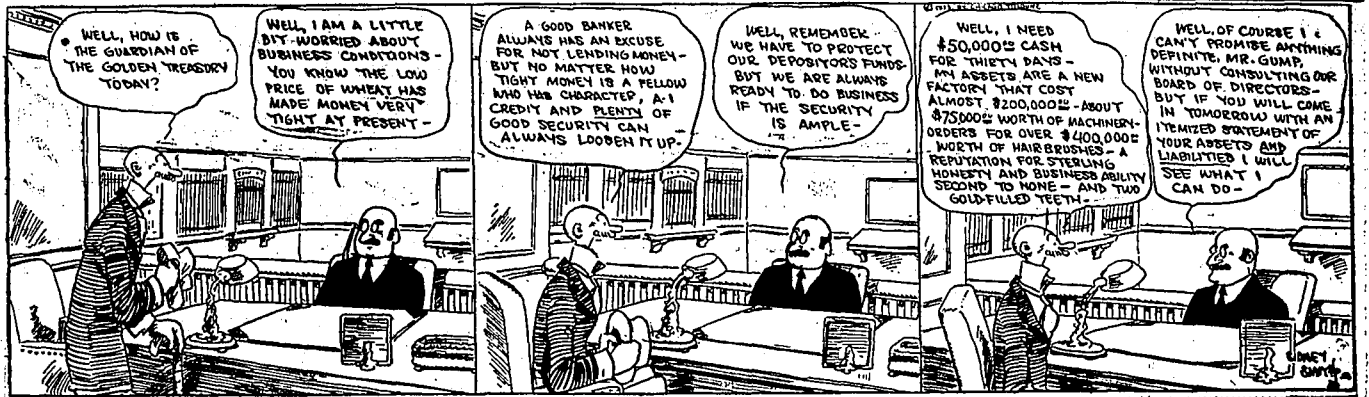

KENTUCKY HORSE IS EASY WINNER

In Memoriam Beats Zev and My Own by Wide Margin in \$50,000 Stake Event

LATONIA, Ky., Nov. 3 (AP)—A Kentucky-bred and owned horse, with a Kentucky boy in the saddle, caused the greatest surprise that has climaxed a turf spectacle in years today when In Memoriam defeated Zev and My Own, the greatest American rival My Own, in the \$50,000 Latonia championship stakes before a crowd of 45,000 spectators who braved a cold drizzling rain to witness the exciting upset.

The victory of the handsome bay, son of McGee-Enchantress, owned by Carl Wiedemann, millionaire horseman of Newport, Ky., was convincing. Sprinting into the stretch, In Memoriam conquered Zev, the conqueror of Papyrus, and winner of the Kentucky derby, raced him into submission and flashed under the wire a winner by at least six lengths.

Back of the flashing heels of Zev came Rear Admiral Cory T. Grayson's My Own, trailing eight lengths back. My Own, the fourth start in the race, was distanced in the stretch and pulled up without even trying to catch the flying leaders.

Slow Time.

The race, at a grueling test of one and three quarters, was run in three minutes and 4-5 seconds, 5-14 seconds slower than the American record for the distance. Estimated first was Rockmaster in the same race a year ago. By strange coincidence, Jockey Jack Gardner, the pride of Kentucky knights of the saddle, who now in Memoriam to victory today, holds the distinction of riding Rockmaster when that three-year-old established the record.

The triumph of In Memoriam was a stunning surprise. Kentucky, rich in thoroughbred tradition, knows race horses, but if any horse wise person had been asked last night what he thought of In Memoriam, the reply probably would have been:

"In Memoriam hasn't much of a chance, but he may spring an upset."

Stake Lost \$83,000.

Harry Sinclair, owner of Zev, evidently was convinced that Zev could not be beaten, because he plunged \$83,000 in pari-mutuel machines before the race. Sinclair first wagered \$30,000. Then he dumped \$20,000 more. As the hour for the start drew near, he wagered an additional \$9000 and finally threw away Zev's chances to win. These sums were wagered at the track this afternoon, in addition to the amount he wagered before leaving for the east. Because Zev and My Own were such odds favorites, they carried a \$2 ticket in the mutuels on In Memoriam paid the liberal price of \$33.00 to win. The price on Zev was 40 cents to a dollar, while the figures of My Own was \$3.50 to \$1. The odds on Bialto were \$14.00 to 1.

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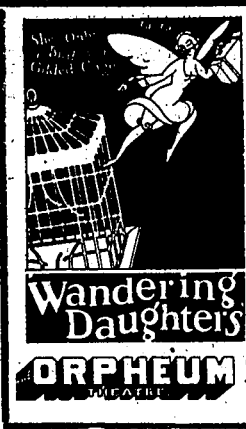

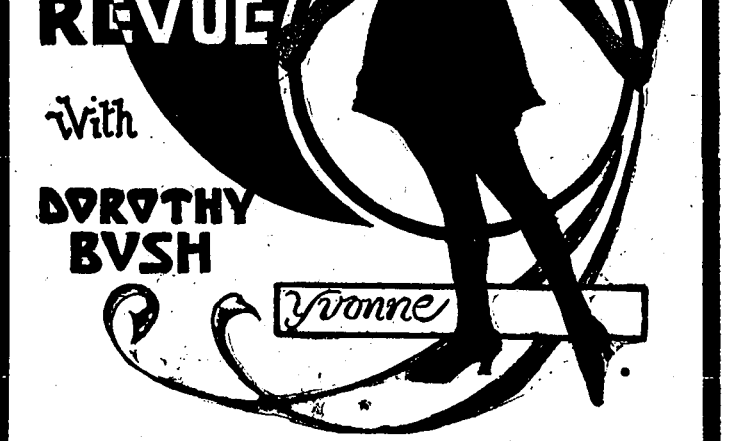
