WASHINGTON, Jan. 31 (AP)—With scant hope of favorable action at this session, the house and senate agricultural committees will continue their early next week on the agricultural relief recommendation proposed by the president's agricultural commission.

Public hearings will be the first order with the house committee, beginning Monday. The senate committee will meet Tuesday.

Several bills are before the committees and they are expected to report on them in the next few days.

There was some talk at each end of the capital today of holding joint sessions for the first time in several years.

POSTAL BILL HAS BAD ROAD AHEAD

House to Vote Tuesday on Resolution for Return of Pay and Rate Measure.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31 (AP)—The postal bill scheduled to vote Tuesday on a resolution to return to the senate the postal pay and rate increase bill on the ground that it infringed on the prerogative of the house to initiate revenue legislation.

Senate Disposes of 137 Measures After Legislative Tie Up

Upper House Working Under Unpleasant Consent Agreement Forges Through Mass of Bills on Calendar.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31 (AP)—Emerging from a legislative impasse reached yesterday, the senate, marking time for an untimely consent agreement, drove through its calendar today, disposing of a total of 137 measures in less than five hours.

Among other measures the senate passed a bill authorizing the inauguration committee to use public space along Pennsylvania avenue for holding stands at the inauguration of President Coolidge.

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GOVERNOR FILES OREGON SCHOOL LAW ARGUMENT

Compulsory Educational Measure Passed by State Legislature Goes to Supreme Court for Settlement.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31 (AP)—In support of the Oregon compulsory education law requiring children between 6 and 16 to attend school, Governor Pierce today filed in the supreme court a brief in which he contended the several states possess all governmental powers not surrendered to the federal government.

In an effort to have set aside the injunction obtained by the Society of Sisters of Holy Names of Jesus and Mary, and by the Hill military academy, retaining the state funds for the law, the Oregon governor today filed his brief.

Should the Oregon law be held unconstitutional, Governor Pierce contended, children may be taught their true allegiance is to some other country than the United States; that the state is not permitted to regulate the education of children.

It is understood the government has sent a strong protest to the Ankara authorities, pointing out that the expulsion constitutes a violation of Turkey's treaty obligations and is an act of hostility toward Greece.

Parliament adjourned tonight for 48 hours of more to allow the government to act with the situation the gravity of which was not disputed by the premier in talks with diplomatic visitors today.

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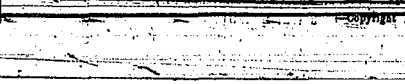
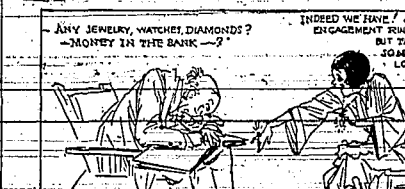
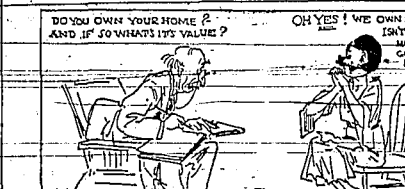

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HOUSE AIRCRAFT COMMITTEE ASKS FOR NAVAL DATA

Inquiry Sessions Temporarily Ended While Information Is Obtained From Officials on Bombing Battleship.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31 (AP)—Terminating its hearings temporarily today with the hope of submitting a preliminary report before the middle of February, the house aircraft committee voted to ask the navy department for information regarding the recent bombing and sinking of the battleship Washington.

It also decided to ask Secretary Weeks for information contained in confidential communication which Brigadier General Mitchell, assistant chief of the army air service, today told the committee and which was the result of recent testimony he had given before it.

Hard to Get Truth.
General Mitchell charged that it was almost impossible for the committee to obtain correct information from the service an aviation because in both flying officers were afraid of direct disciplinary action from their department.

"The navy should be made to tell 'the real truth' of the sinking of the Washington, General Mitchell said. He added that army airplanes could have sunk the Washington in 'from two to four minutes'.

The navy would rapidly develop into an inferior fighting force, Mitchell said, in using a unified air force. He did not advocate immediate abolition of battleships, but declared it was common sense to that and that money should be put into submarines and airplanes rather than into costly battleships that were fast becoming obsolete.

In the strident strains of the Marseillaise, played by the orchestra of the state opera house, the French flag was formally raised over the house of the Russian relief mission which serves as the temporary headquarters of the French embassy. No government or foreign officials were present.

The Russians in the neighborhood started out of their usual lethargy by the martial notes of the French national hymn, asked "When will the American embassy be represented? What shall we hear the temporary national anthem?" but nobody ventured a reply.

TREASURY SUIT OUTCOME WILL AFFECT IDAHO

Test of Federal Community's
Taxation Rights Under Cali-
fornia Community Property
Law to React on This State.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 30 (AP)—The treasury has decided to appeal the test suit on the federal govern- ment's taxation rights under the Cali- fornia community property law, to ap- ply that decision to assessment of tax- es in several other states having com- munity property laws.

The test case, although not yet insti- tuted, will result from the treasury's announced trial to collect income tax- es in California taxpayers to whom it has declined to grant the privileges granted under the state's community property law. Refunds of about \$40,000 will be made to the state's community property law. The treasury's action in California, however, is not a test case, but is a part of a plan to test the federal government's right to collect taxes in states having community property laws.

The treasury's decision, "should it emerge victorious from the legal battle," will make any favorable decision in California a precedent for other states.
