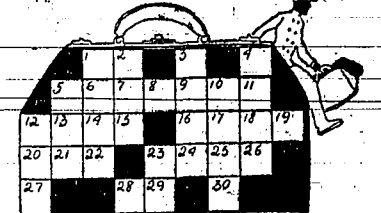

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POWER PROJECT SURGED UPON CANAL COMPANY

Delegation Members Urge Acquisition of Clear Lakes Site or Financial Support to Mutual Corporation.

Twin Falls Canal company directors at a regular meeting Tuesday, were developed by members of a delegation of about 12 citizens who were organized to acquire the Clear Lakes power site or to lend the financial support of the canal company in an effort to acquire and develop the site through the agency of a mutual stock company. No decision was reached.

Legal Barrier Raised

Members of the delegation were told by the directors that Judge J. H. Binkwell, attorney for the canal company, in an opinion given last Friday, had advised that the canal company could not legally undertake to develop and distribute power without first changing the company's articles of incorporation. Such change, if voted at a regular annual meeting, would require a two-thirds of the stock vote.

The delegation before the canal board Tuesday, was headed by E. J. Breeley as spokesman for a meeting of between 20 and 40 citizens held here recently together with William Hazzard, owner of Clear Lakes site, and George Herriott, its attorney, who stated that they were in attendance in response to invitation of these spokesmen to present their opposition to the proposed power project and to give other information in relation to it that might be helpful. Other members of the delegation included A. C. Brown and T. R. Nicholson of Twin Falls, and T. R. Nicholson of Filer.

Specs Ready Outlook

Expenditure of approximately \$35,000 for development of the power site would be required this year in order to build a dam. It was stated by the canal directors to lend temporary financial support to the enterprise. Mr. Brown stated that he considered the project one that might be developed by a mutual stock company. Referring to a former attempt to develop Clear Lakes site through the agency of a mutual stock company, Mr. Brown said they agreed with it. "We lacked a market and cost of extending transmission lines to farm area would have been prohibitive."

Enger Immediate Action

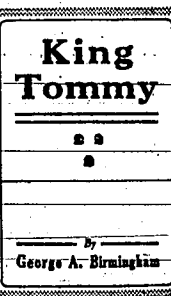

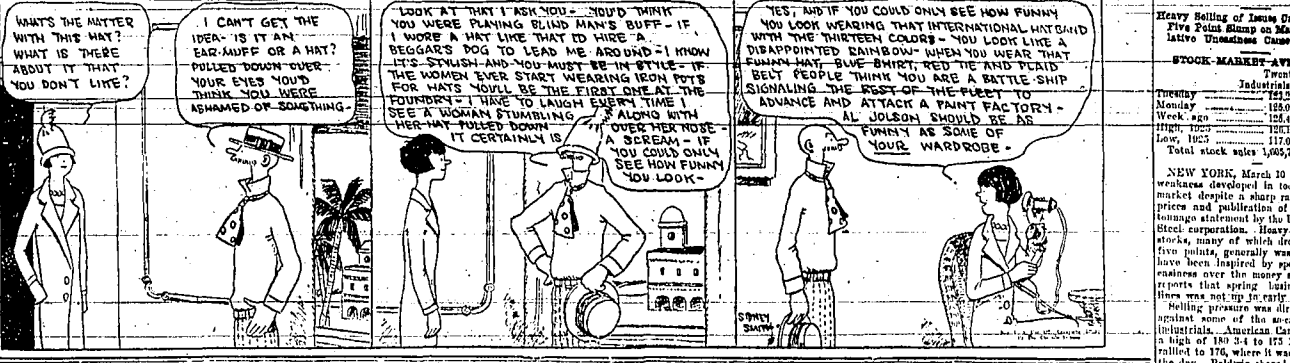

F. F. Johnson Holdings in First National Are Purchased by Twin Falls Men; New Board Is Elected.

At a meeting held at the First National bank of Twin Falls Tuesday afternoon a sufficient number of members of the board of directors of F. F. Johnson and family in the stock of the institution were present to elect a new board of directors. Following the transfer of the stock to the new owners the adjourned annual meeting of stockholders was held and the following board of directors was elected: J. E. Rathbun, J. W. Cluett, C. L. Maxwell, E. A. Walters, Charles H. Hildner, A. H. Brice, and A. L. Swin. At the meeting of directors held later in the day the following officers were elected: J. E. Rathbun, president; E. A. Walters and A. L. Swin, vice presidents; J. M. Maxwell, secretary; and W. E. Grant and W. E. Nison, assistant cashiers. A. Durman Johnson, who for many years past has held the position of assistant cashier, will remain in connection with the bank April 1.

The new stockholders among whom the Johnson stock was retained, according to J. E. Rathbun, president, are: J. E. Rathbun, Charles H. Hildner, J. A. Brice, Mrs. I. H. Burkhoffer, H. A. Brice, Mrs. I. H. Burkhoffer, N. L. Smith, Dr. Oliver Hildner, A. L. Swin, C. L. Maxwell, Dr. D. K. Lester, W. E. Nison, J. M. Maxwell, E. P. Bricker, W. R. Biddle, A. L. Swin, and A. R. Reed. Negotiations for stock, it is understood, have been under way for some time, but final details were not worked out until the early part of this week. The bank in the above mentioned transaction is the county having left the bank organized here in 1905 by F. F. Johnson and associates and having been under the management of F. F. Johnson ever since its inception. In referring to the change in ownership last night Mr. Maxwell stated in referring to the change in ownership last night that the new ownership is in the hands of men who are of the opinion that public generally in banking institutions is of the encouraging nature of the entire local situation. In 1922, which was the low point in the banking business in these parts, deposits have been decreasing steadily and loans have been decreasing. In other words liquidation has been going on all the time, until today the banks of Twin Falls as a whole are in the strongest financial position they have occupied at any time during the past three years. "All the officers and directors of the First National bank are now local men with a sound knowledge of local conditions along business and financial bank. While we naturally regret the severance of the ties of years in the matter of the Johnson connection, we believe the local ownership to be a factor of real advantage to the bank as a Twin Falls institution."

Announcement Retention. F. F. Johnson, president of the bank from its inception to the present time, yesterday authorized the following statement: "I desire to state that the Johnson family have sold control of the First National bank of Twin Falls to local residents of Twin Falls, all of high commercial standing. I must admit that I regret in some ways to part with my interest in the bank, having organized it as the first banking institution in Twin Falls county before water was in the tract, as the bank commenced business in the spring of 1905 and has enjoyed a steady and wonderful growth. I have, however, that it is always better for a bank to be owned and controlled by local citizens who are familiar with local conditions and the needs of the community. In the last few years my interests have required close attention elsewhere, but it is always better for me to concentrate my activities, and to sell this investment to local people.
