PALM BEACH FIRE TAKES HEAVY TOLL

Two Lives Lost When Flames Consume Fashionable Hostelry; Property Damage May Reach \$5,000,000.

PALM BEACH, March 18 (AP)—Fire late today destroyed the famous Breakers hotel, wiped out the smaller Palm Beach hotel and for hours held a breath of destruction over the entire northern section of this celebrated winter playground.

Beginning shortly after 4 o'clock in the Breakers, the fire was fanned by a high sea breeze and was brought under control until shortly before 9 o'clock tonight.

It was announced that an elderly man and woman whose identity is still unknown were burned to death. It is believed by the investigating officers that either name will be incident to the death toll when the final accounting is made.

THOUSANDS KILLED AND HURT IN STORM

night number into the hundreds. No reports had been received at a late hour of damage through the region.

Among the other towns and cities to report damage and loss of life were Desoto, Ill., with 150 casualties reported; Pariah, Ill., with all three of a population of 500 reported either killed or injured; Princeton, Ind., with an estimated 100 casualties; Griffin, Ind., with 50; Gotham, Ill., with 27; Oram, Ill., with 150; and Crossville, Mo., with 100.

The wind apparently assumed its dangerous proportions in western Missouri shortly after 1 o'clock this afternoon. It wiped out most of Annapolis, Mo., and then tore its way across the Mississippi river into Illinois, apparently lifting its devastating force and spreading out like a river delta until the entire theater described some 25 miles east of the Mississippi.

Boiler in Wreckage - Darkness descended over the desolated area shortly after the wind had twisted its way to the northeast and the streets of the towns demolished were filled with wreckage. Persons were pinned beneath the wreckage while the bodies of the slain could be seen far down in the detritus. It was impossible to extricate them.

Orain Elevator Moved. In some places where the buildings were struck hardest, whole buildings were moved from their foundations, grain elevators at Desoto having been carried intact some 40 feet to the side of a road. Churches and schools reported to have suffered least outside of dwellings and had substantial frame buildings.

after the storm had passed, organized relief trains bearing doctors, nurses, and food were dispatched from Chicago and St. Louis as well as other points within a few hours from the disaster became known.

Buildings Like Eggs' Shells. Whirling and swirling with such irresistible energy that it crushed large buildings like egg shells and razed to the ground many of the towers in its path was meteoric like in its force.

Fire a Headicap. It took considerable time to send out word from the disaster zone, but in the meantime citizens who escaped the storm, bent to the terrible work before them only to be handicapped in comparison by an outbreak of fire in the debris.

Facilities Scarce. To almost all the devastated cities and towns facilities were scarce for taking care of the injured and many were taken to Carbonado, Calo and other places where all hospitals were closed in addition to armories and school buildings.

Financial relief funds, in addition to other measures initiated for the aid of the stricken areas were started almost as soon as word of the disaster reached various cities. Newspapers here, in St. Louis and other places started public subscriptions and in various cities adjacent to the storm territory, civil and fraternal organizations had done thus.

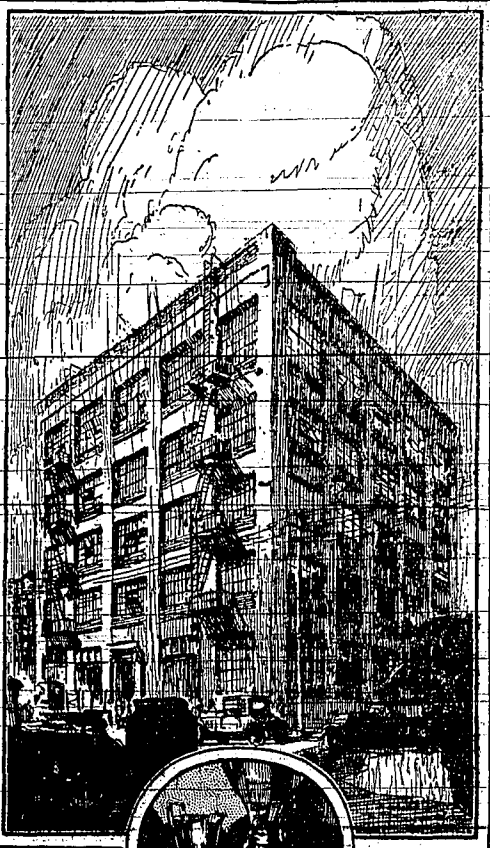

JENNINGS SEEK SEPARATE TRIAL

Defense Varies Widely From That of Co-Defendant on Larceny Charge.

In behalf of Raymond and Ernie Jennings, charged jointly with David Harkness with grand larceny in connection with alleged theft of an automobile, O. C. Hall, attorney, filed in district court here Wednesday a notice of motion for separate trial for the Jennings brothers. Hearing on the motion is to take place next Wednesday.

In support of this motion he states the defense is alleged to have made statements and admissions concerning the alleged crime that are prejudicial to the defense of Harkness and that the Jennings brothers' defense is inconsistent with the defense of Harkness that they cannot be tried jointly without injury to defendants Jennings.

Notice of the motion was delivered to Prosecuting Attorney A. W. Taylor. Mr. Hall motion withdrew his request Tuesday to be relieved from duty as counsel for Harkness to which he had been appointed by Judge W. A. Pollock after he had been retained previously as attorney for the Jennings brothers. E. V. Larson was thereafter appointed as attorney for Harkness. Trial in the case has been set for Monday next.

Defendants in this case are accused of theft of a Ford car, owned by M. J. Goodrich, which they are alleged to have taken to an abandoned dwelling on McKean creek, about six miles southeast of here, and there had disappeared it.
