TWENTY EIGHT BILLS REMAIN TO BE SIGNED

Governor Has Until Tuesday at Midnight to Act on Provisions Passed by Eighteenth Session of State Legislature.

BOISE, March 16 (AP)—Governor C. C. Moore has until midnight Tuesday to approve or veto twenty-eight bills of the 1925 passed by the 1825 legislature. Eight bills have already been signed Monday, all making appropriations, including the measure for paying salaries and wages and other expenses of the several state institutions. According to the governor's office all remaining bills will be cleared up Tuesday.

The bills signed Monday, exclusive of the state institutions, carry appropriations of \$400,000. Appropriations for the institutions total \$1,057,000.21 as reported as follows:

- University of Idaho, administrative, \$850,120.
- University of Idaho, pure and applied administration, \$200.
- University of Idaho, student control, \$10,000.
- Albion state normal, \$117,164.
- Lewiston state normal, \$201,000.82.
- Idaho industrial institute, \$417,970.
- Idaho industrial training school, \$201,302.
- State school for the deaf and blind, \$17,510.00.

NEW CORPORATION TO PUT UP STOCK FOR PURCHASE BY PUBLIC

NEW YORK, March 16 (AP)—Plans for financing the Electric Power and Light corporation, recently formed to take over the Utah Power and Light company, the Idaho Power company, New Orleans Public Service, Inc., Utah Power and Light company, and the Hawaiian Public Service, Inc., were announced today. They include a public offering of 400,000 shares of cumulative preferred stock at \$100 a share and the transfer of 100,000 shares of second preferred stock to the Electric Bond and Share company for a cash payment of \$11,250,000. The latter plan will require \$10,000,000 of common stock to be held by purchasers at \$25 each. The total number of common shares will be 3,541,000.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., March 16 (AP)—William T. Sachs of St. Louis, an admitted purveyor of fraudulent educational credentials, late today in the hearing before the state board of health on the revocation of the medical license of Dr. W. H. Briggs, president of the St. Louis College of Physicians and Surgeons, declared that he had furnished some 25 fraudulent sets of credentials to students at Dr. Briggs' school. He began in 1915, he added, but had not met Dr. Briggs until 1918.

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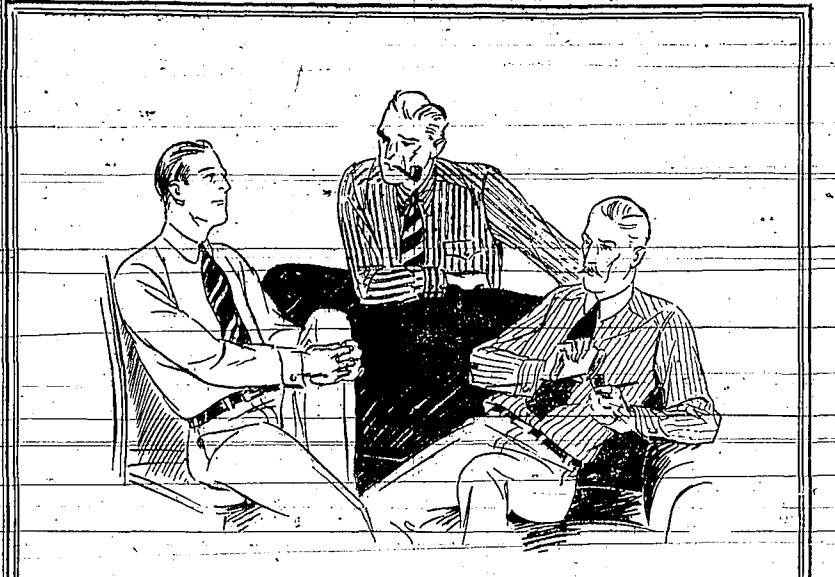

TROUT CONGRGATE AT CEDAR CREEK HATCHERY

Scene of Operations Closed to Fishermen and to Visitors Except Those Vouchered for, Deputy Advises.

Between 200 and 300 rainbow trout may be seen in a trap that has been installed by the state fish and game department in connection with hatchling brought on Cedar creek for propagation of trout to be distributed over the state this season through state hatcheries, according to John Sullivan, chief deputy state game warden, who returned Sunday evening from a visit to the Cedar creek region.

During the spawning season, Mr. Sullivan advised, Cedar creek is to remain closed to fishermen throughout the season from the spawning run to the close of the season. The creek is to be closed to all fishing except what is desired in that region except when accompanied or vouchered for by one of the hatcheries that have been stationed on the ground.

High in Watch-Making

Two barrels of flour, or almost 400 pounds, are used every week in making watches at a watchmaking factory in New England, which turns out from 2,000 to 3,000 watches a week. Since a huber uses about three pounds of flour to lay leaves of bread, it follows that for every watch the maker uses the equivalent of almost a third of a loaf.

The flour is made into dough, and the dough is used to handle the screws, rivets and other small parts. Each man in that part of the business has a lump of dough at hand; and when he wants to examine a screw he holds the lump until the man, together with the screw forward, was high point man with eight centers.

ROAD'S AFFAIRS GROWING WORSE

Financial Crisis Believed to be Rapidly Approaching; Stock Takes Drop.

NEW YORK, March 16 (AP)—Indications that St. Paul railway's financial difficulties were reaching a critical stage and the announcement that tentative plans for the formation of bondholders' protective committee were under way, depressed the road's stock and bond issues to new low levels today and contributed to the general weakness of the stock market.

Preliminary steps toward the organization of an independent bondholders' committee were taken when insurance companies and other large owners of the road securities requested F. J. Johnson, railroad expert and head of the investment firm of F. J. Johnson and Co., to lead such a group. Mr. Johnson reserved definitive pooling further developments.

Although the difficulties between bondholders and officials of the road brought no indications of an agreement on a refunding program.

Engineers' Report Delayed.

The report of Coverdale and Coffey, engineers, who have been making a survey of the road's position, it was said, might be delayed for three weeks.

Ultimate responsibility for the road was predicted by Mr. Johnson in making his report. He said that the situation at the St. Paul's problems. Even if the difficulties presented by the approaching maturity of \$80,000,000 bonds were overcome, he asserted, the company would be unable to raise the money to provide new working capital.

Extracted Teeth With Fingers.

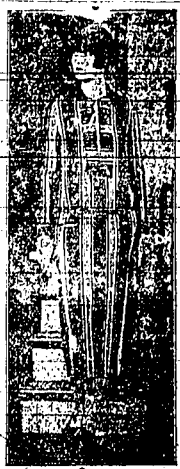

WELL DRILLER FILES SUIT

Joe Smith Claims \$1037 Due on Account of Operations on Norton Ranch at Rock Opak.

Zepplins' First Drift-Right.

Zepplins' first drift-right was 440 feet long. This huge airship was not merely a bag filled with gas. It was constructed with a rigid framework of aluminum alloy, within which were 17 separate chambers, having partitions of silet aluminum between. In each chamber was a gas bag. These had a total capacity of 460,000 cubic feet of gas, giving a lifting power of 22,000 pounds. The entire framework of the ship was enclosed in a covering made of cotton and rubber, which was really merely a jacket to protect it from the weather.

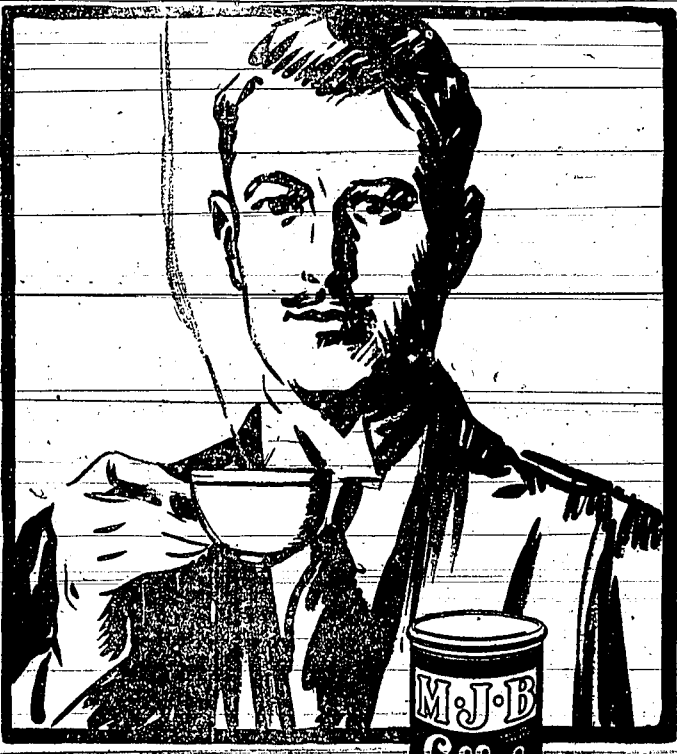

DIBBLE ARGUES FOR VENTURE IN MAKING POWER

Former Minidoka Project Director Tells City Council Municipally Owned Plant Would Be Desirable.

Members of Twin Falls council, at their regular weekly meeting held Monday night, were given further information on the municipal power project by Mayor Dibble, former project manager of Hurley, and now private consulting engineer, with headquarters at Redlands, California. Mr. Dibble during the course of the meeting, to members of the city council, declared that, speaking as an individual, he believed a municipally owned power plant would be a desirable thing.

He told of the operation of the reclamation power plant at Minidoka, which, in addition to developing power for its own purposes, also sells power to Hurley and four on a substation on the main line. He said that power at Minidoka is cheaper than could be obtained through an outside power company. The government, he said, figures on making five per cent on the investment in the plant.

Cost of Lines.

Replying to questions of the cost of the lines, the government, he said, is building the line from Hurley to Twin Falls for about \$200,000 and \$200,000 a mile to the town of the same name. He said that at the present time the cost of developing \$10,000 horse power, he said, is \$1200. Idaho Power estimates on a service line built by the government was about \$200, he said.

Twin Falls, in his opinion, is favorably situated as far as power sites are concerned, and within a short time so that cost from service lines would not be unreasonable. He explained the manner of obtaining power site filings both from the state and from the government.

The Augie Falls and Rock creek sites were well adapted for generating power for Twin Falls, he said, and by combining these sites would develop 10,000 horse power. These sites, he believed, could be developed at a reasonable figure.

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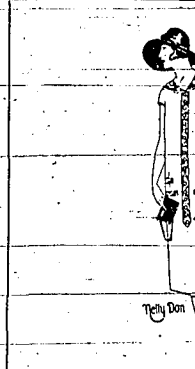
