

Presence of Mind Saves Jerome Man

Gas Lamp Explodes Throwing Contents on Joe Springer; Wife Smothers Flames With Coat; House Burns

TWIN FALLS, March 7.—(Special to The News)—Only the presence of mind of Mrs. Joe Springer, of this city, saved her husband from serious injury or death as the result of a gasoline lamp explosion which set fire to the five-room home into which they had moved yesterday, totally destroying it and doing damage to house and contents placed to \$350.

Saturday morning at 10:15 o'clock Mr. Springer got up and started to light a gasoline lamp. The lamp exploded, throwing its flaming contents over Mr. Springer and the room. Mrs. Springer grabbed a coat and threw it around her husband, preventing the flames from reaching serious burns. With the exception of burns on the hand that held the lamp he was unharmed.

The quickly spread through the house and before the fire department could get it off had destroyed the house and contents with the exception of two trunks. The house was owned by Mrs. William Moore and was insured. The contents were uninsured.

In the semifinals this afternoon, Boise was eliminated by the Canyon unity team team, the final score being 25 to 20.

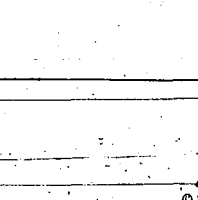

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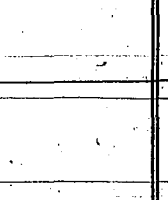

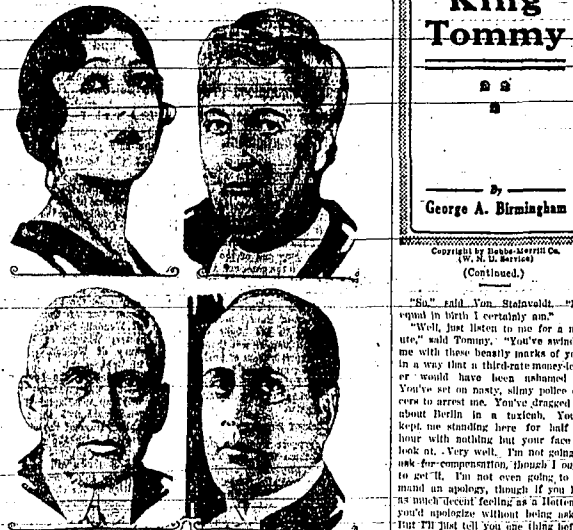

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KIMBERLY ROAD CONTRACTS LET

Highway District to Grade and Gravel Highway West and Resurface Road South.

Contract for grading and gravel surfacing a three-quarters of a mile highway extending west from the southwest corner of Kimberly was awarded by Twin Falls highway district commissioners at a meeting here Saturday afternoon to R. C. Galico of Hansen, whose bid in the total sum of \$1025 was the lowest among 10 bids submitted.

Under terms of the contract the district is to furnish thirty gravel on board cars at Kimberly and the contractor is to haul and spread it on the road.

The contractor indicated Saturday that he would grade and gravel a stretch of about 1400 feet extending from the end of the pavement in Kimberly in the point where the highway district's work is to begin at the same terms to the village of Kimberly as to the highway district. These terms set forth in his bid give the contractor 23 cents per yard for grading and 50 cents per yard for hauling and spreading gravel.

Highway District commissioners Saturday also awarded to Charles Lottman of Twin Falls, a contract for resurfacing of three miles of road extending south from Kimberly in which work 600 yards of rock creek gravel to be furnished by the contractor, is to be used. The total cost under Mr. Lottman's bid would be \$1980. Six contractors participated in the bidding on this work.

The scene of the Indian handiwork is now a part of the city of Mankato, Minn., and is known as Minnie Park, named in honor of General Sibley.

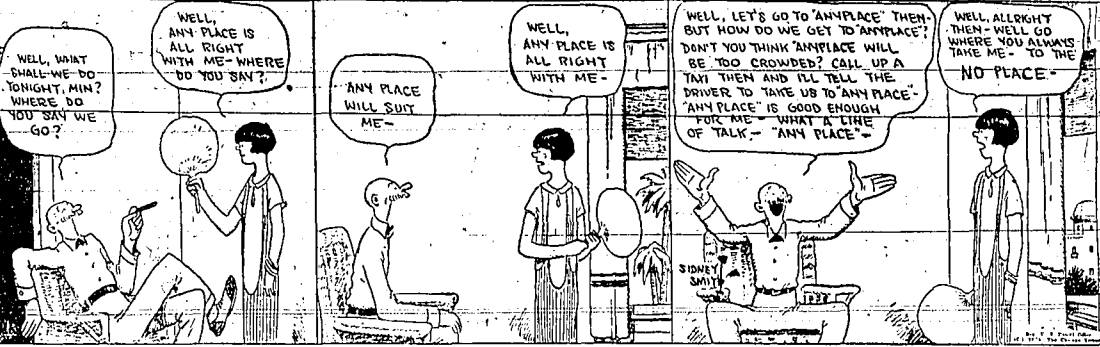
