DRY AGENT HAS RIGHT TO STOP AND SEARCH CAR

United States Supreme Court Hands Down Ruling in Michigan Case Giving Prohibition Officials More Power.

WASHINGTON, March 3 (AP)—Federal prohibition agents may lawfully stop automobiles and other vehicles and search them for contraband, but not without a warrant, the supreme court decided yesterday in a case from Michigan, brought by George Carroll and others.

In another liquor case decided, brought from Georgia by Sig Samuels, the court held that state laws under the constitution make unlawful the possession of liquor acquired legally before enactment of the federal prohibition.

Taft Delivers Opinion
Chief Justice Taft delivered the opinion in both cases. Justice McReynolds and Sutherland dissented in the case of the state liquor in the latter.

Deciding that "it would be intolerable and unreasonable if a prohibition agent was authorized to stop every automobile on the chance of finding liquor and then to subject all persons lawfully using the highway to the inconvenience and indignity of such a search," Chief Justice Taft asserted that "the state itself within the country entitled to use the public highways have a right to free passage without interruption or search unless there is known to a competent official authorized to search, probable cause for believing that their vehicles are carrying contraband or illegal merchandise."

The manufacture of liquor was little to defeat the prohibition amendment unless the liquor can be distributed for illegal sale and use, the court held, and for that reason it was necessary that the prevention of the contraband be prosecuted in the traffic.

It was held that it is now shown that contraband had passed in his rural liquor widely distributed before the passage of the prohibition law, and before the state of Georgia made possession of intoxicating liquor unlawful. Chief Justice Taft, in a majority opinion asserted that state could make unlawful the possession of such liquor despite that it was permitted by federal amendment and the Volstead act.

AGED PHYSICIAN IS READY TO DIE
Denver Doctor Who Killed His Daughter to End Suffering Wants to Follow Her.

DENVER, Colo., March 3 (AP)—Harold Elmer Blazer, talking to a newspaper reporter, the first time since the death of the physician's daughter last Tuesday, declared he hoped he would not recover from the effects of taking poison and slaying his throat.

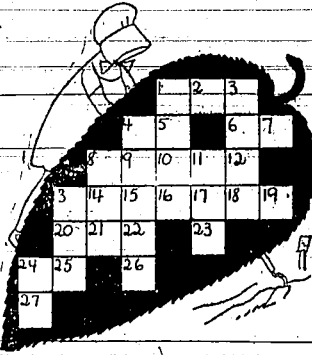
According to the physician's mother, she concluded the life of her helplessly crippled 32-year-old daughter and then attempted to take her life on the journey into eternity. He said in an answer to a question concerning rumors that he is afflicted with an incurable disease: "I fear something of that sort. I fear and did fear."

Blazer said that he feared that because of a love that meant more than life, he had taken the life of a girl who was as dear to him as a child. "I am as dead as the girl I killed," he said.

NAVAL OFFICER IS DENIED WRIT

Lieutenant Held in Insane Asylum Must Appeal to Federal Court, State Jurist Holds.

NAPA, Cal., March 3 (AP)—After a hearing in the supreme court yesterday afternoon, Lieutenant Frank E. Kennedy of the United States navy, was denied a writ of habeas corpus and returned to the state hospital for the insane here, to which he had been committed by naval authorities.

Lieutenant E. R. King, dissolved the writ on the ground that the state court lacked jurisdiction in such a case. Lieutenant Kennedy had been sent to the asylum for observation after several naval officers had threatened him with court martial for alleged insubordinate and improper conduct during a tour of duty in the Orient.

The court held that the government properly was an intervenor in the case and that it had established a claim against the government's agreement without regard to state law, invalidated by the court's application to the federal court.

The action could be taken so far as the state courts are concerned, under present conditions.

NEGRO LYNCHED AFTER ASSAULT

Colored Man Burned at Stake in Georgia When White Girl Identifies Him.

ROCKYFORD, Ga., March 3 (AP)—An unidentified negro, who confessed to attacking a 14-year-old white girl near here this morning, was lynched late Monday afternoon and a half mile from Rockyford. He was captured after a chase lasting nearly the entire day and was wounded in the back with a rifle shot.

The negro was burned at the stake. He was brought back to the scene of his crime and identified by the victim. He was then carried into a field where brush and wood were piled about his manacled form and after gasoline had been applied to his clothing, the wood was set on fire.

There was little disorder. There was no attempt at concealment of the facts. The negro is known in this country from the vicinity of Perkins, Ga., but did not tell his name.

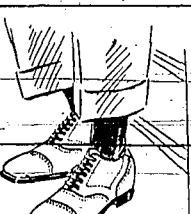

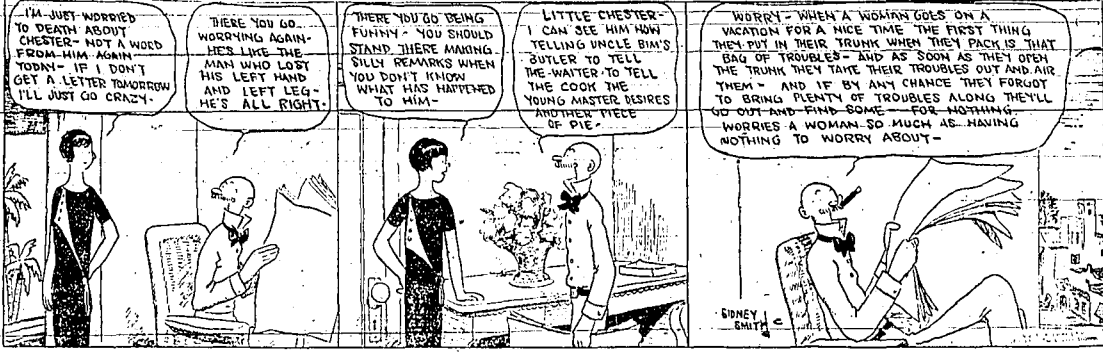
