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# JUDGE REFUSES TO SENTENCE 4 POSTAL CLERKS

## "Scandalous Pay" of Mail Employees Compels them to Be Dishonest, Federal Jurist Declares in New York Case.

NEW YORK, Jan. 12.—The "scandalous pay" of postal clerks compelled them to be dishonest, Judge Francis A. Winslow said today in pronouncing sentence upon four clerks, who pleaded guilty to transferring cancelled stamps at a profit of about \$100 each.

"I have looked into the records of these men," Judge Winslow said, "and find that though they have given from 10 to 30 years' service to the government they now receive salaries of only \$1,800 to \$2,000.

**Not Criminals.**

"I will not send them to prison because they do not belong to the criminal class. I wish some of the other welfare societies would look into the troubles of postal clerks instead of attempting to reform habitual criminals."

The men were released under suspended sentences on condition that they return to court on June 1, with proof that they have lived honestly.

# WOOLMEN OPEN CONVENTION AT STATE CAPITAL

The principal feature of the morning session was the annual address of President P. Clyde Bacon of Twin Falls, which was in part as follows:

In calling to order the 22nd annual convention of the Idaho Wool Growers' Association, many of you are reminded of past conventions and of the many changing conditions relative to the industry.

Some of you were engaged in the sheep business on or prior to the birth of this organization. You have seen the industry grow from a few scattered herds into an industry that today produces in Idaho alone, 25 million dollars worth of wool and lamb.

The stockman's job was never an easy one. Before the time of transportation he had the range all to himself and the sheep were scattered over so long a distance and so very extensive, that the advantage was not as great as it seems to us today.

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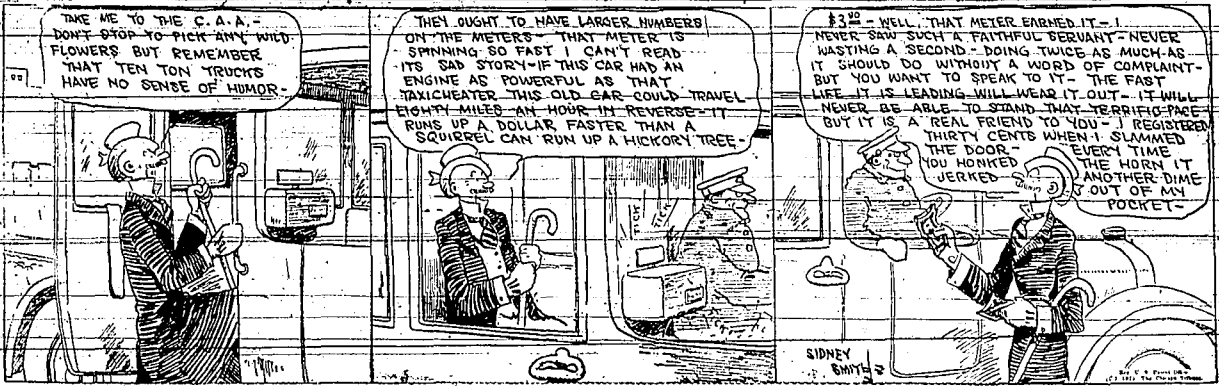

Birthday of Benjamin Franklin, January 17, Marks Opening of Seven-Day Period of Saving.

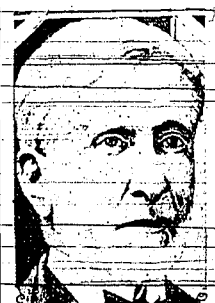

RUSSIAN TRIAL ATTRACTS MANY

Man Accused of Turning Traitor to Assassins of Czar in 1881 Fights for Life.

MOSCOW, Jan. 12 (AP)—One of the most extraordinary trials in the criminal history of Russia opened Saturday night in a courtroom crowded with communists, revolutionists and foreign visitors. The defendant is Ivan Oshludski, 45, who participated in the assassination of Alexander II, in 1881. Oshludski is on trial for his life on the charge of having turned traitor and betrayed his accomplices in that crime. The prosecution is claiming the slaying caused the death or exile of all his associates.

COLD WAVE DAMAGES TOMATO CROP ON THE WEST COAST MEXICO

EL PASO, Texas, Jan. 12 (AP)—Damage conservatively estimated at between \$100,000 and \$300,000 has resulted to the tomato crop in the west coast of Mexico as the result of an unprecedented cold wave that has swept the growing sections during the past few days, according to telegraphic advices received here. No estimate has been made of the damage done to other crops.

Telegraphic advices received by tomato buyers at the international border here from growers at Los Mochis, Sinaloa, district, place the tomato loss at 50 per cent of the unshaken crop. Growers in the Bazon, Suragosa and Guaymas districts have reported large losses because of the unprecedented cold.

Dr. Groome at this meeting explained that severe winter weather had been largely responsible for the interruption in garbage removal, and stated that three wagons had been put in action last week to facilitate hauling of the accumulated garbage. The commissioners authorized payment of the bill, which amounted to \$125.

During the eight days in question, Dr. Groome declared, "Twin Falls burned more coal than in any corresponding period in its history." The period he stated included two holidays during which, he asserted, "men whose wives didn't carry out the ashes did it themselves" with the result that larger quantities of ashes than usual had been placed in the alleys. He pointed out that a number of institutions that have their own arrangements for hauling ashes held over members of Nelson Hayward, secretary and treasurer, and Fred P. Bates, superintendent, were submitted, the latter report including an estimate of crop production and value.

# ROAD BUILDERS LET CONTRACT FOR NEW WORK

## William Harkins to Gravel 3 Miles of Highway North of Twin Falls District Makes Annual Report

Contract for furnishing and application of gravel on a three-mile stretch of road extending west from a point on Blue Lakes boulevard two miles north of Twin Falls was awarded Saturday by Twin Falls highway district commissioners to William Harkins, whose bid of \$7609 was the lowest of six bids submitted. Grading of this road has been completed and graveling, Mr. Harkins stated, is to begin as soon as weather conditions permit.

The commissioners opened bids for grading of one-mile of road extending east from the gravel road in front of the sugar factory, but no bids were received on the bids because of the absence of E. L. Bush, whose bid of \$1200 was the lowest submitted.

Annual report of construction, maintenance and repair of roads within the district was completed by the commissioners at this time and was Monday approved by the board of county commissioners.

### Road Construction

During the year, the report showed, 22.95 miles of road were graded and 22.5 miles were graveling, graveling being done on roads that were graded in 1923 and graveling being done on roads that were graded in 1924.

Graveling construction was estimated at 25,838 cubic yards, which was obtained from five gravel pits as follows: Cedar Draw, 8790; Deep Creek, 6672; Wynona, Jerome canyon, 5977; Burley, 5012; Rock Creek, 3355. Fifty new permanent structures were installed during the year.

Maintenance operations during the year included supervision of 350 miles of earth road. This work was done under supervision of Foreman in each of seven divisions into which the district is divided. Road maintenance cost was \$5632.25, divided as follows: Labor, \$4604.81; material, \$1410.58; truck, \$453.86.

Bridge maintenance cost \$4906.20, divided as follows: Labor, \$2630.31; material, \$507.29; contract (Hansen bridge floor, \$134; truck, \$225.

Total of the annual report within the district, the report showed, is 114 miles, in addition to which there are 730 miles of earth road, making a total of 850 miles of traveled roads. The district also has 912 permanent structures, ranging from 8-inch galvanized iron pipe to 75-foot steel span.

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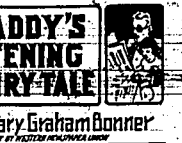
