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INDIANA MINE DISASTER BELIEVED DEAD

Gas Explosion Wrecks Coal Company Diggings; Rescue Workers Hampered in Reaching Scene.

SULLY, Ind., Feb. 20 (AP)—In an explosion of gas that wrought the greatest mine disaster in the history of the Indiana coal fields, 31 men are believed to have been killed almost instantly at 10:45 o'clock this morning in the City Coal company mine on the outskirts of Sully.

There were 121 miners in the mine at the time of the explosion which occurred in the third and fourth entries north, where most of the men were at work, who were killed. Rescue workers went to work at once and the rescue work of the United States bureau of mines at Vincennes, Indiana, reached the scene of the disaster by motor truck on Feb. 19. At 4:45 this morning, one hour after the terrific explosion, they were on the bottom within 35 minutes after arrival.

Of 110 miners who were brought to the surface at once, the work of bringing out the dead proceeded slowly, the bodies being brought singly. These workers were handicapped by a furnace of gas which flooded the mine immediately after the explosion. Tremendous crowds thronged the scene soon after the word of the disaster spread throughout the town and surrounding communities.

Her action was steady and even, with vibration almost giving the sensation of riding in a Pullman car over a fabulous, smooth road.

Assistant Secretary Robinson is making his first voyage on a naval vessel. He has been given all the honors and ceremony customary on a battleship. He has expressed great delight with his experiences.

PAY RAISE FOR LAW-MAKERS IS BILL PROPOSAL

Senate Approves Measure Whereby People Could Amend Idaho's Constitution Doubling Legislators' Salaries.

BOISE, Feb. 20 (AP)—Legislators will receive \$10 per day for their services. The people amend the state constitution as provided in a joint resolution which passed the senate of the state legislature Friday morning. The salary now receives \$5 per day. The new bill doubles this, but limits the aggregate of any one session to \$600.

The department of public welfare is given authority to prevent persons suffering from communicable diseases from working in public places and public eating houses under terms of a house measure which received favorable consideration at the hands of the upper chamber. Applicants for such places are required to give a sample of their blood for tests against social diseases and tuberculosis.

Two of the acts passed affect the state bar. One provides for changing the sections of the law defining the state bar and the other makes an appropriation for the state bar. The other two acts provide for amending the 1923 law relating to the licensing of public accountants. The committee on roads and bridges has reported a bill which will be introduced in the house.

Slow Death to H. B. 128. Slow death was meted out Friday to house bill No. 128, providing for the betterment of existing members of the board of education, when Elson of Clark, asked unanimous consent to have the measure recommitted to the house of representatives education committee, of which he is chairman.

Two state affairs committee bills were passed by the house Friday one of which gives the state power to force political subdivisions to levy taxes on making for purposes of the general fund. The other bill provides that any surplus in the sinking fund of school districts may be included in the sinking fund of the county.

U. S. AIR POLICY DRAWS FIRE OF ARMY OFFICIAL

Brigadier General Mitchell Continues His Attacks on Administration Before Committee of Representatives.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20 (AP)—Brigadier General Mitchell, assistant army chief, continuing his attack on the administration's air policy before the house air craft committee today criticized the special army board report on surface vessels, submarines and aircraft and asserted that the bombing tests against the unfinished battleship Washington had revealed no new information to disprove its statements on the effectiveness of aerial bombing against surface vessels.

Findings of the navy special board, appointed at the request of President Coolidge, to determine the relative value of the naval armament program, to the effectiveness of anti-aircraft defense, were recalled by General Mitchell in his attack on the administration's air policy before the house air craft committee today.

NEED OF FARM RELIEF URGED BY PRESIDENT

Enactment of Legislation to Benefit Agriculture Should Pass at This Session, Coolidge Announces.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20 (AP)—President Coolidge would regard it as most unfortunate should congress fail to enact farm legislation before adjournment.

All conditions for such legislation are favorable by the president's opinion, congress having been urged by recommendation on which there was a greater unanimity of agreement than upon any previous proposals and with suggestions worked out without thought of party politics.

Prussian Cabinet Leader Defeated, and Then Quits Office

Administration Headed by Dr. Wilhelm Marx Unable to Withstand Opposition.

BERLIN, Feb. 20 (AP)—The new Prussian cabinet head, Dr. Wilhelm Marx, resigned today in the diet today and resigned.

The cabinet was unable to withstand the opposition of the ultra-right and communists and in a vote of confidence was defeated, 221 to 218.

Should it be found impossible to obtain a successor for Dr. Marx, who is able to constitute an effective government, there will be an alternative to a dissolution of the diet and new elections.

MOORE TO GIVE MARGARINE BILL CLOSE SCRUTINY

Governor of Idaho Informs Georgia Executive He Will Give Butter Substitute Measure Careful Attention.

ATLANTA, Ga., Feb. 20 (AP)—Most careful consideration will be given any measure introduced in the Georgia legislature which would tend to discriminate against local food products of Georgia and the youth, Governor C. C. Moore of that state, informed the Georgia chief executive by telegram today. The message was in reply to a telegram from Governor Walker, who had dispatched a chief executive of ten western states where it is understood Moore "seriously objects" the sale of margarine.

The reply from the Idaho chief executive is the first received by Governor Walker from the governor of another state.

After the inquest had been adjourned, Dr. Postberg, who is the child's attorney, said that his client had never heard of the doctor.

Dr. Postberg said that Shepherd visited him twice last summer explaining that he was suffering from a mysterious illness and he intended to have the body examined.

British Ambassador Outlines Plans for World Peace Steps

Firm and Sympathetic Understanding Between America and Great Britain Necessary, He Thinks.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Feb. 20 (AP)—A firm and sympathetic understanding between America and Great Britain and her dominions, by which settlement by force of any dispute between them would be "incompatible" would be the "greatest" step toward the establishment of peace that has yet been made, Sir Eric Howard, the British ambassador here, said today in a speech before the local branch of the English Speaking Union.

He urged the union to strive for "two objectives, both of which are prominently concerned in the present world and which are first and foremost incompatible. It is to establish a feeling of security on the continent of Europe and especially in France, which will pave the way for a general reduction of armaments."
