TWO BOYS DIE AFTER EATING PENNY CANDIES

Kenneth Johnson and Edwin Stevens, Nine-Year-Old Lads, Succumb Following Mysterious Poisoning.

Kenneth Johnson, 9, son of David Johnson, 751 Second avenue north, and Edwin Stevens, 9, son of John Stevens, 214 West Main street, an dead result it is believed, of eating after eating a nickel's worth of penny candies.

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RICH STRIKE BELLEVUE MINE

Discovered Ice Cream.

The discoverer of ice cream is certainly entitled to his niche in the Hall of Fame, and it is merely courteous on the part of the millions, whose palates he tickles, that he be not there. 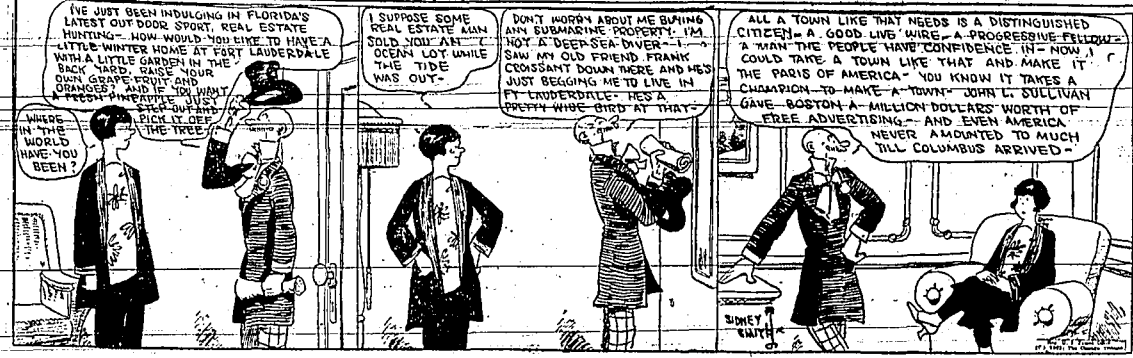
