NAVY OFFICIAL SEES INCREASED DANGER OF WAR

America Must Maintain Reasonable State of Preparedness During Next 20 Years Declares Rear Admiral.

NEW YORK, March 21 (AP)—There will be increasing probability of a foreign war during the next 20 years, and therefore the United States must always maintain a state of reasonable preparedness for war, Rear Admiral Bradley A. Fiske, retired, declared tonight in an address before the officers club of Columbia university.

He explained that, in his opinion, the increasing foreign trade of the next 20 years means increasing liability to conflict with competing nations because of the enormous amounts of money involved.

Trade Competition. He discussed the trade competition of the United States with both Japan and Great Britain in the Far East as a situation "containing fruitful seeds of conflict."

During World War. The latest example of this, he said, was during the first two years of the world war, "during which the United States was wheeled and bulled into certain unqualified positions by certain maneuvers that culminated in the sinking of the Lusitania and the torpedoing of our merchant ships, although the United States was a neutral nation."

Wilson Seen Practiced. He said that Admiral Fiske, for the first time in his life, accepted an invitation to witness latest practice in Chesapeake bay. Later, he said, President Wilson broke the secretary of the navy that he would fulfill the engagement.

WAR GAME PLAN IS CONSIDERED

Marine Corps Officer and Commander in Chief of Battle Fleet Work Out Maneuvers.

NAVAL BARE BAN PEBRO, Cal., March 21 (AP)—Major General Wendell C. Neville of the United States marine corps, conferred today with Admiral S. B. Rodden, commander in chief of the battle fleet, on plans for the attack on the Hawaiian islands in the joint army navy maneuvers to be held in the Hawaiian islands next month.

The conference today was held at the U. S. S. California, Admiral Rodden's flagship, in San Francisco.

PREMIER HEARS BRITISH VIEWS

England Adheres to Idea That German Proposals for Pact Must Be Considered.

PARIS, March 21 (AP)—M. de Fleurbaey, who arrived in Paris during the night fresh from contact with the British government as French ambassador in London, said today that he had received the results of his conversations with British officials regarding the question of European security.

The British contention is understood to be that a previous arrangement for security between France, Belgium and Great Britain is impracticable.

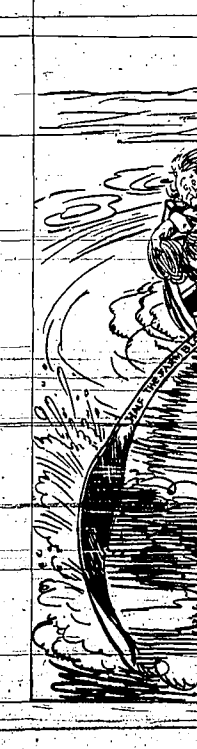

EUROPE COMBINE IS NOT FAVORED

Former Italian Foreign Minister Opposed to United States Plan Proposed.

ROME, March 21 (AP)—Signor Schusner, former Italian foreign minister, who has had a prominent part in League of Nations affairs, has continued a leading article in the Giornale d'Italia, arguing against the formation of a United States of Europe in a super-governmental sense.

Signor Schusner declared that such a union, as suggested by Dr. Hoover, is likely to stimulate a pan-Oriental movement, signs of which, according to the writer, are appearing in the Far East.

MEXICO DENIES FAVORING JAPS IN CONCESSIONS

American Ambassador Receives Official Disavowal of Fishing Grants Declared Lot to Orientals.

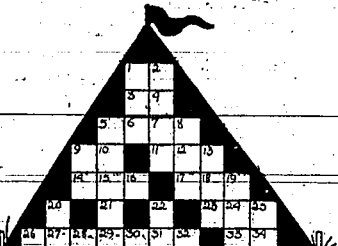
MEXICO CITY, March 21 (AP)—Janice R. Sheffield, American ambassador, announced today that the embassy had received an official denial from the Mexican government that past fishing and other concessions had been granted to Japanese in the neighborhood of the coal station on Michilingo Island in the Gulf of California which was given up recently by the United States navy. Whatever rights to Michilingo the United States possessed under the treaty have been surrendered, in accordance with the desire of the Mexican government to carry out the provision of the constitution prohibiting foreign ownership of lands within a one hundred kilometer zone along the frontier and a fifty kilometer zone along the coast.

The Mexico City newspapers have published articles to the effect that Japanese interests filed a petition for a concession to establish a fish parking facility on the Lower California coast and exploit a gravel and rock industry throughout the extent of the Mexican-Philippine zone. These reports have caused a recurrence of the rumors that the Japanese were attempting to secure a naval base in Lower California. Such rumors are characterized in official quarters as without foundation and falsely suggestive that the government is not requiring the constitutional requisite for strict maintenance of national sovereignty over the frontier and coast.

MURDER SUSPECT BANE
DENVER, March 21 (AP)—Dr. Harold E. Bane, 61 year old physician, accused of killing his 32-year-old "child woman" daughter, Harv, today was declared by jurors to be sane at the present time and on February 21, the day of the alleged slaying. The alleged "Doctor Edward" Tolubinsky and George A. Molten, qualified their opinions by stating that their final determination of his sanity would be based on the evidence brought before the jury. Dr. Bane, 26 days after he has been set for his arraignment.

Dr. David Starr Jordan Announces Plans for Meeting to be Held in 1928.
SAN FRANCISCO, March 21 (AP)—An international conference for promotion of world peace will be held in San Francisco, November 11, 1928, it was announced today by Dr. David Starr Jordan, educator and president of the conference for world unity, in session here.
Invitations will be extended to representatives of all nations as well as to heads of religious, educational and peace organizations. The conference program includes a series of lectures on world progress and rare problems. The major participants in the Jordan, already in national in scope and plan are being outlined for the extension. Raphael Herman of Los Angeles, whose peace plan award last year was won by the Jordan, is making in the world unity movement.

Searches Still Busy.
Reaching parties continued to locate the piled up masses of debris for hours.
The death list today was cut to 187 from 208 when identification of all but one body eliminated aspirations. From today two persons died in "inspiration" and brought the official death list to 180.
After a full day of activity of grave digging, undertakers and preachers, perhaps half of Murphyboro's storm torn dead were underground tonight.
As many as six ministers within hearing of one another said requests in the twin cemeteries, Saint Andrew and Tower Grove, today, brief ceremonies curtailed so that none of the dead might go to their last rest without the last service of the church at the minute and priests passed from burial to burial. NEW YORK, March 21 (AP)—Pavo Nurmi, Finland's superior runner, running his first race since his collapse in Madison Square Garden Tuesday night, easily won the mile and an eighth special at the postoffice clerks' game in the 60th regiment armory tonight. His time for the distance was 4:50, a 1.5 second shave that his own world's record for that distance.

The perfect Finn was not pulled at any time during the race, winning by more than 75 yards from Andy Gaa, running unchallenged. Gann Nilsson, Finland-American A. C. was third. Nurmi ran easily and showed no effects of his recent illness.

men and children helped, turning the order of chaos into a general procession to another, better, and more desirable life.

As the complete list of the dead began to come in, an increasing number of women, children and infants are shown among the dead. In West Frankfort alone nearly 40 of the dead were babies. The Associated Press reckoned the casualty list tonight and find it contained 783 names with no duplications. There is the possibility that in transmission of the list stated early casualties some casualties might have been incorrectly included.

General satisfaction with the progress of relief efforts was reported. Needs here and there as quickly as they became known, were immediately filled. Dohris is rapidly being re-stocked. Some heretofore inaccessible districts are opening up. The generous flow of money and supplies apparently is to be without parallel in such calamities.

The early notes of optimism and encouragement for rebuilding the future were sounded by one of Murphy's bravest leaders. In a stirring address he exhorted "heroes" from enthusiastic listeners who were still in grief and misery. Murphy stated that the United States should rebuild an agency employing 1400 men. Restoration of the general property and material loss probably cannot be made for days and possibly weeks. Figures variously reported estimate a total of between five and eight million dollars. Insurance activities now in full fields assert it will take many months to complete claims and arrive at proper valuations.

These regulations of course are unnecessary unless enforced but if automobiles and trucks can be made to conform to the law, driving at night will be much less hazardous occupation than it is at present.

This reform is particularly beneficial in Twin Falls County. By and large, it would mean that automobiles used in this section have the worst lights to be found in the world.

LOWER RATES, HIGHER TAXES. Here, for once, is a new item from the department of the state which the League of Nations. It deals with another angle of greater interest to Americans now—taxation.

The canton of Geneva—Switzerland—is divided into cantons—each one of which is divided into states—finding itself nearly bankrupt, has decided to pull out of the hole by drastic reductions. It figures that it may gain fifty per cent more revenue by lowering its rates on large incomes and capital, which are now very high.

If this seems foolish, it seems points to the experience of other countries, especially Zurich, which raised its revenue by a similar process. The explanation is that the high tax rates drew taxable property out of Zurich into other cantons or countries, and favored concealment and dishonesty.

When Edward B. White, former Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, died a few years ago, will was effected as an example of brevity and simplicity as well as legality. It avoided the involved terminology and complex details of the estate found in many wills.

Recently another example of a commendably brief will has been made. It disposed of three million dollars which he wrote on a bit of postcard the size of a postcard. He used about one hundred words to divide his property among his nine heirs-at-law.

He set a good example in two respects: Preparing a will and making it simple and short. The latter will be a good example to many who are still in the "higher brackets" of our Federal and State income taxes have set a better example than they usually give credit for.

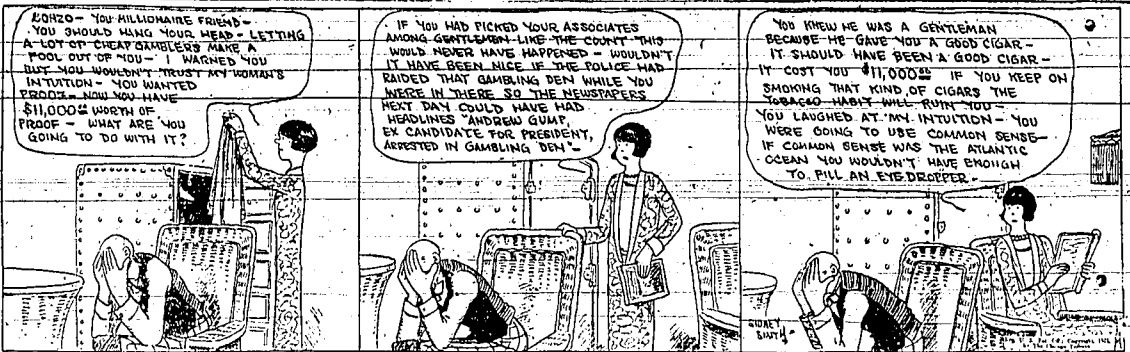

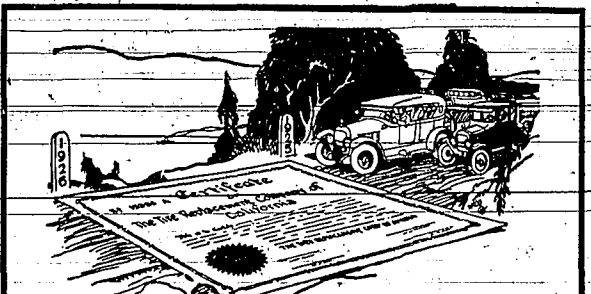
