ALLIED COUNCIL SLOW TO REACH FINAL DECISION

Ambassadors Agree to Warn Berlin After Ex-Prince's Return; French View Situation with Grave Concern

PARIS, Nov. 15 (AP)—The allied council ambassadors were slowly reaching an agreement to send a warning to Berlin regarding the ex-crown prince before he returned to Germany, seems unable to reach an accord as to action now that Frederick William has arrived in the fatherland.

Great Britain, which took the initiative in notifying the government that the return of the prince would be regarded as a grave matter, now raises objections to action because of judicial difficulties.

Memoirs in Berlin

The presence of former Crown Prince Rupprecht in Bavaria, it was pointed out, is quite as much of a menace to the peace as the prince himself.

The French view is that the return of the crown prince, the threatened return of the ex-king and the protection which the allies are demanding for their military control mission in Germany are all connected, forming really three different phases of the same question, that ought to be treated together.

Keep Eye on Germany

The return of William the younger is regarded as the least important of the three by the French government, which, however, insists that action must be taken to obtain security for the military control mission.

Former Officers Welcome Return of War Comrade

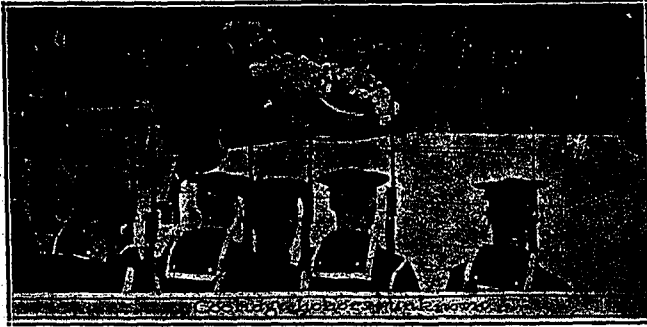
Frederick William Is Addressed as 'His Imperial and Royal Highness'; Receives Flood of Communications

OELS, Upper Silesia, Nov. 15 (AP)—Among messages of welcome awaiting former Crown Prince Frederick William on his return to his castle here from exile in Holland, was an effusive greeting from the league of former army and naval officers.

In the message, the former crown prince was welcomed as "our former army leader and illustrious comrade," and the hope was expressed that his activities and behavior would prove themselves a blessing to the house of Hohenzollern and the German people.

JOHNSON IS OUT FOR NOMINATION OF REPUBLICANS

In Entering Presidential Race California Solon Declares for Direct Primaries in All States of the Union

CHICAGO, Nov. 15 (AP)—Senator Hiram W. Johnson of California, tonight announced his candidacy for the republican nomination for president, declaring that "the ensuing contest fully determines whether the republican party shall be the permanent instrument of reaction or whether it shall respond to present-day conditions and aspirations."

In tossing his hat into the presidential ring, Senator Johnson declared for direct, presidential preference primaries in all states, and the need today was for a "revitalized republican party" which should be an instrument "neither of static reaction nor destructive radicalism," and expressed opposition to the league of nations "and all its subsidiaries."

Theoretically, under our system, the people themselves select their president. I recognize no prescriptive right to office; and I deny that any one of any number of men may disregard the popular will and in defiance of it dictate our candidates.

Flays Present Program

"Reaction and progress must fight it out again in the republican party in the coming presidential primaries. I question not men now but their philosophy of government. That which obtains at Washington does not fit present-day needs. Ultra-conservatism there rules; progressivism challenges it."

The whole future of national existence may be endangered by the considered acts of a day. I am against the league of nations and all its subsidiaries, membership in which would tend to participation, directly or indirectly in the league.

"Of course, we would always promote peace and endeavor to prevent war. We would help Europe in any national way. We would continue to alleviate suffering, clothe the naked, feed the hungry, but we would ever be the sole judge of our own actions, the arbiter of our own destiny."

"Upon these as fundamentals, amplifying and expressing details hereafter, to the men and women who constitute America's free citizenship, I will make my appeal. In every state the contest will be waged. In those states where the voters may express their preference the issue can be definitely decided; and, I hope, all candidates will participate in the presidential primaries, including California, and cheerfully acquiesce in the result."

Bank Bandit Fails to Get Away with Money

Holdup Takes \$4500. in Cash But Is Captured Four Hours Later and Loot Is Recovered

CENTER CITY, Minn., Nov. 15 (AP)—Four hours after the Shafter State bank had been held up and robbed of between \$4500 and \$5000 in currency and silver, a man giving his name as Ted Williamson, and his address as Memphis, was captured near Nevada Dam, 10 miles north of here, late this afternoon. The money was recovered.

Williamson confessed that he committed the robbery, according to S. B. Wenberger, county attorney. The loot was found in a small touring car which Williamson is said to have admitted stealing.

BORAH ATTACKS PRESENT POLICY

Launches Criticism of Tax Program; Sees Possibility of Increased Expenditures

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15 (AP)—The first broad attack on the taxation policy of republican organization leaders in congress was made tonight by Senator Borah, who declared that reduction of the present tax burden was not only an economic but a moral necessity.

"The plain, immediate, imperative duty of congress," said Senator Borah, "is to relieve the taxpayers of this country of the weight of the burden they are now carrying. This is one thing that congress can do and it seems strange that there should be any delay about doing it."

"The method of reduction is practically possible to reduce taxes to the extent of \$200,000,000. To cut down the government's expenditures and the tax burden to the amount of \$300,000,000 would mean much more than the act of the great reduction would be of almost incalculable psychological value, giving assurance to the country that congress was at least considering the interest of those who must pay the bill."

"We are just now in Washington witnessing the uncovering of a chink in the armor of the government, a chink that is being enlarged by the act of the late war has been thrown here and there as if dollars were waste paper. I doubt very much, when every dollar of the tax money is being used for the food and the pathetic needs of the disabled, if a more grovelling exhibition of unconscionable indecency, of dishonesty, has ever been disclosed."

"The tax question in this country is no longer merely an economic problem; it is also distinctly and unmistakably a moral problem."

DIFFERENCES OF EAST AND WEST ARE EXPLAINED

North Dakota Governor Puts in Strong Arguments for Farmers at New York Civic Body's Dinner Event

NEW YORK, Nov. 15 (AP)—The American East met the American Northwest tonight and there was a mutual explanation and string of grievances at the 19th annual banquet of the New York State Chamber of Commerce.

Governor Raymond Anderson, North Dakota, represented the Northwest, W. P. G. Harding, former governor of the federal reserve board, represented the East.

Governmental aid in stabilizing the wheat market was a subject both speakers discussed. After pointing out that farmers worked 14 to 16 hours a day to raise a wheat crop which failed even to pay the cost of production, the Dakotan said they realized a solution to their problem was possible only through government aid.

"The farmer feels that he is being deceived and discriminated against and the resulting bitterness furnished much of the motive power for his recent political thought and action," he said.

Favors Co-operative Plan

Mr. Harding held that government aid was unwarranted and that the solution to the farmers' problems was in co-operative marketing plans.

BOISE, Nov. 15 (AP)—Calvin Coolidge will be the next republican nominee for the presidency, declared William Spry, United States land commissioner and former governor of Utah, who arrived in Boise today to inspect the land office.

NEW CHARGES PLACED AGAINST FORMER HEAD OF VETERANS' BUREAU

Poisoning of Dogs Brings Grief and Fear to Children

Menace of Death Lurking for Four Footed Companions Darkens Little Folks' World

Apprehension and grief have entered many childish hearts in consequence of the activities of persons guilty of poisoning a score or more of dogs and puppies during the past several days in Twin Falls.

The guilty persons have thus far eluded police detection, but officers are diligently pursuing clues that they hope will lead to the arrest and conviction under Idaho law that seeks to protect animals against cowardly enemies in human guise.

One more instance of poisoning, according to police records, occurred Thursday last, when a witness told the death of Johnny Wurster's treasured Alfred pup—Johnny's companion and pride, which he had obtained at the cost of many months' savings.

Many dogs, including a dog named the puppy had that morning been playing with their own treasured dogs and puppies, and with fear gripping at each little heart, they renewed resolutions to guard with increased vigilance the welfare of their own playfellows.

Quadruple Murder Ends Quarrel Over 15-Year-Old Girl

Aged Farmer and Wife and Two Others Killed by Desperate Following Argument of Rival

KELLIHER, Minn., Nov. 15 (AP)—Argument over a 15-year-old girl by two rival suits resulted in a quadruple murder near this town today. Leonard Foran, considered in this vicinity as a "bad man," the alleged murderer, fled to the woods after the murders.

Profit of \$470,000 Realized on Booze That Cost \$70,000

'King of Bootleggers' Put Over Big Deal; Government Demands \$75,000 in Duties

NEW YORK, Nov. 15 (AP)—Emmanuel H. Kesler, known to federal authorities as "Mannie, King of the Bootleggers," and his chief co-worker, Morris Sweetwood, bought imported liquor for \$70,000 and sold it at a profit of \$470,000, assistant Federal Attorney Clark declared today in opening the prosecution in federal court of Kesler and 18 others charged with violation of federal prohibition and income tax laws and with forgery and bribery.

Mr. Clark charged Kesler and Sweetwood had defrauded the government of taxes and duties aggregating \$75,000.

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Searching Inquiry Is Made by Senate Committee into Past Life of Forbes; Conspiracy Is New Allegation

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15 (AP)—Searching inquiry into the official and private life of Charles F. Forbes was made today by John F. O'Ryan, general counsel for the senate veterans' committee, as the former director of the veterans' bureau sat for six hours facing his accusers from the witness chair in the crowded hearing room.

Before beginning his questioning, O'Ryan, apparently stirred by Forbes' charges of improper conduct by committee counsel, stated that he expected to prove conclusively the whole truth of Charles Forbes' charges that Colonel Forbes was one of the gang of conspirators who were tied together neck and jawl to defraud the government.

To all the charges of improper official or private conduct, and of drink and gambling, Forbes insisted vigorously and adamantly. O'Ryan asked him to swear by his answers, but he remained unshaken and appeared to be calmer than he was during his direct examination.

Evidence Bared Out

O'Ryan sought to go back into Forbes' early life history. The former director told him he had no objection to the production of the official record in the marine corps when he was a young man, but William Reed said the committee would enforce a previous ruling that it would not hear evidence relating to Forbes before his appointment as director.

Other developments in the hearing today included: The presentation by O'Ryan of new charges of "grossing out" Forbes which the former director denied.

A finding by the committee in response to Forbes' charges that his counsel have not been guilty of any "improper conduct," but "have merely carried out the duties for which they were appointed in a manner that does them credit."

Disclosure that the committee, sitting in executive session, has taken the testimony of two women, Mrs. Elias Morimer, which is withheld from the record, at least for the present.

Testimony of Forbes that Mrs. Caroline Votaw, a sister of President Harding, introduced to J. W. Thompson, one of the chief Chicago contractors of Thompson and Black. The former director said Thompson was seeking advice as to the employment of a lawyer to press his claim against the government for the seizure of a ship.

Boynnton Protests Apportionment of G. O. P. Delegates

California Chairman Sees Unjustness in Allotment of Seats at Convention; Says "Solid South" to Benefit

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 15 (AP)—Telegrams were sent today by Albert E. Boynnton, chairman of the California republican state committee to republican chairmen in a number of eastern and middle western states urging unified action in protesting to the republican national committee against what he terms "the unjust and inequitable apportionment of delegates to the next republican national convention."

Boynnton is basing his protest on the fact that under an exact apportionment of delegates to republican votes cast in 1920 California would be entitled to 16 seats in the national committee, whereas under a plan recommended by the national committee this state would receive but 23 seats.

"There were approximately sixteen million republican votes cast for president in 1920," he said. "On the basis, in round numbers, of a seven-to-one ratio of republican to democratic votes in this nation, we are being allowed for the benefit of the solid south, a disproportionately small number of delegates to the next republican national convention."

"The outstanding and utterly inequitable feature of this apportionment is that the group of states which are being allowed a disproportionately small number of delegates to the next republican national convention are the solid south and the solid north."

# ECHO OF FORMER ROW INTERFERES

## Reception of Lloyd George in America Tempered by Peace of Versailles

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 15 (AP)—Governor Sweet of Colorado speaking tonight before the annual convention of the American section of the world alliance for international friendship through the churches, declared that David Lloyd George would have gained a greater following during his recent tour of the United States had the friends of the league of nations been able to force that the former British premier had opposed Woodrow Wilson during the Versailles peace conference.

"We now know," said the speaker, "that President Wilson labored in vain for a different peace than was finally made. We know how tenaciously he held to his fourteen points as the basis of war negotiations with the enemy countries, but Mr. Lloyd George, in company with Clemenceau, stood squarely against any such concessions. We are inclined now to see our great might into the scales of peace," but in 1919 England did not care to listen to our president as he sought then to cast our great might into a tolerable peace.

**Makes Second Appeal.**  
"You will remember that when Mr. Lloyd George made his campaign for reelection he was determined that 'Germany should pay to the last farthing.' Although there were eminent British economists who maintained that the peace treaty was signed that Germany could not pay, they were not heeded. And now, defeated at home, his policies repudiated and with no way to make Germany pay Lloyd George again asks us to help rescue Europe from the crisis which his course has precipitated.

Despite this, I would not have you think I believe that Britain's Macedonian cry should go unheeded by America. We may or may not favor America entering the permanent court for international justice, we may be for or against outlawry of war, but we cannot advocate isolation. From a materialistic standpoint alone isolation is impossible.

Governor Sweet said that when all the difficulties were considered, he "marveled" at the accomplishments of the league of nations.  
Referring to the efforts of the Church for Universal Peace, Governor Sweet said: "A valid Christianity for today" would seek to abolish war, but also, side the other horrors of war, hate is the logical outcome and inevitable fruit of war."

## HONOR HARDING'S MEMORY

Island Hilltop Near California Coast City to be Flashed in Gaslights in Memory of Late President.

AVALON, Cal., Nov. 15 (AP)—A Santa Catalina island hilltop overlooking Avalon may be lit at night with gaslights as a memorial to former President Harding, according to plans announced by William Wrigley, Jr., owner of the island. Fifteen acres on the hill will be kept covered with red blooms. President Harding's fatal illness prevented a visit he was to have made to Avalon at the end of his tour to the Pacific coast.

## Old-Time Hunters Outdone by Youth

Led Equipped with 22-Galiber Rifle Is the Only One to Party of Six to Bag Deer—Others Miss.

SPOKANE, Nov. 15 (AP)—Armed only with a .22 calibre rifle, Jack Whorn, 13, son of Colonel I. C. Welton, commanding officer of Fort Wright, was the only one of a party of six to bag a deer during a recent hunting trip near Chowchilla.

Other members of the party, all adults, although carrying high-powered rifles and having several shots, failed to return with any quarry.

## Bootlegger Is Proud of Big Liquor Still

Spokane Man Gladly Shows Officers About Premises, Is Then Fined and Given Sentence.

SPOKANE, Nov. 15 (AP)—Local city and county police authorities received a distinct shock here recently while raiding the home of James Dulis for illicit liquor, when instead of interfering, Dulis proudly escorted the officers around and explained in detail how conveniently he had arranged his manufacturing plant.  
After the dry agent had listened to a lengthy recital on the "Dulis system" and its new features, examined the apparatus carefully and uncovered nine gallons of liquor, they brought their host before Justice Blocker, who assessed him a fine of \$300 along with a jail sentence.

## STRANGE DISEASE TAKES HEAVY TOLL OF CATTLE

PHOENIX, Arizona, Nov. 15 (AP)—Experts in cattle diseases have been called to the ranch country in the southeast corner of Pima county to investigate a mysterious malady which caused the death in two days of 100 registered cattle. Official reports received here of the character of the disease, said that the cattle dropped dead within five or ten minutes after the malady struck them.

## DEMOCRATIC WOMEN WILL LAY PLANS FOR CAMPAIGN

Voters From Idaho and Seven Other Western States to Convene at Denver Soon to Map Out Program.

DENVER, Nov. 15 (AP)—Democratic women of Colorado, New Mexico, Wyoming, Montana, Idaho, Utah, North Dakota and South Dakota will be summoned to Denver in the near future to lay plans for state and national election campaigns, according to a telegram from Mrs. Emily Newall Blair, vice chairman of the democratic national committee.  
"For purpose of organizing the democratic women and encouraging other women to fight under the banner of democracy, the democratic national committee has decided to divide the country into sections and to place an outstanding woman in charge of each," says the telegram from Mrs. Blair.  
Denver, according to the message, will be made headquarters for the Rocky Mountain region.

EUGENE, Ore., Nov. 15 (AP)—That the average college man's English, both written and spoken, is poor, is the declaration of W. F. G. Thacher, professor of advertising at the University of Oregon, in an open communication in the columns of the Oregon Daily Emerald, student paper. Professor Thacher stated that the outstanding criticism of the average college man is that he is not equipped with a sound acquaintance with the English language.

Professor Thacher and previously questioned various business and professional men on the qualifications of the college graduate and he found in most instances that the chief objection was faulty English. He said he believes the criticism just and suggested that only by campaigning against loose grammar can it be properly corrected.

BRUINS TO MEET BURLEY FRIDAY

Board's Decision Lists Contest Between Locals and Huskies at Burley Field

"After a week of uncertainty the district board of control handed down a decision Friday that Twin Falls must play Burley at Burley to decide the district championship so the Bruins will once again do their traveling uniforms and journey to the new territory to decide who shall meet Idaho Falls next Friday for the interdistrict championship.

Secretary Ene of the state board left the decision to the local district board. Superintendent Broadbent of Burley and Superintendent Deaton of Buhl, both noted that the game be played at Burley, while Superintendent Deane of Gooding voted that the game be played on a neutral field. The result is that if Twin Falls competes for state honors they must play at Burley Friday.

Superintendent Broadbent of Burley is making an attempt to get a referee from Salt Lake, as neither Thompson nor Hutton of Pocatello, will be able to officiate as originally planned. The umpire will be Cal Bertson of Rupert, and Wilson of Oakley will hold the down as head line-man.

The Bruins finished their week of practice Thursday night with a light work out and will depart by auto bus Friday morning for Burley. Coach Evans will take 21 men including Manager Hahn. The road on the south side of the river is in good condition and the drive can be made easily in an hour and a half. It is expected that a good sized delegation of Twin Falls supporters will make the trip.

DISCOVER SILVER DEPOSIT

Eight Feet of Ore Carrying Bipy and Silver Glance Revives Mining Interest in Alaska.

ANCHORAGE, Alaska, Nov 15 (AP)—The recent discovery of eight feet of silver ore, carrying ruby silver and silver glance, ten miles from the Alaska railroad near Chulitna station, has served to revive interest in the possibilities of developing a large tonnage of base ores for the railroad. The find was made by "Moose" Johnson, who has prospected in Alaska for the past 15 years. Samples of the ore show assay values of 200 ounces of silver and the rock compares favorably with that coming from the Mayo mines, Yukon territory. Many employees of the Alaska railroad who will be at leisure following the completion of the Moose Creek spur, are outfitting for the hills, and other important finds are looked for.

Memorandum reports of seeing the grandfather of Cyprus wearing false hair, so that the custom may be traced to the Medes, among whom it is believed to have been in favor. The Cretan had apparently a weakness in that direction as the strangely fringed heads of their statues indicate. And on the stage wigs were in vogue among the Greeks.

TOURISTS SPEND BIG SUM

Figures of Colorado Springs Civic Body Show Average Traveler Spends from \$3.50 to \$10 a Day.

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo., Nov 15 (AP)—The automobile tourists camping out nightly are more profitable than the rail or through automobile tourist, figures compiled by the chamber of commerce here show. Figures show that the average through automobile tourist spends \$3.00; the average rail tourist \$5 and the average automobile camping party \$10 a day.

The same report also shows that half the tourists camping here or passing through here were either on their way to or from California, and the Yellowstone park. Approximately 250,000 automobile tourists visited this city during the season just closed. A total of 650,000 tourists visited the entire state, spending more than \$45,000,000, the report shows.

Corn Crop Produces 168 Bushels per Acre

Yield of 168 bushels of Yellow Dent corn per acre was produced this year by A. Koll on his farm, one mile north and one mile west of Twin Falls, according to report of a yield test brought here Thursday by J. N. Burr. The yield was estimated on the basis of 75 pounds to each bushel.

In making the test, H. Cook and R. Cook measured off a single acre 19 rods long and 8 rods 7 feet wide. There were 43 rows of corn in the measured space. Every seventh row was picked and the product weighed by J. N. Burr. The total weight averaged 292 pounds per row.

The test was made in response to suggestion made by many persons who saw the growing crop, several of whom pronounced it the best corn crop they had ever seen.

WILL OARE FOR GAME BIRDS

TEROUGE COMING WINTER SPOKANE, Nov. 15 (AP)—Distribution of grain for game birds in the district adjacent to Spokane this winter has been arranged, according to M. A. Roberts, Spokane county bird commissioner.

Two carloads of grain have been purchased, he said, which exceeds any amount of feed ever used before. The state game farm near the city is making an unusually good showing. Mr. Roberts stated, and a large flock of Chinese pheasants is ready for release.

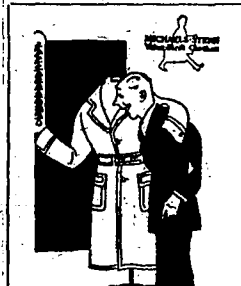

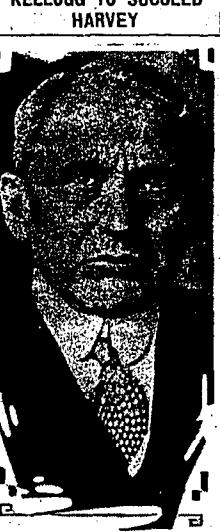

# FIGHT FOR PLUMS WELL UNDER WAY

### Distribution of Patronage by Forthcoming Congress Attracts Keen Party Interest

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15 (AP)—Electioneering for the plum is being divided in the office of officers of the senate and house in the congress already has begun.

Alviny is centered largely among the republicans, with their majority control of both bodies, but the democrats also are divided over the ticket they will present for all offices from president of the senate and speaker of the house.

Present indications are for the sharpest contest in the house. The re-election of Speaker Gillett is said by organization leaders to be a sure thing. It is generally expected that Flinjs J. Garrett of Tennessee, will be the democratic candidate, but a spirited fight for leadership honors and committee places is to be expected.

Conference Called. A call already has been issued for a conference of house republicans on December 1, to arrange a slate of candidates and a call for the organization conference of republican senators to be issued next week by Senator Lodge of Massachusetts.

Selection of the president of the senate is the principal organization matter there is no vice president and the presidency of the senate carries a salary of \$12,000 a year, or \$4500 more than the house receives. Plus the use of an automobile and an elaborate suite of offices. Senator Cummins of Iowa, has told friends that he would like to remain as president, but he also desires to continue as chairman of the interstate commerce committee. A number of senators hold, however, that no senator holding an important chairmanship should also be presiding officer.

## TO EXTERMINATE COYOTES

### Biological Survey World Buy Up Worn-Out Horses for Poisoning Coyotes on Elk Range

WENATOCHE, Wash., Nov. 15 (AP)—A proposition which may simplify the rigorous campaign contemplated by the geographers' survey against coyotes in this vicinity is seen with the Cheilan county game commissioner's offer of \$5 for every old mangled-down horse that the owner cares to dispose of. The horses will be mercifully put out of their suffering, it was announced, and used as a means of attracting poison baits. The plan was suggested by Federal Hunter Peterson, who has been transferred to this district. The horses will be killed into the hills where coyotes are plentiful. There they will be taken and the bodies placed to attract the coyotes. Poison bait will be scattered around the carcasses in such a manner that it will be taken up each morning and replaced at night. This method, it is believed, will work out satisfactorily, as the coyote has a habit of eating its food and in doing so will scent the poison bait and eat it before taking a chance of attacking the animal.

## DOG COMMITS SUICIDE BY LEAP FROM BRIDGE

### Police Recount Unusual Action by Canine, Believed Accused by Loss of Animal's Master

SPOKANE, Nov. 15 (AP)—Distracted, police believed, at the loss of its master, a large Collie dog jumped to the parapet of the river bridge and here last week, hesitated for a moment while it looked at the river flowing 125 feet below, and then leaped into space. It landed on a wooden float anchored to the bank of the stream and was instantly killed. Several people had noticed the dog on the bridge for some time and said it satiff at nearby in a vain effort to find its master, before taking its death leap. No collar or other identification marks were found on its body when it was removed from the stream.

## CLOTHING IS TO BLAME

### Spokane Men Mistaken for Bootleggers Are Told that Appearance Fully Warrants Conclusion Drawn

SPOKANE, Nov. 15 (AP)—Clothes may not make the man, but they can go a long way toward altering appearance. It was learned recently when two prominent Spokane citizens were mistaken for bootleggers. The incident occurred while Maurice Egan, commissioner of public safety, and E. J. Stephens, president of the Spokane school board, were on a hunting trip. A stranger they met in the woods asked Stephens with the query, "Happen to have any whiskey on you?" Upon being assured there was no liquor forthcoming, the man turned to Smith and received a similar denial. Questioned as to whether they looked like liquor vendors, the stranger replied, "You sure do."
