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TWO UTAH BOYS CONFESS THEFT OF MANY AUTOS

Enterprising Garage Owners During Day and Thieves at Night; Operations Extend to Oakley, Idaho.

SALT LAKE CITY, Jan. 9 (AP)—Enterprising garage owners by day and automobile and automobile accessory thieves by night is the alleged dual role played by Carl Bloman and John W. Mantle, under arrest here today.

Bloman, aged 19, and Mantle, aged 18, entered a garage at Murray, Utah, south of here. Police claim they have confessed to the theft of many automobiles in both Utah and Idaho which were disguised and sold by them from their "service with a smile" garage.

It was the practice of the two youths, police declare, to steal all of the gasoline they retailed at their garage which was looked upon by Murray citizens as one of the most prosperous in the town.

In one case, it is alleged, the two youths received an order for a rear-end assembly on a high priced automobile. They stole a machine of similar make, destroying all except the parts they needed for the repair job.

Newspaper advertising was a feature of the Bloman and Mantle garage. Frequent advertisements in Salt Lake and Murray newspapers chronicled to the public the merits of the service rendered and the low prices on machines for sale there.

Reclamation Act is Given Approval by Western Officials

Provisions of Law Passed in December of 1924 Meets With Favor at Denver Conference; Promise Support.

DENVER, Jan. 9 (AP)—Almost unanimous approval of the provisions of the reclamation act of December 5, 1924, was contained in resolutions adopted here today by a conference of water users of western states and reclamation service officials.

"The water users, apparently, are back of every effort of the federal government to put the reclamation act of the law," said Professor John A. Wilder of the University of Utah, and a member of the reclamation fact finding commission.

The change proposed by the conference in the resolutions were minor. One change proposed was to the effect that on projects where physical conditions are such as to render reasonably doubtful the permanency and where it is believed that further heavy construction expenditures may be necessary the taking over of the operation and maintenance be not required as a precedent to receiving benefits of the law.

Another suggestion that the scope of the project be broadened to include investigation into various projects in the future success of projects. A third proposed the appointment of an appellate board to determine the value of crops on each project.

OPPOSITION TO STONE ARISES FROM COLORADO

Senate Judiciary Sub-Committee Defers Action on Nomination for Supreme Court Pending Investigation.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 9 (AP)—Unexpected opposition to the confirmation of Attorney General Stone to be an associate justice of the United States supreme court arose today with a result that the senate judiciary sub-committee deferred action pending examination of court records laid before it by James A. Owenby of Boulder, Colo.

Coal Mine Operator. Owenby was part owner and general manager for the Wooten Land and Fuel company, engaged in coal mining and other activities in Colorado and New Mexico, and according to the court records, the executor of the Morgan estate, J. P. Morgan, William P. Hamilton and Herbert L. Saterles, brought action in the federal court in Colorado in 1915, asking for a receiver and an accounting on the basis of a claim that Owenby owed the estate \$200,000 which had been advanced by J. Pierpont Morgan.

The receiver was appointed and Owenby alleged in his bill that while a master was taking testimony for the receiver, the executors brought an action in the state courts of Delaware. A special bond of \$200,000 was required for him under the statute and when he court refused to permit him to defend the action and forthwith entered judgment for \$200,107.27 against him.

Owenby alleged that lastingly his stock, which he claimed had been sold was worth \$400,000, but that it had been destroyed by the receiver, and that, since this constituted his entire fortune, he was unable to obtain the bond required by the court, although he sought to get it in Washington, New York, Chicago, Denver and Boulder.

After judgment was entered an appeal was taken to his Delaware court, which upheld the lower court. The case then went to the United States supreme court, which, in a divided opinion, held that the Delaware law requiring the special bond was not in conflict with the constitution. Associate Justice Pitney delivered the opinion for the court in 1920, and Chief Justice Taft and Justice Brandeis dissented.

Owenby was heard by the sub-committee behind closed doors. Immediately afterward Chairman Sterling began a study of the record presented, but he said that the sub-committee could report the nomination to the entire committee at the regular meeting next Monday as had been the program.

AMERICAN FALLS, Jan. 9 (AP)—The first of 20 outlet gates for the American Falls dam arrived Tuesday morning in a barge on the Snake river. It is one of 10 others that are to be delivered before June 1, 1926. Each gate weighs 25,000 pounds and cost \$7,000 at American Falls. The outlet gates will be placed in the foundation part of the dam and will be used to regulate the water flow through the dam. They are the first big pieces of either equipment or material to arrive for the American Falls dam.

GREAT BRITAIN AND U. S. AGREE ON WAR CLAIMS

Two Nations at Paris Finance Conference Getting Slowly Together on American Reparation Amount.

PARIS, Jan. 9 (AP)—Great Britain and the United States are getting together slowly "but normally" on the American reparations claims which are to finally come before the conference of allied finance ministers in session here.

At the end of today's informal discussions and conferences it was apparent that the representatives of both English speaking countries were trying to drive a hard bargain. Winston Churchill, British chancellor of the exchequer, wished to see the American estimate of war damage claims, tentatively fixed at \$350,000,000, to be whittled down before the Anglo-Saxons finally reach the expected accord.

Second Justice of Supreme Court May Tender Resignation

Oliver Wendell Holmes Preparing to Leave Bench According to Undenied Reports.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 9 (AP)—Another vacancy on the bench of the supreme court in the near future was indicated today in uncertainty but undenied reports that Justice Oliver Wendell Holmes was preparing to resign.

Although Justice Holmes has not disclosed his plans, some of his friends say he will leave the bench in time for his successor to be confirmed before congress adjourns March 4.

MARX LOSES IN BITTER BATTLE FOR LEADERSHIP

Chancellor Worsted by Stresemann for Parliamentary Control; Admits Defeat to President Ebert.

BERLIN, Jan. 9 (AP)—Chancellor Marx tonight lost his battle with Foreign Minister Stresemann for parliamentary leadership. The contest was a bitter one. It was fought by Dr. Stresemann with all the weapons of ruthless German party politics and only ended with the failure of Dr. Marx to construct a government which would not be dominated by the nationalists and Stresemann's peoples party.

The undying antagonism of both parties to any coalition government which would comprise the socialists was born of a severity and bitterness which blocked all the efforts Chancellor Marx has put forth during the past five weeks to evolve a complete cabinet, which would have a broad base and a clear majority out-

SENATE HOPES FOR ACTION ON SHOALS TODAY

Effort Will Be Made to Get Measure Through to Conference With House at Once; Two Plans Up.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 9 (AP)—Early termination of the senate's struggle over disposition of Muscle Shoals project was foreseen tonight by senate leaders in a highly-anticipated adoption of either the Underwood bill or the Jones amendment referring the problem to a commission.

Vigorous effort will be made tomorrow to get a final vote which will end "some" Muscle Shoals bill to conference with the house, which passed a bill accepting the Ford offer (that was withdrawn and thus make way for other legislation, which practically has been blocked in the senate by the "Shoals" question since congress intervened. Some of the leaders, however, were of the opinion tonight that a decision could not be reached on one day and that the problem would have to go over until next week. A close vote between the Underwood and Jones proposals is generally predicted.

The whole of today was devoted to debate on the question, although wide debates were made at times from the main subject for a political discussion which was evoked by a charge of Senator Norris, republican, Nebraska, that the democrats had not kept their pre-election pledges and that the substitution and amendment machines were in harmony on Muscle Shoals.

Senator Robinson of Arkansas, the democratic leader, in a vigorous reply, lauded the democrats but not Senator Norris and defended President Coolidge. "Democrat as I am," he shouted, "I do not believe the president of the United States deserves to be charged on the alleged republican senator from Nebraska, I charge him. If a democrat means that I must give myself and feeble powers to an unjust assault upon a political adversary, then I am not a democrat. Fortunately, I don't have to take my definition of a democrat from grumbling George."

Magic Ring Elects Candidates at Will Clerk Informs Jury

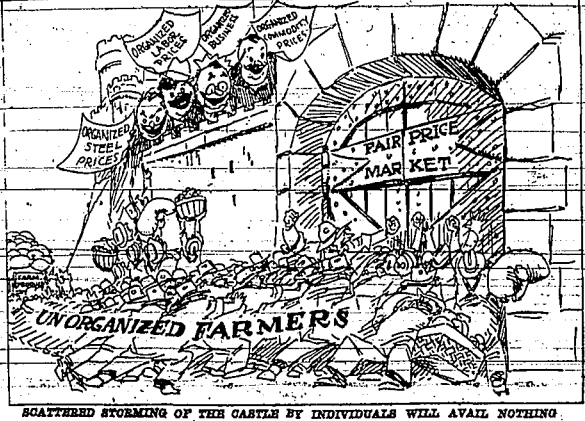
Youth of 26 Tells How He Brought About Election or Defeat of Office Seekers, Conducted School.

NEW YORK, Jan. 9 (AP)—A "magic ring" which when properly manipulated, is said by its inventor to have elected or defeated congressional or lesser candidates, was shown and explained to a New York grand jury today.

Its youthful owner, George ROBERT, asserted that the magic band not only brought about election of Nathan D. Perlman, republican, to congress, and illegally defeated his democratic opponent, Dr. William J. Binchick, but that one like it was the prize which went to the victor in a school for ball players. The ring, he said, held a cleverly concealed bit of lead with which any person, with adequate instruction and practice, could mark ballots under the wary eyes of poll watchers without fear of detection.

Many Ballot Boxes. His "school," the dapper young election clerk explained, claimed an annual list of names "Chalky Street" in New York, Philadelphia, Boston, Jersey City, and Hoboken. "Somebody who is getting restless," Binchick, attorney general, said, "has confessed that he had marked and unmarked ballots in last November's election in which he was a tally clerk, although an employee of the Fulton county clerk's office. 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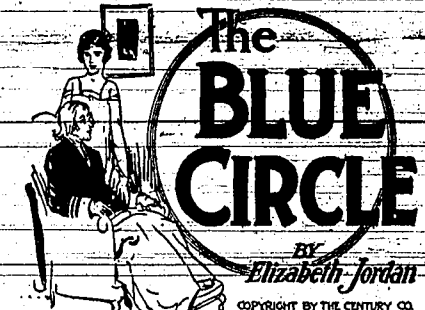

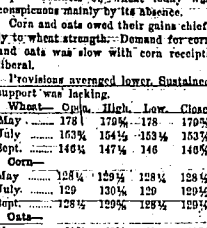
