

Mountain States Sound in Opinion of Statistician

Roger W. Babson Analyzes Business Conditions in Western Section of United States; 6 Per Cent Above Normal.

HAZELTON PARK, Pa., March 20.—Roger W. Babson today issued another edition of his "Business Outlook" under conditions in the eight mountain states and their relation to the oil industry. "Crude oil, gasoline and other petroleum products are subject of other parts of the supply and demand," says the statistician. "If we had a constant supply, prices go up or down as the demand increases or decreases. But the supply is not constant. It is increased by new wells, coming in and improved methods of refining and distribution. Owing to the increasing number of oil fields and the increasing number of oil fields, the demand must also continue to increase for some years to come.

"Therefore, unless some such change occurs, the price of oil will continue to rise. It is developed, the price can be checked off primarily only by new oil fields being developed. This is precisely what happens. The price goes up as the supply of oil is increased. When such a new field is opened up, the price falls until the temporary surplus, which this new field produces, is absorbed and consumption again catches up with production.

Exists Everywhere
"Oil exists nearly everywhere, but only certain points being profitable to look for one must drill to get it. In some sections—the Oklahoma which is producing an average of 500,000 barrels per day—drilling is profitable. In other sections—the New England—the oil is so deep that it may never pay to drill it. In the eight mountain states oil is deep but drilling is profitable. For instance, the eight mountain states are now producing about 100,000 barrels per day at all prices very low. As oil prices advance, it will become profitable to develop new fields in Colorado, New Mexico, Arizona and other states, and then a new big wave will be produced. This will again force prices down until consumption catches up again with production.

"This means that it is incorrect to say that Oklahoma has more oil than New Mexico. Both have identical amounts, the difference lies in the fact that the oil is nearer the surface in Oklahoma and it is unnecessary to drill so deeply as in the case of New Mexico. The difference is in the depth of the oil.

Prices Increase
"As the demand increases, the price again rises until it paid to drill 2,000 feet. Drilling 2,000 feet brings in a much larger quantity of oil and production for a while exceeds consumption accompanied by falling oil prices.
