

WOOD'S CHECK ON CASINO IS HELD NO GOOD

Director of French Gambling Establishment Alleges Former Army Officer Gave Him Bad Paper.

DIARRIZ, France, Feb. 24 (AP)—After having awaited a full week in order to give Calabro, U. S. 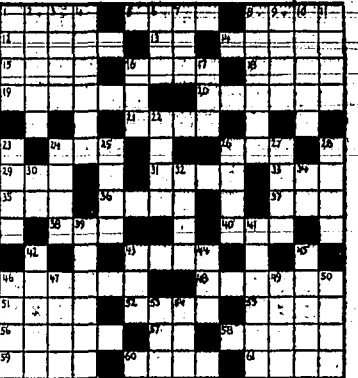
