

MEASURES FOR PAY INCREASES REACH SENATE

Bills Providing for Larger Salaries to State Officials Make Appearance in Upper House; Callahan Sponsor.

BOISE, Feb. 3 (AP)—Bills increasing salaries of state elective and appointive officials were introduced in the senate of the eighteenth state legislature today by the upper house. The bills were introduced by the upper house in the rules committee to bring in a bill making this effective on the thirty-second legislative day.

Callahan of Shoshone wants to raise the salaries of all commissioners to \$2000 and pay for each day of state, national, state inspector and superintendent of public instruction \$1000 per annum to conform with those of other officials.

Creation of a game preserve on Soldier Mountain and prohibition of killing game birds by being abundant therein is provided in an act presented this morning by Lavall in Canna county.

Epidemic At Nome Under Control is Report to Seattle

Twenty-Nine Cases Treated With Antitoxin Shipped to Alaskan Town by Dog Sled, More Medicine Shipped.

SEATTLE, Feb. 3 (AP)—The diphtheria epidemic in Nome, Alaska, was under control today, 29 cases having been treated with a total of 200,000 units of antitoxin which arrived yesterday from Nome. Dr. Curtis Welch, acting assistant surgeon in charge of the thirteenth district, United States health service, Seattle, has notified Seattle health authorities that 1,100,000 units shipped here Saturday on the steamer Albatross, are to be sent tomorrow to Nome by dog sled and Nenana on the steamship Admiral Watson. Part of the shipment consists of antitoxin, but more than 200,000 units are to be placed aboard the plane and the remainder on dog sleds.

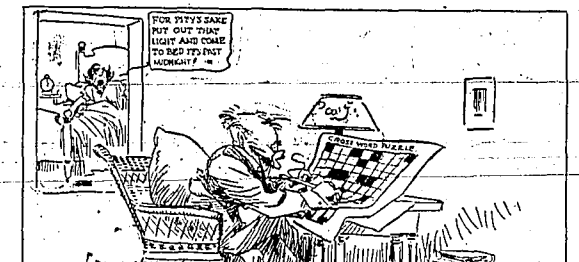

Steamer Lost With All Aboard in Sea Off China's Coast

Ship Sinks With 92 Passengers and 38 in Crew, Report of Liner Captain in France.

MANRILLAS, France, Feb. 3 (AP)—The steamer Haiyang sank with all on board in the China sea last December, according to a report made by the captain of the liner Haiyang, which arrived here today from Haiphong, Indo-China. The Haiyang's captain, officers and crew, all of whom were from Manrillas, together with a crew of 38 natives and 92 passengers, all perished, it was said. Eighty-four of the passengers were natives and eight were members of the Christian union of Indo-China. Haiyang formerly belonged to the Messageries Maritimes and was sold last year to a Chinese company.

# HOG INCREASE A FARM NEED SAYS REPORT

### Second Section of Agricultural Survey Urges Dairymen to Make No Further Expansion During Year, Reason Given.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 3 (AP)—A "considerable increase" in hog production next fall, and a corn average "about the same as in 1924" were recommended by the department of agriculture today in the second section of its annual outlook report.

"If the cattle prices this year, the report said, "should average somewhat higher than last year and that for sheep and wool should be at least on a par with those of 1924."

#### Higher Pig Prices.

Dairymen were urged in the report to make no further expansion in their industry. Higher pig prices were forecast during the past production season of 1924, but the report warned that prices to follow may be lower.

"The hog market," the report said, "over 1925 with 18 per cent fewer hogs than a year ago, and there is every indication that prices during the next few months will be higher than in any time since 1920. Six to eight million fewer pigs will be born this spring than last year."

Fewer sows will farrow next fall than forecasted but fall if producers respond to the unfavorable relation of corn and hog prices as they have done in the past.

#### Corn Crop.

While the 1924 corn crop will probably be well placed up an increased average in 1925 does not appear probable in view of the indicated reduction in the forcing demand. Stocks of old corn on farms are likely to be smaller than usual at the beginning of the new crop year 1925, but it appears that not more than an average crop will be required to supply the needs of the country for both food and commercial purposes.

"Prices for beef cattle for 1925 should average somewhat higher than for 1924. The industry is gradually working into a more favorable position due to the reduction of beef to export commodities, especially pork, and improved industrial conditions and no small measure to the cattlemen's own services."

#### Expansion Inadvisable.

"Further expansion in dairy in 1925 seems inadvisable. A recovery in the price of dairy products could hardly be expected should the number of milk cows be further increased. Domestic production appears adequate to meet the foreign dairy situation in such as to keep world market prices low and thus limit the height to which our butter prices can be without bringing in foreign butter."

Daniel Nugent, New York attorney, Mr. Stokes' counsel in the divorce proceedings is his co-defendant. Part of the alleged false evidence figuring in the allegations of conspiracy is said to have represented Mrs. Stokes as "habitue before her marriage of a then notorious Chicago resort."

## GERMAN TREATY MEETS APPROVAL

### Senate Foreign Relations Committee Favorably Disposed Toward Commercial Pact.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 3 (AP)—The German commercial treaty was favorably reported today by the senate foreign relations committee with reservations approved by the state department, which fall, however, to remove any objection which has prevented ratification of the convention for more than a year.

Under the reservations, the state department's policy against discrimination in favor of American shipping would remain in full force for at least a year, but thereafter it could be changed upon 90 days' notice to Germany.

#### Policy With Congress.

After the committee had acted, chairman Hiram Bland said the reservations left the matter of policy with congress but opponents of the treaty took a look and the prospective new situation in this country promise prices for 1925 at least on a par with those of 1924.

#### Poultry Industry.

#### Son of Man Convicted of Killing Negroes Surrenders to Sheriff; Asks Early Trial.

MONTICELLO, Ga., Feb. 3 (AP)—Roy Williams, son of John R. Williams, owner of the so-called "murder county" "murder farm" on and near which approximately 15 negroes were found murdered several years ago, has surrendered to the sheriff and demanded an early trial on a murder indictment.
