# AVIATOR'S LUCK LAID TO SPIRIT

English Flier Landed on Lake  
of Ill Omen, Say Islanders,  
Which Caused Plane Wreck.

TOKIO, Nov. 6 (AP)—Ill fortune which attended the attempt of A. Stuart Mac-

Laren, British round the world aviator, and his companion to fly across the remainder of the globe after leaving Japan is attributed by the natives of Urup Island, one of the black Kuriles, to the aviator's own indifference to the evil spirit.

When Major MacLaren's big Vickers amphibian hopped off from Yochimoro, Yagoruta Island, one day in July, with Panamshiru Island at the north, of the Kurile chain, as his goal, fog and wind compelled him to land at Tokotan Bay, on the southwest coast of Urup Island. The bay is exposed and when the wind rose Major MacLaren flew his plane a short distance inland, known as Tokotan bog, in so doing, according to the sparse population of Urup Island, he courted the malevolence of evil spirit.

Ill-Omened Water.

"Tokotan bog" is an ill-omened water. The natives say it is bottomless and that no man has ever entered its water and come out alive. There is an evil female spirit, the natives believe, who makes a specialty of handsome men, and when such a one comes to the bog he "vanishes like smoke," and his body is seen no more.

Four years ago two sailors attempted to cross the bog by swimming. They were seen to reach the middle of the lake, swimming strongly, and then to vanish without a sound.

Major MacLaren rested for four days on the shores of the bog, living at an experimental fox farm maintained on the island by the Japanese department of agriculture and commerce, and then hopped off on a successful flight to Faramushiru.

## FEDERAL PRISON FOR CRIMINALS WILL BE BUILT

Rum Runners, Foreigners and Smugglers Cause Government to Plan New Jail on Canadian Border.

MALONE, N. Y., Nov. 6 (AP)—The United States government is soon to begin the erection of a large federal prison at Rouses Point on the Canadian border, according to reports circulating through police circles. The new prison will be used to house the scores of rum runners, other types of smugglers and aliens now being arrested in Clinton, Essex, Franklin and St. Lawrence counties and confined in the county jails until their cases are disposed of. The government is being practically forced to build a prison detention house on the border because the sheriffs of the counties have notified the federal officials they cannot care for the scores of prisoners sent them, the county jails being fast overflowing. Recently the situation has become much worse owing to the great number of aliens being released in the territory. In the courts it has been disclosed that scores of rum runners and others who drop their charges as soon as the border is passed.

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## LONDON CATERS TO AMERICANS

Half Million a Week Being Spent by Visitors From U. S. In English Capital.

LONDON, Nov. 6 (AP)—With the American "invasion" of London in full swing the manager of a big Oxford street shop has estimated that the visitors from over the Atlantic were spending somewhat more than \$500,000 a week in the English capital. London shopkeepers have awakened to the fact that by far the greater number of Americans who come to England these days are people of moderate means who watch their shillings and hence are carefully as does the frugal Briton. There are still visiting millionaires who amaze the English by the prodigality with which they scatter money about, but there is only one millionaire where there are a thousand people of relatively small income.

Marking Prices. Hence hand street shopkeepers are finding it to their advantage to mark the prices on their window displays. This has stimulated trade with the visitors. Two years ago hand street shopkeepers thought it beneath their dignity to have price labels in their windows.

The oldest purchase of the season seems to have been in the shop of an American, after some hesitation and fitting, selected a monocle and ribbon for half a guinea. When he made his choice he said he wanted half a dozen of them, and explained that he had four boys and girls at home in Chicago who had all asked to bring them back as Christmas from London "just like the ducks wear."

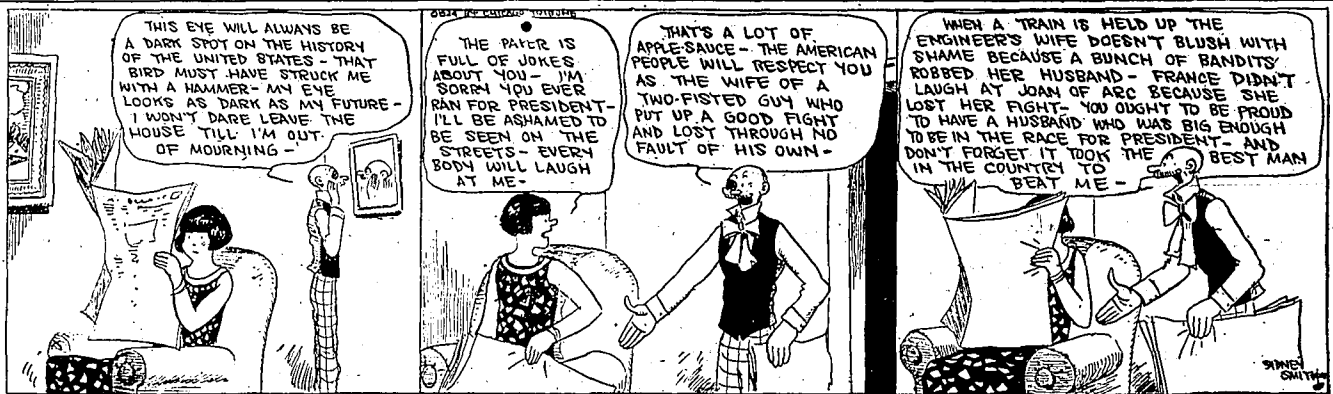

MORENO HELD, FOR THEFT

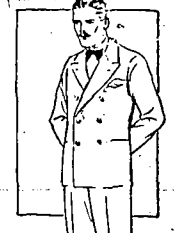

## THE ELECTION.

The biggest and most important lesson taught by the election is that the American people can be humbugged just so far and no farther—when the process has gone far enough public sentiment as a whole awakens to a sense of public responsibility and it is all over.

Incidentally, the thing which brought

about the success of the Republican Party in County, State and Nation was not so much the campaign in itself as the fact that the campaign brought out the vote.

The great majority of the people are naturally conservative. They are opposed to radical departures of any kind, but unfortunately a heavy percentage of this majority is composed of men and women who are passive in their opposition rather than active. Some of them vote, others do not. This is the thing which gives opportunity to the LaFollette. Set it down as one of the eternal truths—the radical never fails to be at the polls early in the morning, rain or shine; the conservative is generally represented by about forty per cent of himself.

If it were possible to revise men's thinking to a point where there would be but two parties in a campaign, one Radical and one Conservative, the result would never be in doubt for a minute, provided always that all the people could be induced to vote. Seventy-five per cent of the rank and file of the American people are naturally conservative. They do not make a great deal of fuss about it, and it is utterly impossible to make a count of them, but they are there just the same and when they become sufficiently interested to perform their plain duty in the matter of an election the result may be set down as a foregone conclusion.

As a sidelight, it is interesting to note the impetus in stock values and in quotations on wheat and other com-

modities. Indications of this kind may be accepted as a barometer of public confidence. Business as a whole should move forward with giant strides now.

Locally, the size of the vote had much to do with the result because the softness principle is involved. And when a thoroughly representative vote is cast occasion for either congratulation or regret over the outcome is largely automatically eliminated. The figures constitute the public's verdict and the public has and should have the last word.

In the meantime the country is safe and the Government of our forefathers still stands, together—God be thanked—with the United States Supreme Court and the rest of the principles and traditions which form the cornerstone upon which rests the Republic.

## FROM THE STANDPOINT OF A NEWSPAPER.

People who seek to punish their enemies through the columns of a newspaper are kindly but firmly advised that this is not the function of a newspaper. The News welcomes communications

for publication upon any topic of general public interest, but is not in the least interested in helping pay off private scores by means of a "piece in the paper."

And one more word—it seems necessary—there must be a signature on all matter sent in if it is to even get started in the direction of publication. It is not always necessary that the name of the writer be published but it is most vitally essential that The News know with whom it is dealing in such matters, if for no other reason than just—as evidence of good faith.

It is still a pretty good general rule not to write anything to which one would not be perfectly willing to attach one's signature.
