INSURGENTS IN SENATE OUSTED BY REPUBLICANS

Formal Approval Given to Plan for Punishing Followers of LaFollette; Stanfield of Oregon Takes Place of Ladd.

WASHINGTON, March 9 (AP)—Formal approval of the denunciation of the LaFollette insurgents from their rank on the standing committee was given today by the senate.

SENATE CONTEST SUITS ARE FILED

Controversies Involving Seats of Three Senators Referred to Elections Committee.

WASHINGTON, March 9 (AP)—Controversies involving the seats of three senators were referred today to the elections committee.

Majority Candidate, Senator Winfield of Oregon, has defeated the insurgent candidate, Howard Johnson.

There are three separate contests in the committee to get the seats of the senators.

For Ladd: Republicans—Brookhart, Conroy, Ford, Howell, Johnson, McHenry, Moore, Norbeck and Norris.

For Stanfield: Democrats—Brace, Maryland, and Will.

Boy Confesses to Murder in Effort To Shield Mother

Los Angeles Authorities Blame Little Grandson of Story of 14-Year-Old Sonny Willis Who Says He Shot Doctor.

LOS ANGELES, March 9 (AP)—Fortunate little grandchild of the boy who shot Dr. Willis has been trying to make folks believe he committed the murder for his mother.

Dr. Willis, who had been sentenced to life imprisonment, was today sentenced to death by a jury.

The hearing was set for March 20, next and he was released on his own recognizance until that time.

Mrs. Willis was convicted last year of having murdered Dr. Benjamin Willis.

She admitted the killing, but evidence introduced during the hearing was that the doctor was shot by the boy.

Dr. Willis was shot on the day of his execution.

Dr. Willis, after testifying, said he was taken to San Quentin to begin serving his sentence.

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Boy Hears Parents Plan His Funeral; Given Up For Dead

Nine-Year-Old Youth Now Recovering Lies Helpless as Relatives Grieve.

MADISONVILLE, Ky., March 9 (AP)—Nine-year-old boy, lying helpless in his bed, unable to move, heard his parents give him up for dead and plan the funeral arrangements.

The boy's father, who is recovering from a stroke, found the child lying motionless on the floor.

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WOULD ANNUL EASES UPON TEAPOT DOME

Government Seeks in Federal Court to Set Aside Commitment to Mammoth Oil Company; Suit Opens Monday.

CHEYENNE, Wyo., March 9 (AP)—Teapot Dome, which became a household phrase during the senate oil committee investigation early in 1924, again today was flashed on the screen of public interest.

In the second appearance, however, it was argued of much of the glamour and sensationalism which characterized the senate investigation of the late President Harding.

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PRE-WAR LIQUOR AT CHEYENNE RUNS INTO PROHIBITION AGENTS

Shipment from New York to Wyoming Hotel Confiscated by Federal Agents After Illegally Refuses to Accept It.

CHEYENNE, Wyo., March 9 (AP)—Among the arrivals here today at the opening of the Teapot Dome trial was a shipment of pre-war liquor that ran afoul of federal prohibition agents.

The shipment was "unloaded" from a westbound train last Friday night and was under the surveillance of John C. Davis, federal prohibition director for Wyoming, until today when it was delivered at a leading hotel.

The hotel clerk refused the shipment and Davis took charge of it. The cases, which contained 12 bottles of vermuth and 12 of rum, were killed from New York City.

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SPEAKER GILLIS SERIOUSLY SICK AT BOISE HOTEL

Illness of Filer Man Slows Up Work of Cleaning Up Legislative Business at Capital; Has Influenza, Report.

BOISE, March 9 (AP)—Cleaning up the business of the legislature was somewhat impeded Monday when Speaker W. D. Gillis of the house of representatives was confined to his hotel because of illness and Philip D. Danney, assistant chief clerk, was called to his home in Illinois because of the serious illness of one of his children.

Speaker Gillis was reported seriously ill Monday afternoon. His case is diagnosed as influenza.

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Beauty Doctor Held For Woman's Death From Face Peeling

Manslaughter-Complaint Filed Against Operator Who Attempted Skin Operation.

LOS ANGELES, March 9 (AP)—A beauty operator, who was arrested last night on a manslaughter charge, was held today on a man's complaint filed by the district attorney in connection with the death of Mrs. Jessie Gilchrist, a woman who died during a skin operation in Los Angeles last week. She was 30 years old.

Shortly before the issuance of the complaint, a coroner's jury found that Mrs. Gilchrist was killed by "phlegm poisoning" administered in a skin-peeling operation.

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REVENUE PROBE LEADS TO WAR BETWEEN HEADS

Chairman Couzens of Investigating Committee Accuses Treasury of Trying to Discipline Him for Disclosures.

WASHINGTON, March 9 (AP)—The chief internal revenue inspector in the senate internal revenue bureau investigation led today by chairman, Henry D. Couzens, has accused the treasury of trying to discipline him for disclosures.

Chairman Couzens of the investigating committee, declared in the senate that he had "permitted in endeavoring to eliminate rottenness in government."

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Committee Finds Nothing Wrong With Loans to Gooding

Money Borrowed From War Finance Corporation by Idaho Senator Went Through Regular Channels.

WASHINGTON, March 9 (AP)—Loans obtained by Senator Gooding, Republican, Idaho, and related interests from the war finance corporation in no wise curtailed the privilege, ability or opportunity of other interests in that state to get aid from the corporation, says a report filed today with the senate by a special committee which investigated these transactions.

The senate investigation was made at the request of Senator (Dingell) Ford, Michigan, who had introduced legislation to prohibit the corporation from making loans to senators.

The committee report stated that the loans were made through regular channels and that the money was used for legitimate purposes.

CHICAGO, March 9 (AP)—Jack Dempsey chooses to beat Tommy Gibbons, instead of Harry Wills, heavyweight challenger, in the first bout of his summer campaign, Gibbons stands ready to face Wills in the heavyweight champion, Eddie Kline, Gibbons' manager, said tonight at his return from New York.

Kline expects to meet Jack Kearns, Dempsey's manager, here on Saturday to discuss the possibility of a match between Gibbons and Dempsey in California this summer.

The New York state athletic commission is attempting to induce Dempsey to meet Wills before taking on any other opponents within its jurisdiction.

Sacrifices 10 Hogs On Pyre to Chase Away Bad Spirits

Reported Priestess of Cult Held in Jail Following Weird Midnight Ceremony.

RITTSBERG, Ont., March 9 (AP)—Anna Riensdorf, reputed priestess of a cult in Toronto known as the "Faith of the Holy Light," was in custody today charged with having presided over a weirdly timed midnight ceremony at Bluevale, Ont., in which ten hogs were sacrificed on a pyre after to devilish spirits.

The woman, a professional nurse came from Toronto to the Underwood farm several weeks ago to attend Mrs. Underwood during an illness. Underwood's story as related by Whiteside, is that last Thursday the priestess ordered Underwood to hold a great pyre of logs in a field. He did so. Then she ordered that 10 of the farmer's choicest hogs be trussed upon the pyre. That also was done. At midnight, the priestess ignited the pyre and the flames of pine logs mounted skyward made queer gestures and uttered strange incantations in "divine" language.

OFFICERS OF 3 STATES SEARCH FOR FINANCIER

Mysterious Disappearance of Army Cantonment Builder at Council Bluffs Alarms His Friends; Wife Recently Died.

COUNCIL BLUFFS, Iowa, March 9 (AP)—E. A. Wickham, financier, and army cantonment builder during the world war, tonight is the object of a search by officers of three states—Iowa, Nebraska and Illinois, following his disappearance from his home here today.

Wickham recently returned home from a hospital where he had been confined as a result of injuries received in an automobile accident on Christmas eve, when his wife was fatally injured, and this afternoon went for a walk with a life-long friend, George Sullivan, the two men leaving the patient Wickham home about 3 o'clock and returning a short time later.

Nothing more was seen of the wealthy contractor and his disappearance was not discovered until he failed to answer a call for dinner at 6 p. m. Police were notified and searching parties were formed, but no trace of the man could be found. Telegrams containing descriptions of the millionaire contractor, were sent, police officials throughout Iowa, Illinois and Nebraska and radio stations WQAW also broadcast an appeal for aid in locating him.

OMAHA, March 9 (AP)—Late tonight Patrolman Floyd Harty reported that he had seen E. A. Wickham, wealthy contractor, reported missing from his home in Council Bluffs, Iowa, about 10 o'clock this evening, but at the time did not know where he was being taken to his whereabouts.

Hailey Citizen Is Selected Assistant Attorney General

John W. Oramor to Take Place of Herbert Wing Who Died Two Weeks Ago.

BOISE, March 9 (AP)—Appointment of John W. Oramor of Hailey as assistant attorney general to succeed Herbert Wing was announced Monday by A. H. Conner, attorney general. Mr. Wing died two weeks ago.

Mr. Oramor, a graduate of the University of Idaho, was a law clerk in the supreme court under Judge Dunn.

He served as a corporal under Mr. Conner in the world war and was awarded the distinguished service cross and the French and Belgian croix de guerre.

GOVERNMENT SUES TO COLLECT INCOME TAX FROM OIL MAGNATE

E. L. Doherty, His Son, Wife and Directors of Petroleum Companies Defendants in Suit to Recover \$900,551.

LOS ANGELES, March 9 (AP)—The United States government today filed suit in the federal court here for \$900,551, alleged income taxes due for 1919 from E. L. Doherty, oil magnate, his son, his wife and of the directors in his companies, and two of his partners, the Doherty Pacific Petroleum company, and the Petroleum Scientific company.

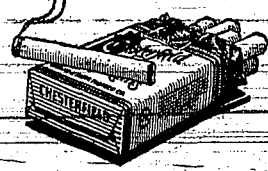
Those named with Doherty, besides his son, E. L. Doherty, Jr., and Mrs. Mary Doherty, are J. D. Anderson and Olin Wallhouse.

The government alleges that the sum is due on taxes for 1919, the defendants report for that year showing a net taxable income of \$1,624, whereas, it is said, it should have been \$2,101,345.

The suit also calls attention to the transfer of 55,000 shares of capital stock of the defendants from the Doherty Pacific Petroleum company to the "Pan-American" Petroleum and Transport company, another Doherty concern, which, together with cash and other property, amounted to \$1,425,052.

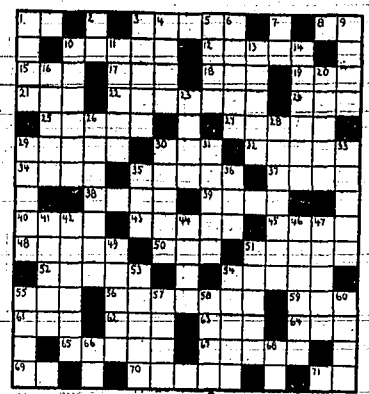

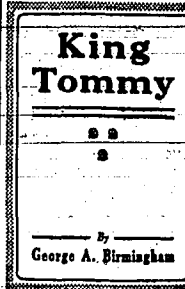

Germany it takes a long time to cash a check and it was half an hour before Cashier actually got the money. Then he drove to the police office and walked into the room into which Tommy had gone that morning. There was still a long queue of Poles, Russians, Slovaks, Ukrainians and other foreigners waiting to approach the police officer's desk. But Cashier did not take his place at the end of the line. 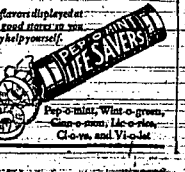
