SCHOOL SUPPLY BILL APPROVED BY THE HOUSE

Appropriations Totalling \$1,927,269.51 for State Educational Institutions Passed by Representatives.

APPROPRIATION OF \$1,927,269.51, the supply bill for all state educational institutions was introduced and passed in the lower branch of the eighteenth Idaho legislature Wednesday, in addition to the amount of the appropriations already have received through house bill No. 1, passed earlier in the session, to pay for the bills during the legislature and before the new appropriations become available, the sum of \$178,000, totaling \$2,105,269.51 provided by the legislature for the two years \$2,105,269.51.

Senate Kills House Bills in Session Wednesday; Protection of Livestock Provision Defeated. HOUSE, March 4 (AP)—Seven house bills received by the legislature from the upper house of the state legislature Wednesday. Six of the acts were killed on voice and one by indefinite postponement.

Three bills giving funds to state departments also were passed by the upper house under suspension of the rules. One of these was for \$100,000 for maintenance of the adjutant general's office and the national guard; another for \$100,000 for the state police; and a third for the administration of the state department of public welfare \$3000.

Calcium Caseate Oil Emulsion

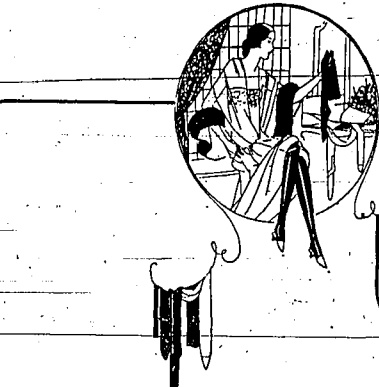
Calcium caseate, sources... In preparing this emulsion dissolve the calcium caseate in the water. This can easily be done by placing the caseate in a can with a tight top and shaking with sufficient water to dissolve it. Another method is to place the caseate in a large bucket and dissolve it with a stream of water forced through a spray gun or nozzle. After the caseate is dissolved and the oil and water poured together the mixture should be stirred together and then pumped four times under pressure through a spray gun or nozzle to produce a satisfactory emulsion.
