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EXPANSION OF FARM ACREAGE IN CROPS SEEN

Department of Agriculture Issues Warning Against Too Great Production as Result of Survey.

WASHINGTON, March 19 (AP)—A survey toward general expansion of farm crop acreage this year was noted in many "intentions to plant" reports today by the department of agriculture, which issued with it a virtual warning that too great production would result in lower prices.

At the same time it will offer aid to other thousands of sufferers far away—victims of fire, flood, and flood at Tripoli, Peru, St. James, Louis, Texas, and other points in charge of domestic operations at St. Louis today took supreme command of Red Cross relief work in the tornado area, with Henry M. Baker, national director of disaster relief, in immediate charge of operations.

Boise Rancher Dies From Car Injuries; Found by Autoists

Herman Wilkie, 65, Ran Over and Left by Driver Who Fails to Stop; Thought Hit by Two Automobiles.

BOISE, March 19 (AP)—Herman Wilkie, 65, owner of a poultry ranch near Boise, tonight in Idaho, suffered what he was run down by an unidentified motorist on the highway near his home. Wilkie was found lying in the road, the motorist who ran him over being spotted by two autoists who assisted him. Wilkie was brought to a Boise hospital where he died.

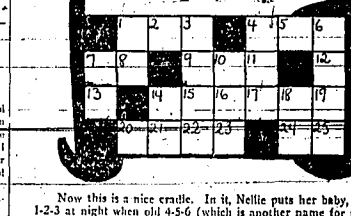

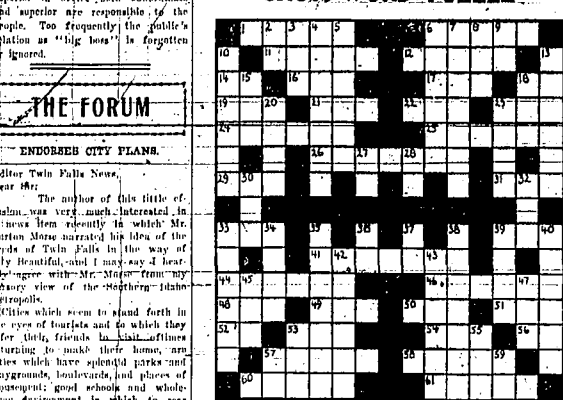

GRIMM GROWERS FORM SOCIETY

Salmon River Seed Producers
Launch Own District Organization at Meeting Here.

With view to development of the industry and capitalizing the advantage gained through successful production of Grimm alfalfa seed, the first season growers of the Salmon River project, at a meeting of Grimm alfalfa seed growers in the office of the county agricultural agent here, Thursday afternoon, organized the Salmon River Grimm Growers' association, with an initial membership of about 20 growers.

R. A. Carter of Bergey was elected president of the association, with Nelson Hayward of Alameda, secretary, and W. W. Powell of Bergey, treasurer. With few exceptions, only growers of the Salmon River project were present at the meeting Thursday to which all Grimm growers of the county had been invited for discussion of various phases of the industry and discussion of advisability of forming a county-wide association. BUHL BANK CLOSES DOORS

Well Known Institution Suspends Pay, most as Result of Voluntary Action of Officers and Directors.

The First National bank of Buhl voluntarily closed its doors yesterday morning and a federal bank examiner is now in charge of the institution.

The action taken by the directors comes as a result of deliberations extending over a long period. For some time past a large part of the bank's resources have been tied up in loans upon which it was impossible to obtain liquidation and as a result of this earnings have been curtailed. The condition is not general in the Buhl district, but is said to have applied for some time past in the case of the First National.

The action was taken in the belief that the best good of stockholders and depositors would be served by closing the institution.

Two other banks remain in Buhl, the Farmers' National and Security States. These concerns are in no wise affected by the closing of the First National and the conditions which brought about the closing are conspicuously absent in the case of each.

The bank obtained its original charter in 1906 as the State Bank of Buhl. Some two years later it became the Buhl Bank and Trust company, and about 1910 the institution was chartered as a national bank. It was for several years under the management of J. W. Paris, who removed to California in 1919.

The present officers and directors are C. S. Peck, president; J. H. Barker, cashier; C. L. Moss, assistant cashier; Mr. Peck, Mr. Barker, R. P. Symbaloff, C. M. Herick, A. M. Oakes, C. H. Taylor and C. D. Burdick are the directors.

Rank Denoted by Shirts

The women of Eronomica, in the New Hebrides, dress in an extraordinary fashion, their rank being indicated by the number of skirts worn. Sometimes as many as 40 to 60 are worn by a lady of high degree. The bulkiness that this collection of garments gives them, as they walk, along makes them look something like a cloud. The dresses are made of long strands of pandanus palm leaf, held together at the waist by a belt. The outer dress of a lady of distinction will show a well-defined design or pattern of blue color. This is laborious work done by the "dressmaker," who bites the strands of leaf when they are fresh and green. When dry the teeth-marks stand out a deep blue which never fades.

Flour-de-Lis on the Compass

The French flour-de-lis is used to designate north on the surface of most compasses, and it is said this marking has been the practice in Europe for more than six centuries. When Flavio Gioia, the Neapolitan mariner, invented the compass and made it a necessary part of every sailor's equipment, the king of Naples was the French Charles of Anjou. In his honor—and to pay a compliment to the king, Gioia placed the ornamental flour-de-lis at the northern point of the compass and it has continued to indicate that point on the best of compasses ever since.

Iron White at First

"It is a good thing for our sense of sight that iron rust is red, not white, like zinc and aluminum, metals much more in chemical properties. Otherwise leaves and flowers would all be white and men and women like walking corpses. Yet iron in its pure state is soft, ductile and white like silver. Few of us have ever seen it so, because as soon as it comes in contact with the air it shyly veils itself with this thin film of rust and becomes first black and then red. In the 4000 years since man discovered how to undo iron rust and get the metal out of it he has accomplished more than in the millions of years before. To save a pound of iron from corrosion today is as much a benefit to the world as to produce another pound from the ore—far a greater benefit since it takes four pounds of coal to produce one pound of steel, and so coal beds will be exhausted before the beds of iron ore."

Why Lobster Changes Color

The lobster in his native habitat is a greenish sort of fellow, of the same color as the rocks among which he dwells. And that's a very kind provision of nature, as it protects the lobster from his underwater foes, and leaves him to grow up into the proper size wherein he becomes an article of food for man's consumption. When he reaches the stage where he is hauled up by a lobster fisherman, he is sent to market, and finally reaches the kitchen, he is popped into a kettle of boiling water, and then turns a rich red. This change in color is due to the action of the heat on chemicals contained in the lobster's shell.

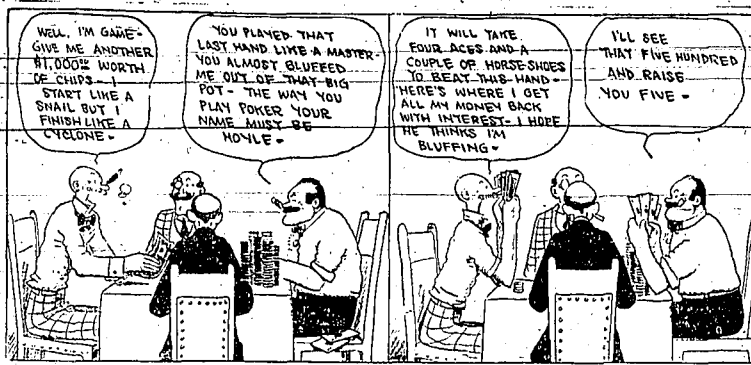
