STATEWIDE TAX FOR SCHOOLS IS DEFEATED 29-10

Senate Refuses to Place Its Sanction on Proposed Two-Mill Levy; New Bills Introduced in Upper House.

DOIRIE, Feb. 7 (AP)—The two-mill state-wide school tax bill would lose to defeat in the senate of the eighteenth legislature this morning by a vote of 29 to 10, after changes of sentiment and love of dollar rather than citizenship had been freely flung at opponents of the tax.

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# BUREAU HEADS PRESENT REPORT OF FARM GROUP

## President Coolidge Gets Flare back From Secretary Mellon and Commissioner on Agr- cultural Recommendations.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7 (AP)—Flare-back on some of the recommendations of the president's agricultural commission emanated today from the heads of the executive branch of the government in letters forwarded to President Coolidge.

Secretary Mellon, addressing the president that Commissioner Cooper, creative office of the farm loan board, was leaving Washington to make a study of the credit situation as to the credit needs of the farmer, and other farm products, said he was not entirely clear as to what the commission meant by recommending that the board "should take some aggressive steps" to open up credit channels in agriculture.

**Failed to Inquire**

Chairman Atchison of the Interstate Commerce commission, thinking the president for forwarding him the agricultural commission's recent criticism of the executive branch, felt that some of the executive branch's members would have been cleared up by inquiry into the matter, by reference to an annual report.

Atchison's letter of Secretary Mellon and Commissioner Cooper set out in detail the commission's criticisms and denied their justification.

Secretary Mellon, in his criticism, had always been ready to recognize legitimate demands of agricultural cooperatives, and the intermediate credit banks had been ready to cooperate with cooperative marketing associations. The federal reserve bank, he added, was prepared to cooperate with the farmer's cooperative movement.

**Overlooks Responsibility**

"We are charged with the duty to administer the affairs of the government with equal impartiality to all persons and carriers," Mr. Atchison's letter said, "with an outlook as comprehensive as that of the government itself. It is the duty of our office to see that the public interest is protected and that the government is not burdened with unnecessary expenditures." "Never in the history of the commission could this be done to the extent that it can be and is being done today."

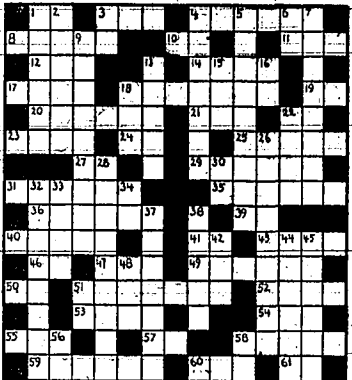

For some time physicians and scientists have been administering insulin believing it to be pure, and Dr. Abel recently he found that even the purest contained foreign materials. He then obtained leave of absence and came here to continue his search for means of eliminating these impurities.
If it is possible to obtain insulin in an absolutely pure and free state, its effect on the human body will be far more realizable than it is at the present time, Mr. Abel said.

In cases where this charge can be proved, it is pointed out, the law will be that much more severe on the prize men, and government agents will have something else to fall back on if the usual allegations fail through.

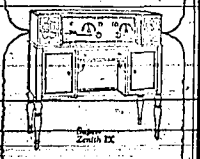
**Fakes to Fool Editors.**

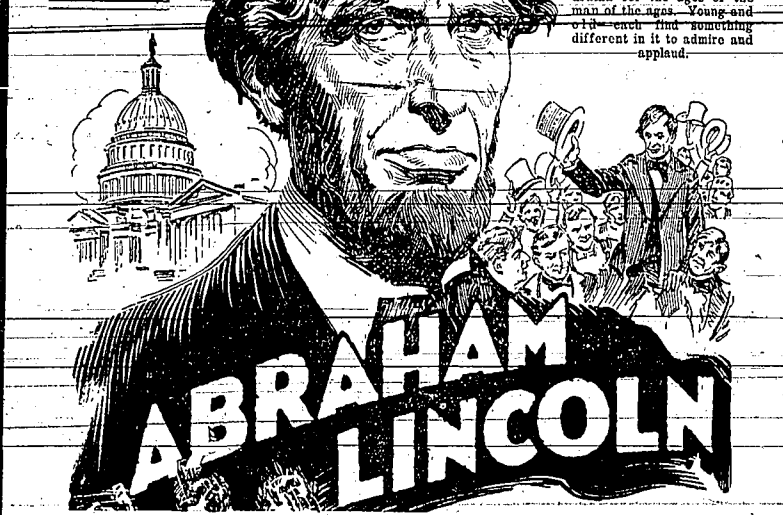

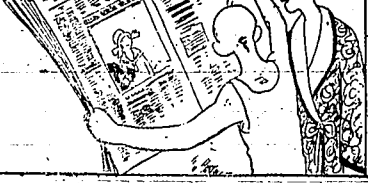
